The 2014 HLBC Regatta was a big success, boats participated in this every other year event.....and despite the rain, had allot of fun as well as challenging sailing. Congrats to Rob & Megan Linden and Casey Ray on their regatta victory. Here's their story:

Being my first time attending the Higgins Lake regatta I did not know what to expect. My wife Meghan had been there before with Tom Vickers so she gave me a few highlights. Clear water, a club on an island, and a Caribbean meets northern Michigan atmosphere, awesome I thought, and it was. Most of the teams arrived on Saturday morning to a consistent drizzle. Spirits were high though and everyone helped getting the boats through lunching bottle neck and into the lake. For those that haven't been to the Higgins lake regatta, the club is located on an island in the middle of the lake. Boats were towed over and moorings setup. Camping is provided on the island nearby the club house. Soon after arriving on the island the clouds cleared and a nice 8-15kt westerly filled in. Lunch was served following a relaxed skippers meeting conducted by RC Stan and crew. The first two races were sailed in a freshening breeze with short chop. The boats that were able to get off the start and to the middle left of the first beat picked up an island induced left shift and lead around the first mark. Quick oscillations downwind meant that you had to be alert to boats escaping around you in a nice puff. After a challenging race Rob Linden, Casey Ray, and Meghan Linden took the gun followed by Matt Morin, Kevin Morin, and Marcy Levy. The second race proceeded much like the first in a gradually lightening breeze with Team Linden and Morin taking 1st and 2nd. For the third race the RC adjust the course and set off the starting sequence. Several teams were OCS, as the pin end was loaded with boats working to get the left side of the course. The regatta leaders and several others found themselves heading back to the line for a place in the cheap seats. Boat speed was king in the 3rd race with a left over chop and lightening breeze.
