It is hard to remember details about a whole season that involved so much sailing. So, I will stick to the ridiculous, epic, and noteworthy moments. At the end of last year, we sold 15313 to Emily Simon and got 15500 just in time for the NCYC 2012 one day regatta. The new boat looked great and our new kite came with a big Old English

"D" on it. Nothing like a big Detroit "D" to make you want to go fast. The start of the 2013 season brought with it our best purchase ever. Without hull 15313, we could no longer really be Team "313" and boy, did we miss it. So, I set out to remedy the problem.

After months of searching, googling and calling half of the Indiana phone book, we found hull 313 at a bait shop near Lake Wawasee. It was built in 1946 and is solid Mahogany. For \$200, it was ours and were thrilled to be Team "313" again. It is in surprisingly good shape for having sat uncovered for 20 years. Leukemia Cup - Trey and Allison were very involved in pulling this event together. It was the first year that it was a Lightning District event. BOD - Trey and I spent a bunch of time promoting this one and were able to muster up 25 boats. For the second year in a row, we were the biggest fleet at the event, which built a lot of

awareness for the Lightning. We had a bunch of help promoting from Matt Warner, Mark Allen, George Sipel, and John McCree. My dad skippered this event. Our primary goal was keeping the stick in the sky. This was the first heavy air Lightning regatta that my dad had skippered. We struggled the first day and did really well the second day. But, we got many promises from those guys for 2014. Hopefully we will get north of 35 next year.

Boyne City - We fought back and forth with Trey on this one. The races saw huge shifts and huge velocity changes. It came down to the last race on Sunday and Trey pulled it off. The highlight

was the dinner on Saturday night. We went out as a one group for dinner at Red Mesa and managed to get a huge table so that everyone who raced could sit together.

Bay City - This regatta has become our annual favorite. It offers excellent sailing and the entertainment on Saturday night can't be beat. We fought this one out with Matt Princing. We had real similar scores on Saturday, but he smoked us on Sunday. John McCree negotiated unlimited passes with the local amusement park. We had the whole place to ourselves. In the past, it has always seemed like were on th wrong page. We learned that the trick is to look at the wind three to four steps ahead. We are convinced that the reason the North Cape guys are so good is because they are used to sailing in super challenging conditions.

Bluenose - I sailed with Bobby Flack and Josh Hevron. We won the most important contest of the weekend - the bottle of amber fluid! Bobby was skippering, Josh was in the middle, and I did front. We struggled on Saturday to get off the line and to keep lanes. On Sunday, there was a single race. We had a strong start and fought back and forth with Dick Hallagan, Tommy Allen, an Ryan Flack. It was light air. So, we focused hard on staying in the puffs and keeping the boat going as fast as possible in all conditions. In the last race of the weekend, we were able to put ourselves in a spot to get the last puff of the leg first and round in first place by about two boat lengths. From there, we hoped from puff to puff on the downwind leg. We rounded the second mark with about a half mile lead because the boats behind missed a puff that we fought to get to. We extended on the upwind leg and finished first with a huge lead. It was Bobby's first big regatta bullet as a skipper and a great way to end the season.
