READING OF THE MINUTES FROM THE LAST MEETING

Jim Carson moved that we dispense with reading the minutes of last meeting, seconded and unanimously approved.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS

President's Report—Steve Davis

President Davis, thanked all for attending and extended a special welcome to the countries attending the World Championships for the first time. He reported that the Class Office is operating satisfactorily and asked all present to please let him know if there is anything else we can do. VP Bill Mauk expressed his appreciation to President Davis for the "quest" of traveling to visit all the Districts of the Lighting Class.

Treasurer's Report—Robert Ruhlman

Treasurer Ruhlman pointed out that Skipper dues are behind by ~\$7,000 from what we had last year. He pointed out that the Balance Sheet shows the ownership of the two Boat Grant Boats as assets of the Lightning Class.

Peter Hall expressed his congratulations to Bill Fastiggi and Allan Terhune for this outstanding program. President Davis expressed his thanks to Chief Measurer Bill Clausen for organizing the measuring for the Worlds and for his attendance at so many of our events.

Chief Measurer's Report-Bill Clausen

Bill Clausen thanked the Organizing Committee for their help in setting up the Measurement Process at the World Championships. Everything has gone smoothly, he thanked the competitors for their cooperation throughout the Measurement Process.

Secretary's Report—Brian Hayes

Secretary Brian Hayes reported that we have an increased number of paid fleets in 2007 and a decrease in Active and Crew memberships. In 2006 we had 951 Active members compared to 818 to date in 2007, 2006 117 Associates compared to 115 to date in 2007, 2006 had 908 paid crew compared to 662 to date in 2007. Paid Fleets in 2006 were 102, this year 117.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE RULINGS made since the last meeting needing ratification by the Governing Board are as follows:

Executive Committee Ruling on defining geographic regions:

Our active Lightning community has expanded and, as such, it has been requested that our "areas," as described in the ILCA Rules Governing documents, be defined to be inclusive of all current active Fleets. Therefore, the following will be used to assess all Fleet or Districts area affiliation.

North America: Includes United States and Canada and their territories.

South America: Includes all Central and South American countries as well as countries in the Caribbean.

Europe: Includes all European, African and Middle East countries.

Any country not included but has a Fleet that forms will be assigned an area in which to compete. These designations are for establishing criteria for participation in Area and World Championships.

Executive Committee Ruling—Byes to the NAs for Worlds participants:

All North American World's skippers are to be granted a bye to the North American Championships with the following contingencies:

- Acceptance of a bye by the competitor requires a completed NA entry form as well as a \$50 non-refundable deposit.
- Bye must be accepted by May 31, 2007 by notifying the class office and completing bye requirements.

This ruling is set so that competitors who will be shipping their boats to Greece will still have the opportunity to participate in the North Americans as well, if they so desire. If a World's competitor accepts a bye and is still able to compete in his/her Districts, their participation will not count towards the District quota and, therefore, their placement will not be used in allocating spots for that district.

Executive Committee Ruling

At the request of the North American Championships Organizing Committee, the Executive Committee has approved a ratio of 1:3.

Bill Mauk recommended that perhaps the Executive Committee needs to review the residency Rules for Worlds Qualification.

Regarding the ratio change for the North American Championships, Jim Carson questioned the negative effect this might have on membership. Brian Hayes noted that participation at District Championships has been down this year, and this is what prompted the decision that was made. He pointed out that our rules call for 100 boats at our North American Championships, and this necessitated the adjustment.

Bill Mauk moved to approved all Executive Committee Rulilngs, Jim Carson against, Rulings approved.

VICE PRESIDENTS & COMMITTEE REPORTS

VP Worlds Mauk—Bill notified the participants that he needs people to help pack boats after the regatta, please notify Jan if you are able to stay and help.

VP So Circuit Amy Linton—Amy encouraged all Europeans to attend the Southern Circuit and noted that we had participation from the South Americans this past year at the event.

Peter Hall—Peter appealed to all to encourage their Junior sailors to attend the Junior World Championships that will be held in Canada next year. Peter Hall and Brian Hayes will coach all participants, making the regatta a learning experience for who attend.

North Americans—Brian Hayes. Todd is working on venues for years to come. No venue locked in for next year at this time. Mallets Bay Worlds Dates—Jan will post the dates on the ILCA website.

NEW BUSINESS

Jacques Perret will organize a meeting with the other Europeans to discuss Area planning and coordination and solicit a volunteer for a VP Europe position on the Governing Board.

Bill Clausen moved to adjourn the meeting, this was seconded and the meeting adjourned.

As I write this, we've been home from Brazil for ten days. In that time, I've gotten warm again. I haven't needed my magic wool hat (the one that was knitted for me by Audrey Mattesson and recovered and returned to me after capsizes in two lakes and the Pacific Ocean). It's been in three sailboat races; we haven't touched a line in any of them, and we've won all three! My two-and-a-half-year-old has taken permanent possession of 'her' silver medal. She occasionally lets me look at it—if she can be interrupted in her quest to pulverize it on the mudroom floor. One more thing—I miss the Lighting family we were with in Brazil.

We learned a lot participating in an Olympic-style event. If you'd like, you can go to:

and read a little bit about what it felt like to me to be in the middle of that amazing event. The USOC and US Sailing gave us incredible support. We had very diligent coaching. We had an incredible trainer. We were surrounded with security. It was fantastic to bond with our

teammates on the US Sailing team—former Olympic medalists, former Rolex winners, future gold medalists. It was incredible to sail a regatta among all that hoopla...speaking of which, we even became friends with both men's and women's US hoop team members. All that was amazing.

But perhaps even more amazing than anything about the actual sailing in the games was being a Lightning Sailor in the games. I never understood how important, how wonderful being in the Pan American Games is to the International Lightning Class. I was President of ILCA for two years. For ten plus years before that and at every major meeting before and during that time, someone, Jim Carson, Larry MacDonald Sr., Dave Sprague, or someone with equally good perspective on International Sailing, would make a report on the outlook for the Lightning staying in the Pan American Games. It was generally pretty iffy. We had six or seven countries interested in sailing in the games. The Pan American Sailing Organization wanted more countries to participate. If we didn't get more countries to sail, we'd be in trouble. We were always told how critical Pan American status was to the Lightning in South America. I've got to tell you, at that time those guys sounded like a broken record to me. We would never really lose the Lightning in the Pan Ams. Would we?

My gosh, I was so wrong. Maybe the only reason they sail Lightnings in those games is that those folks worked so hard to keep the boat in those games. My Lightning friends from different countries won medals because of the behind-the-scenes effort they made for those games. Andy and Bill and Heather. Larry and Julie-Marie and Trevor. Matt and Sean and Steve. Then for one of the games the Lightning was actually out. And Brian, who won the US trials, didn't get to go. I had no idea what a complete bummer that was until two weeks ago.



2007 Wooden Lightning Get Together

The fifth annual Wooden Lightning Get Together was held this past July 28–29 at the Onondaga Yacht Club near Syracuse New York. Reaching

near Syracuse New York. Reaching our fifth anniversary is a big milestone, as it establishes the event as a true annual gathering by those of us who love our old wooden Lightnings.



Certainly these are not the fastest Lightnings around, and some are showing their years. Others are just drop dead spectacular-looking boats that truly reflect the evolution of the Class. At this year's event we had a first, with three boats sporting three digit sail numbers on the water: David Helman, Montclair, New Jersey (465), Doug Dixon, Glouchester Point, Virginia (584), and Jim Herz, Binghampton, New York (754).


Also joining us for the first time this year was Lou Maruiello, Chichester, New York (7310). Another noteworthy event was the official relaunching of 7310 and 465 after several years of work. It was a thrill to see both of these boats survive two days on the water with no problems beyond a few loose fasteners and the normal wooden boat problems that were managed via pump and sponge.

This year we shared the lake with an ESPN Bass Fishing Tournament, the winner receiving \$250,000. While our prize money was substantially less, like under 25 cents, it was quite a sight to see the ESPN trucks, helicopters, boats, and, of course, the \$50,000 bass boats with matching pickup trucks. Special thanks to Craig Thayer for coordinating with the fishing tournament organizers. There was some concern for how our presence on the lake might impact this televised sporting event. As it turns out, there was no impact. We coordinated the times we left the dock and returned, we raced in the deep water, and they fished along the banks.

As part of our evening activities we pulled out our growing collection of ILCA yearbooks dating back to 1948. Looking over the history of our boats was fun.

But I think most exciting was reading the old ads for boat builders and sailmakers. Reading some of the old go-fast articles is interesting as well. As an aside, next winter we plan to complete the project of scanning all the old yearbooks to CD's, making this Class history available to anyone interested.

And of course, I need to thank our hosts, the Onondaga Yacht Club, who every year welcome our rag-tag fleet with open arms. Craig Thayer, our host, organizes a terrific event, and his wife puts out lunches and dinner for us. I can't thank these people enough for their support of this unique event.

The racing this year was fantastic. Four races, and our boat, #7603, prevailed for the fourth consecutive year. Only this year was different. My teenage crew banished me to the front of the boat, and I crewed for Matt Klise (age 17), who along with my son Billy used this race as practice for the Junior NAs in a few weeks. Matt did a great job handling the boat and learning how to distinguish my non-stop "boat-babble" from the important stuff. Much more important than the competitive aspects of the sport, both Matt and Billy have gained an appreciation for the boats themselves and the responsibility of maintain-

ing these antiques. My goal has been to create two lifelong Lightning sailors as well as racers, and they appear to be making good progress.

Second place, for the fourth year in a row, was Bryne O'Brien and his wife Karen, from Ithaca New York. As in the past, the racing was close, including yet another photo finish in what is becoming an annual pattern. Third place again this year was David Little from Burlington, Vermont, along with his son Matt.

Joining the event for the second time this year was Ken Lambert and his wife Diane of Crystal Beach, Ontario. Ken finished fourth, benefiting from handing the tiller over to lifelong Lightning sailor Craig Thayer. David Teller, Bud Lake, New Jersey, along with his wife Judy and daughter Mellisa, joined us again this year, moving up to a fifth place finish. I have to note that the Tellers were the only boat not manning sponges and pumps all day. Their secret, they leave the boat in the water at a mooring all summer and the boat swells tight and dry. Doug Dixon also came back this year with his 'as original' restoration of 584. Unbelievable job of restoration, but as Doug (an old racing sailor) says, "Slow…"

Perfect for classic boat racing, on Saturday we had an 8–10 mph breeze from the northwest, perfectly aligned with the length of the lake. The race committee ran a series of relatively short courses. A couple of windward-lewards and a couple of triangular courses. Much like in the early days of Lightning racing, about half the fleet flew spinnakers and about half didn't. While this certainly spreads out the fleet, you have to keep in mind that the Woody Regatta is a different kind of event. Sure we have races, but it is very much a different kind of racing where finishing order is not necessarily as important as the thrill of finishing after taking a fifty or sixty year old boat around a course successfully.

As in prior years, Sunday we had some wind problems, light and shifty. We cancelled the races but got in a few hours of excellent casual sailing before we had to come in and pack up.

As in years past, we were joined this year by several boat owners whose boats were not quite ready for the event. Most notably, Fisk Hayden came by on Saturday. Fisk was looking over some details and taking some measurements for his restoration of Hull # 2. He thinks it will be ready for the 70th and should be quite a sight on the starting line. Buddy Wilkins, from Mt. Sidney, Virginia, along with his son Trey, are still working on 7293 and came to the Woody event for the second time. First timers Larry and Connie Bryon are mid restoration on boat number 6298 and drove up from the Philadelphia area. I think they got some information to help in their restoration and got out for two days of sailing. Brian Colvin joined the fun crewing for, I believe, his fourth time in the Woody event. Brian's assures us his restoration of #8677 will be completed by next summer.

This year we awarded a new perpetual trophy to the highest placing first-timer attendee. David Helman took home the prize, a remarkably ugly lamp carved by prisoners at the Florida State Penitentiary.

Next year we will be moving our event to be part of the 70th anniversary celebration at Skaneateles. We are planning on twenty or so Woody's making the trip and are looking forward to allowing the rest of you to get a close up, hands on look at the evolution of the boats. Also coming for us old boat folks will be the "Classic" division at the Borderline regatta in October, and Doug Dixon and I are planning on using our old boats at the "Masters" Championship in August.



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
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Coach's Corner Sailing in Chop

One of the things common with sailing Lightnings in chop is the feeling of a lack of power. There are things to do to help compensate for this. We frequently move the leads forward to help make the lower sections of the jib fuller. Also check to make sure your halyard on the jib is not too tight and the cloth might be a little looser than normal. Another thing we frequently do is ease the sheet on the jib slightly and raise the traveler height on the main slightly to sail with some more twist in the sails for a little more power. While it might cost a little height, you might need the power to get through the waves, which could result in more height. Remember that the waves will affect the boat differently depending on which tack you are on. On one tack you may have smoother water and trim to point and another you are square to the waves and need the power footing gear.

Another critical thing to think about is crew weight and position. When the boat is sailing through more chop, we work very hard to give the boat a little more heel (but not so much that the tiller loads up with a ton of weather helm!) when the waves are coming and go back to normal heel when the waves are gone. It is also important to keep your weight centered so you are not burying the bow or dragging the stern, which would get more exaggerated with waves. Remember when steering to try to pick the path of least resistance.

When sailing downwind, it is crucial to keep the spinnaker drawing and the boat going smooth through the water. In the lighter air we will give the boat a little leeward heel to help reduce wetted surface and also to give the boat a little "feel" on the helm. Also we will sail a little hotter angles to keep the boat rolling. One thing for trimmers to remember is that it is very easy to over trim in waves, so when in doubt as to whether the spinnaker is collapsing or shaking do to waves, try to ease a little and see what happens. It is a common mistake to trim due to wave action and the spinnaker is not actually collapsing due to the changing wind angles.

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
