





The Neenah Nodaway Fleet No. 67 wound up the 1949 season at a cocktail party on December 28, or did we start the 1950 season? For three years Herb has been inching his way up from behind. He sailed every race of the season and won top honors with the same old sails but a new nylon (light blue) spinnaker that lost him more points than it won. Ralph Risley also had a lady crewman for part of the season in his daughter Gloria, who helped him to start the season with a bang, but Ralph was too busy as Vice-Commodore and with a brand new house to really give his sailing a fling. He's settled now and Commodore, so maybe the other fellow will do

the work and he can really sail in 1950.

Don Kutchera bought Bernie Smith's boat and got started in midseason, but made a good showing considering his unfamiliarity with the Lightning. Walt Roller was either first or last most of this season, though twice John Snyder ghosted to finishes 30 minutes ahead of the fleet. We regretted that Dick Neller, who started out to again lead the parade and had for the past three preceding years been our fleet champion, had to fall out after ten races because of health, but he is recovering nicely and should be with us again in 1950. We're all pretty well

matched now and anything can happen in 1950.





Fleet No. 70's 1949 season opened on a note of sadness with the passing of Fleet Captain Herb Cox, just as the season was about to open. Herb was one of the charter members of Fleet No. 70 and was the spark plug of its organization and development. He was also the first commodore of the newly organized Metropolitan District. Herb was a grand guy and excellent sailor and always the life of the party. His passing leaves Fleet No. 70 with a void which will never be filled.

Randall Keator was elected Acting Captain of Fleet No. 70 to complete the unexpired term.

The membership of Fleet No. 70 jumped greatly at the beginning of the season since Fleet No. 11 of Fair Haven, which was having basing difficulties, became inactive and the entire membership transferred to Fleet No. 70. Thus, Fleet No. 70 started the season with 29 boats registered. In the course of the summer, three boats left the fleet and three boats entered so that the season ended as it had begun with 29 boats.

During the 1949 season, Fleet No. 70 had entries in seven outside regattas and brought home trophies from every one.

The first race away from home was the 8th Annual Invitation Regatta of the Shrewsbury Sailing Club on South Shrewsbury River. Charlie Allaire sailing No. 3101, "Avenger", romped off with the first of a long string of firsts he was to acquire during the season. Barb Sayre, sailing her newly acquired "Barefoot", No. 2230 (formerly Herb Cox's "Cox'n") placed third.

The following weekend, nine representatives of Fleet No. 70 trailed their boats to Nyack, N. Y. to compete for the first time for the Championship of the new Metropolitan District. In the three race series, Fleet No. 70 placed two boats in the first three in each race: Charlie Allaire took all three firsts; June Methot, sailing "Bon Gre" No. 1138, was second in the first race; Reid and Bev Dickerson sailing "Windward", No. 1239, were third in the second

race and Johnny Bull, sailing his brand new "El Toro", No. 3716, was second in the third race. In the final scoring, Fleet No. 70 accounted for five of the first ten places. Charlie became the first to win the beautiful Herb Cox Memorial Bowl which is perpetual in addition to a permanent trophy.

One week later on July 30-31, three representatives of Fleet No. 70 journeyed to Larchmont, N. Y. to compete in the Atlantic Coast Championship. Shifty breezes and no breezes were the order of the weekend. In spite of one of these shifts parking him off to leeward and causing him to finish 24th in the first race, Charlie Allaire managed by virtue of a third and a first in the last two races, to bring home the fifth place trophy. The other two Fleet representatives, Bull and Methot, finished about half way down in a field of 43 boats. The lack of air was so complete in the last race that some boats finished as late as 10:00 P. M. in total darkness after starting at 3:45 after several postponements. Fourteen of the competing boats did not finish at all.

On August 6-7, Fleet No. 70, along with Comet Fleet No. 11 and the Monmouth Boat Club and the National Sweepstakes Regatta Assn. (a motor boat racing organization) sponsored the 1st Annual Sweepstakes Sailing Regatta on the home waters of Fleet No. 70. There were 33 Lightnings and 37 Comets entered in this

Regatta. Notable among the Lightning entries was Magnus Pedersen of Nyack, former Atlantic Coast Champion, who sailed Johnny Bull's "El Toro". Allaire continued his winning ways by again placing first in all three races. Second place went to Pedersen in "El Toro" with two seconds and a seventh. Ed Waters of the Shrewsbury Sailing Club, sailing No. 3108, "So Long", placed with a third and two fifths. Beautiful prizes were provided by the National Sweepstakes Regatta Committee for individual race winners and the first five place winners for the series. Perfect sailing weather prevailed for the entire weekend. Everyone agreed it was an excellent Regatta.

On August 13-14, Fleet No. 70 sent three entries to the first New Jersey State Championship Regatta at Pine Beach Yacht Club, Toms River, New Jersey. For the third time this season, Allaire annexed three firsts to win the Hubert Johnson trophy. The other two Fleet No. 70 entries, Bull and Dickerson, placed fifth and sixth respectively.

Charlie Allaire represented the Metropolitan District in the Internationals at Miami where he won the first race, placed seventh in the second and second in the third to place third for the series, only two points behind Bertram.

The local racing season closed with the Fourth Annual Two-River Regatta held the weekend after Labor Day. This is an interfleet event between Fleets 70 and 80 which each entered a team of ten boats. Despite the best efforts of Ed Waters of Fleet 80, who was individual stand-out of the weekend with two firsts, Fleet No. 70 retained the trophy for the fourth successive year by a score of 224½ to 195½.

Along with this heavy schedule of outside Regattas, 28 regular point races were run by Fleet No. 70 and the Monmouth Boat Club. In the Fleet series, Charlie Allaire scored 12 firsts of a possible 15 for a total of 446 points. Reid and Bev Dickerson were second with 438½ points. Johnny Bull was third with 426 1/4. Lloyd Lawrence sailing "Bam", No. 860, was fourth with 424 3/4 and June Methot was fifth with 412 1/4. In the Monmouth Boat Club series, the Dickersons were first, Johnny Bull second, Lloyd Lawrence third, June Methot fourth and 83 year old veteran skipper, Charley Burd, sailing "Frog II", No. 3269, was fifth. Allaire did not sail the required number of races to be eligible.

The season closed officially with a dinner-dance for all hands at which time the trophies were awarded.

Plans for a wonderful season next year are already under way. In addition to our local racing, we will hold the 2nd Annual Sweepstakes Sailing Regatta which we hope to make bigger and better than this year, and we hope to hold the New Jersey State Championship Regatta and the Metropolitan District Championship Regatta. As soon as details are available for these Regattas, we will have the information in "Flashes".

Everyone agreed it was a wonderful year and we are going to try to make it an even better one next year.






We are also proud to say Fred Wiedeke and George Nelson finished second and third places respectively, in the Barnegat Bay Championships.







We have the finest racing in the world, and the only organization that is truly entitled to the name Widowmaker. The YRA-LIS, from May to October leaves those wives who elect not to follow the sea at home with their thoughts on every Saturday, Sunday and holiday. This makes for fine racing and well trained crews, but is not notable among the devices for assuring a happy home.

Taking this into consideration, we turned our attention in 1949 to Fleet racing as well as the more professional YRA. This was well considered because our Fleet had grown to 17 boats, many of which had acquired inexperienced crews. Scoring was on a peculiar basis because YRA racing was on a split Fleet basis, so we had two sets of winners, first division and second. In the first division, Lieut. Ed Cotter, USCG, won going away. In the second division, Hugh Byfield sailed his "Lady Lou" to first place, closely pursued by a newcomer, an ex-monkeywrench sailor, Bill Byam, who slaughtered the remaining opposition with his "Jigtime" and his two little girls as crew. This shows that the case of motorboaters is not hopeless, after due reform.

The same Ed Cotter, (who holds a higher rank, Commodore), was a close second in YRA racing for the 1949 season, being beaten in standing only by Eckhart of Fleet No. 32. There are about 200-300 Lightnings in the Western LIS District, most of which get into the YRA racing sometime during the season, and the racing extends from May to mid-September, so the top men in those standings occupy a position of earned merit.

The best demonstration of sailing during the season was given by young Bill Bronk, then aged 15, who was racing in his "Nana" on July 4 when the famous hurricane struck and just about wrecked the racing and cruising Fleet in these waters, sinking many and capsizing about 90. Thirty seven Lightnings were racing and all but two went over. Bill saw the thing coming, got his sails off and a bucket over the stern, and rode the storm out in true sailor fashion.

We had a rough year on the Sound; the usual zephyrs were absent, replaced by brawling winds and surging seas.

Officers for the past year were George A. Hands and A. R.

Alexander who did a very fine job in running the Fleet races and distributing prizes.

An invitation race was held with about thirty of the best boats on the Sound competing. It was won by Al Eckhardt of Fleet 32 (who became Sound Champion) and who received the trophy, a hålf model constructed by Ray Moore of this Fleet. Our Burr Jenkins was second but withdrew, having missed a buoy from inability to read the race circular, a poor printing job, and the "Volunteer" of McConnell of Fleet No. 32 succeeded to second

Officers for the coming year are John L. Seymour, Captain and W. R. Bronk (father of Bill) Secretary, Ed Cotter, 1949's Captain, has been elected Commodore of the Western Long Island Sound District. The new Officers formulated and revised rules for racing that were first adopted by the Lightning Fleets interested in YRA racing, and have now been adopted in principle by the YRALIS itself for all classes.







Races for spring and summer series were held on Thursdays of each week. A three mile triangular course with a slatted globe used and extended on small piling which was about eight feet above water for buoys. The globe was four feet across and its mounting was very secure. Competition was very keen as skippers who were winning with regularity in spring series, were being beaten in summer events.
