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
Marblehead Race Week held August 2-10 at Marblehead, Mass. Fleet #189.

#### BRAZIL DISTRICT REPORT



The big event of the season was the interfleet team event sailed in September at Sao Paulo between the locals and a visiting team



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
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Start of one of the Inter-fleet races Kio xx. San Paklo.

#### CANADIAN DISTRICT REPORT



District Report: For some time post representations had been made to the Association in regard to the formation of a Canadian District because from a geographical standpoint it was not always easy for crews in this area to go to either Central New York or the New England District Championships. About July 15th we received a very welcome relephone call from Mrs. Cain telling us to go ahead and if possible, run off a District Championship before the deadline of August 12th. Thus a Canadian District become a reality and the area covered is roughly the same as that encompassed by the St. Lawrence Valley Yacht Racing Association to which 20-odd clubs belong ... on the St. Lawrence River from Kingston to Quebec inclusive and on to the Ortaws River from Deep River to Montreal, plus tributary waters. The Association suggested also that Lake Placid (193), because of its proximity, might also find it easier if they were in the Canadian setup and of course they are entirely welcome as are also Laurentian International (129), and for that matter, any others located in the United States near the St. Lawrence area.
