




Norwalk Yacht Club Fleet No. 230 started its season officially on June 20th and was active at home and away until hurricanes and school schedules called a halt.

We had a magnificent sailing season this year, it being superior in almost every respect to last year, which was itself an excellent one. More races were held, more boats were added, and enthusiasm was maintained at the same high level.

One of the accomplishments of which we are most proud is the large number of races in our championship series—38, that, you'll have to admit is a lot of races. Perhaps an explanation of this great number of races is to be found in the fact that all Lightning Class races held at our club count toward the class championship. The championship is won by the skipper having the best average score, providing he has sailed in fifty per cent, or more, of the available championship races. It is interesting to note that no member of our fleet sailed less than 21 (more than half) of these races. The Commodores Cup, a perpetual trophy, is awarded to our champion, in this year's case, O. Quite a few of our skippers are getting new light boats in the hope of providing better competition at regattas, etc. Pitts has already procured a new boat, Bob Nolan is getting a Lippincott, Louis is building himself a new one, and James Stratten is thinking of buying a Martin built boat. These new boats coupled with the old ones, which are usually sold to club members and thereby retained in the fleet are making for a rapid increase in our fleet's size. Next year we hope to start nine or ten boats at our home events and to be able to send boats to regattas capable of competing with the finest. Take heed, you fellows from Dallas, there's more of us now and we're all "hungry."

In 1954 the Ford Yacht Club Lightning Fleet completed a four month racing schedule in its second season, and had an average of 4 boats competing in the 9 races held on Lake Erie. Fleet No. 238, like Topsy, is growing fast! Chartered in 1953 with six boats, two were added to end that season with eight. With all members of the Fleet pushing interest in Lightnings throughout the Club, the 1954 Season started with eleven boats having added four and lost one. Fleet growth gathered speed during the season when two additional boats were added and the season was climaxed by the transfer of Bud Olson's fast boat from Housatonic Boat Club, Fleet 6, to Norman Borgersen. Thus when moorings were hauled in the Fall, the Fleet numbered fourteen. From small talk going the rounds, there is little doubt but what more boats will be added by race time next Spring.

In the big series of the season, the Sunday Afternoon Series, Norman Evarts again took first place by a wide margin with seven wins and two seconds. Of the original ten races scheduled only one was blown out because of high winds. Although some of the early races in light airs seemed to indicate that Norman and his crew in Fancy Free might be in for some stiff competition, the second half of the series proved to be a runaway for this fast combination. Final point scores were 491/2 Norman Evarts, 441/4 Burvee Franz in Zig Zag, 381/4 Bill Bechtel in Minx and 37 Bob Peck in Vagabond.

In most races Fancy Free with Norman at the tiller, wife "Bobby" and daughter Linda, age 5, as crew, finished way ahead of the rest of the Fleet. The strong tidal currents around Welchs' Point and Charles Island proved the undoing of some of the newer skippers. Many experienced the frustrating feeling of seeing the lead boats round the bell outside of Charles Island with an outgoing tide and dying breeze which contributed to many DNFs during the season. With our boats hauled out for the winter, we look forward to 1955 with hopes for a season as interesting and successful as this last one







Our official racing calendar consists of two major series. The first being the Stransky Cup. This series was won by Thunderbolt. No. 680, which by the way is past International Champ (1941). The Thunderbolt was skippered by Seniff and Andy Nezezon with Jorge Holland as crew. This being the boy's first year of sailing, we considered it quite a feat.

The second series, which determines the Club Champion is the Rowe Trophy Series. This year traditional sailing weather prevailed (25-30 miles wind per hour the first day and 0-5 the second). Our champ this year is Bill Agnew and Arnie Miller with Betty Miller as crew racing the Thunder-N No. 2220.
