Legowski and Nelson visited Buckeye Lake to enjoy their hospitality, while the latter claimed a third place.


J. Keller, F. Keller and J. Smith traveled to Monroe Boat Club and walked off with all the hardware.





We take this opportunity to invite all Lightning Skippers to attend the 1957 Red Flannel at the Burnham Park Yacht Club.



his Dragon, Spirit II.


