Our official fleet activities for 1956 season started on November 1, 1955 and ended on July 30, 1956 making a total of sixty-four races. As last year, Carlos Navarro Jr. was the first on the winner list for the regattas and Jose' Barreda Moller was the second. On March, 1956 we held in our waters the Second Pan Ameri-

can and South American Championships. Were representing: Argentina, Bolivia, Canada, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, United States and Uruguay. The Championships began with one Tune-Up race which was sailed on March 24, being the first five of twenty entries as follows: First Carlos Navarro Jr. from Peru, second Julio C. Goldie from Uruguay, third Pablo Rosello from Peru, fourth Nicolas Pecharich from Ecuador, and fifth Enrique Plaza from Ecuador. After the five races for each championship one race from Callao to Chorrillos, about 15 miles, closed the International season, the first five places were: Carlos Navarro Jr. from Peru, Rafael Obregon from Colombia, Gustavo Barreda Moller from Peru, Humberto Plaza from Ecuador, and Jose' Barreda Moller from Peru. Five races were sailed in the Pan American Championship being the top five, among twenty-two entries: Julio C. Goldie from Uruguay 101 points, Horacio Garcia Pastori from Uruguay and Carlos Navarro Jr, from Peru tied with 92 points each one, Enrique Plaza from Ecuador 89 points, Juan B. Baader from Argentina 86 points. Also five races were sailed in the South American Championship being the top five, among twenty entries: Julio C. Goldie from Uruguay 92 points, Horacio Garcia Pastori from Uruguay 84 points, Carlos Navarro Jr. from Peru 80 points, Enrique Plaza from Ecuador 76 points Pablo Rosello from Peru 69 points. In the Pan American five races, Goldie picked up three firsts, Navarro picked up one first and Plaza picked up one also. In the South American five races, Goldie picked up two firsts, Garcia Passori, Navarro and Plaza picked up one first each. Getting both Championships titles Julio C. Goldie from Uruguav showed once again to be an expert and excellent skipper and, of course, very hard to defeat for the time to come. Horacio Garcia Pastori the other Uruguay representative also showed to be a very able skipper.

On May, 1956 five races were sailed for the Peruvian Lightning Championship being the winner Carlos Navarro Jr. in his boat No. 5402 who retained the title for the second consecutive year, second was Gustavo Barreda Moller. The other places were respectively as follows: Jose' Barreda Moller, Pedro de Paz, Bram Takefman, Pablo Rosello, John Russell, Hector Motales, Federico Garcia, Jeffrey Balshow, Juan Navarro Grau, Franco Carbone, Alberto Canepa and Manuel Gutierrez.

We are very glad to know that our calendar for 1957 season will consist of about fifty races. Our fleet will be represented

at the Third Pan American and South American Championships to be held at Montevideo, Uruguay, next February and will be a big Pleasure for us to meet there our South and North American skippers and crews friends. In other words, it looks like a very nice sailing year is coming.

Fleet #266 is now 2 years old and if the first two years are any indication, the future is indeed a bright one.





For next year she hopes to enter the Italian District Champion-ship and will organize the Fleet Championship and a cruising



1927 may be given as the year that saw the first sail races on the Guayas river, in what were then called yachts with each owner giving full vent to his ingenuity in the creation of rigs and hulls that Rube Goldberg would have found difficult to match but time brought experience and experience brought the refinement of these yachts, though there were seldom two of the same design and similarly equipped since the economical possibilities of each owner had a good deal to do with the selection of equipment and canvas, with the richer fellow having a better chance to win the races. This state of affairs created quite a problem for the handicap and racing committees when trying to establish a just handicap, and led to the consideration of a one class design by the Guayaquil Yacht Club.

Several designs were studied and it was concluded that the Lightning class design was the one that incorporated most of the features desired.

An order for 20 complete units was placed with F. A. Baay of Holland and the first units were received during the latter part of 1954.

Once they were tried out they proved to be an ideal yacht of racing and pleasure sailing on the Grayas River, approximately 60 miles from the Pacific.

Fleet No. 272 was formed with these yachts and interest in the activities of the fleet may lead to similar yachts being built locally.

The season of races during the present year was quite an active one and the fleet was favored with winds ranging from light breezes to strong and gusty blows.

The local championship was sustained over a series of twelve races held on the Guayas River over a triangular course laid in front of Guayaquil.

Emilio Estrada, who is the Fleet Captain, took the lead during the first races assisted greatly by the first set of Larsen ducron sails but when the rest of the fleet was similarly equipped his lead was disputed by 17 year old Humberto Plaza who won several of the races but not enough to overtake Emilio Estrada's lead in points, that secured the championship for him. Humberto Plaza and Enrique Plaza took second and third place.

As a result of and invitation made by the Guayaquil Yacht Club we had as guests during the second week of October two Lightning crews from Peru; Carlos Navarro of Fleet No. 265 and Gustavo Barreda M., of Fleet No. 261; and two crews from Colombia; L. C. Rodriquez and L. A. Londono of Fleet No. 73, who competed against representatives of the Guayaquil Yacht Club Fleet No. 272 in a series of five races, two of which were held on the Salado River, which is a salt water estuary, and the remaining three races on the Grayas River course.

These international races created a great stir among the inhabitants of Guayaquil as it was the first time that an event of this kind has been held. During the course of the races the entire riverfront was lined with thousands of cheering spectators whose highly voiced encouragement for the local fleet was rewarded with these results:

The fact that the contest was enjoyed so much by both visiting and home crews may result in similar events being held the forthcoming year.



The Regatta featured a three-race seties with the first race held Sunday morning and starting as a drifter in the first leg of the triangular course. On the second leg a brisk northwest breeze developed and conditions became puffy with gusts reaching 20 MPH, which got skippers and crews on their alert. Len Pratt of Spofford Lake won the first and subsequent two afternoon races of the Regatta that were run in even heavier wind conditions which churned Massabesic waters to full fury with white caps, flying spray, and drenched skippers and crews.

The only casualty of this tempest, in the Lightnings, proved to be one of our veteran Massabesic skippers, Reg Babin, who with his crew in #1139 managed to greet the fishes after a brief tussle with an unruly spinnaker!

Pratt in his "Bon Joy" beat out his closest rival, Gardner Brown of Lewiston, Maine, by the narrow margin of 41/4 points, and this marked the fourth year that he has taken this annual event. Final standing in the Regatta, which proved a big success




Tenth Annual M. 18SARESIC Regatta, Wanchester, N. H., Stoiday, October 7, 1956.



Although our fleet has been racing actively for a number of years, it was only this summer of 1956 that a fleet charter was taken up. We have yet to partake of district racing, but this is in the cards.

As usual the 1956 season began with a series of five races held on Wednesday nights and Sundays during June. These races are held off the club property at Chippewa Park, on Lake Superior.

The first two races, 2 laps each around a triangular three mile course saw Lou and Audrey Walsh get "Bonbo" off to a handy start toward the coveted Paterson trophy, which goes to the highpoint winner of the best of six races and is emblematic of the club championship. In the first race on the evening of Wednesday, June 12, in light airs, Walsh worked out a ten minute lead over Bob McCranor, second. The second race on Sunday, June 17 saw more action in 20 m.p.h. S.E. winds, with Walsh nosing out Baker with a 10 second edge.

June 20, the third race, again over the three mile circuit marked the first appearance of "Vixen", Dr. Burnford's new coral-hulled beauty. This time Bob and Betty McCranor came through with a 40 second win over Bill Tamblyn, a new contender this year, and Bob's ex-crew.

The fourth race, Sunday, June 24, was a seamanship race, dreamed up by a diabolical sailing committee requiring a start from anchor, hoisting sail, retrieving a crew diverboard (using a symbolic and appropriate piece of wood) etc., etc.! The strong contenders here, as might have been expected, were Graham Baker's "Bormit" and Van Bailey's "Zamboanga", two veterans that show their best mettle when the going is toughest.

On Wednesday, June 28, another evening race at Chippewa Park began with a running start, all boats setting spinnakers as they crossed the line, in a fresh breeze. The first leg saw a mix-up at the first mark with three boats converging and dousing their spinnakers as they rounded, resulting in "Nimbus" protesting "Caprice Too". On the second time round in warning winds, McCranor and Burnford leading, were caught in a windshift allowing "Caprice Too" on a split tack, to round the last mark in the lead. Burnford and McCranor had a minor collision as they rounded. Burnford subsequently ghosted past Walker, only to be repassed just before the line in a close finish. Walker and Burnford were, however, disqualified leaving McCranor first and Van Builey hard on his heels, in a second position.

The season's classic was the long distance tace across Thunder Bay on July 1st with nine starting in fresh off-shore winds on a brilliant day. This race is 22 miles long, from Chippewa Park to Amethyst Harbout, and a Royal Canadian Navy tig came along as escort. Elapsed time was 3:17:30, with Lou and Audrey Walsh and Ken Stewart as crew once more coming through first and McCranor slipping past Baker and Walker who were engaged in a luffing match to take second place.

The next day at Amethyst, the weatherman co-operating perfectly, the fleet was out again over a six mile standard triangular course, Lambert Island to Cariboo Island, to the mainland at Judge's Point, and back to Lambert. After much jibbing of spinnakers and windshifts that saw the fleet split into two groups, Walker and Walsh battled it out with Walker's "Caprice Too" winning by 13 seconds.

The Sunday following, July 8, started badly with fog, a strong northeaster and light rain. After some postponement the race for the coveted Crystal Beach trophy got under way from South Bay, Amethyst, with plenty of weather outside to stir things up. After a hard beat, "Caprice Too" emerged on top hotly pursued by Van Bailey's "Zamboanga" which made it a near thing by being the only boat to fly a spinnaker and closing the lead to about two lengths at the finish.

The fleet then went their various ways, some to cruise Lake Superior and some the inland lakes for the midsummer vacation period.

On August 12th they met again at Loon Lake, home of Bonbo, Caprice Too. Vixen and Chinook, for the annual Loon Lake invitation race. Bob and Laura Prettie came through to win in their beautiful "Chinook", with David Burnford second. Walsh and Walker were disqualified after some hotly disputed port tacking in light and shifting winds. All adjourned to the Pretties for the annual "Sailing Convention" much enjoyed by all.

Winding things up with a novelty day at Loon Lake, a trade boar race provided a lot of fun with "Nimbus" sailed by Lloyd Walker taking it by a nose over Van Bailey in "Spray". Most spectacular comeback of the season was provided by Mabel Crooks crewing in "Nimbus" who disappeared overboard when her skipper Bill Tamblyn gave a sudden helping hand with the main-shaft. Mabel reappeared, dripping and still on the end of the mainshaft, feet first!

In the afternoon the girls took over for a "Powder Puff" race, Laura Prettie in Chinook bringing off top honours in a close race with Betsy Hughson sailing "Captice Too" taking second. In this race, in the words of Bunny Burnford, the male skippers are allowed only three remarks: "We are aground." "Help! Have fallen overboard." and (pointedly) "We have capsized."

It was a grand season and when the final count was tallied Lou Walsh was the new champion winning the Paterson trophy for high points, and Bob McCranor taking second place.

1957 promises to be hotly contested with various modifications and new fibre glassing projects well under way at time of writing, and the hot stove league polishing up on the rules.


