

The final disaster occurred when a strong puff demasted his boat in the last race. Equally intense rivalry was generated by the Sears Cup quarter finals in which Nels Kringle came in first for the second season running. Poor Nels was again unable to enter the semifinals, this time because of school exams.

Barbara Bitler was the surprise victor in the Mutiny Race, a tradition which involves the crews wresting the tiller from the skipper.

The season was topped off with a cocktail party in which the fleet paid tribute to some of the many deserving members of the Miniscoongo Yacht Club who have contributed their time and effort to making sailing a success.

Jim Gilbert, sailing his Sparks won the series after a rather hor contest with Lou Borges sailing Flying Lady III.







She came in eighth at Annisquam, Mass. on August 8th and 9th, at the New England District Championships. Peter Willauer skippering again won the State of Maine Lightning Championship Regatta at Centerboard Yacht Club in Portland Harbor on August 22nd and 23rd. At Lake Massebesic in Manchester, N. H. on Sept. 17th and 18th, Charles Willauer took second place in the State of New Hampshire Lightning Regatta.
