



# NOW -even faster sail

For the past year we have been looking into a number of original theories that appeared to have possibilities as a means of improving the cross sectional shapes of our sails. Through intensive research and experimentation, several of these theories have been substantiated, with the result that an entirely new series of sails for Lightnings has been created.

Tested in actual competition over a six week period, these new concepts in Lightning sails proved appreciably faster than our previous models; won three out of every four races in which they were tried.

Particular attention has been paid to the jib the most difficult problem of all when it comes to reproducing a design with exactness in the finished sail. A recent major break-through, however, provides a new method of calculating our cuts so that 100% accuracy is practically assured.

Entirely new, also, is a special Spherical Spinnaker for reaching. Somewhat flatter in shape, the new spinnaker supplements our standard combination Spherical Spinnaker and is intended for use on very close reaching legs when competition is really stiff.

#### DID YOU KNOW?





What then is the real strength of the Lightning Class? What is that special something that sets us apart, that makes us the successful class we are?








Statehood for Fleet #143 Oahu, Hawaii. Excellent barbour for championships. Average winds, 10-12 knots; average temperature 71%.





"Full Steam Alwad": Games Houston, Fleet Champion in Little Dearie, (Quachita Lightning Fleet #284.)




