

The District Championship was hosted by Columbia River Fleet 283 with the cooperation of Rose City Yacht Club, Portland,



Swanson had hopes of picking up all the chips by sailing the last leg out in the river but the wind also got to the leaders in time to permit them to finish with Jack.

Buffalo Yacht Club celebrated its 100th anniversary in the year 1960 and as part of its extended sailing program, hosted the Lake Brie Lightning District Regatta. The Point Abino station of the Yacht Club was the scene of the five race series held on August 12, 13, and 14. All races held in near perfect weather were sailed around a 10½-mile triangular course with the weather mark set by a course boat which went directly to windward of the

starting line at the five-minute gun.

The starting gun was answered by a fleet of 37 contenders. Tom Allen, our perennial winner, showed the fleet the way by rounding the weather mark first and never was headed. He was followed by Tom Fallon, then Allen Bernel. The second race was perhaps the most critical race of the series for both Tom's, Allen and Fallon. Fallon had worked out a lead of 100 yards over Bernel, his closest competitor. The leg was a broad reach and Fallon headed Flare for a marker that was upwind from the actual huoy and doused his spinnaker. By the time the crew noted it was the wrong mark, and the spinnaker went back up again. Bernel's Foamy had moved into the lead. 

District Report: The 11th year of activity of Finland District started on October 28, 1959, when the annual meeting was held in Helsinki. The previous commodore Raimo-R. Nordstrom was succeeded by Jukka Koskimies, whereas the secretary-treasurer Raimo Aromaa was re-elected. Erik Suni, Stig Wikman and Esko Linstrom were elected to hold other places of the district's admin-The annual meeting was followed by an informal session with films and a report by Raimo-R. Nordstrom and Raimo Aromaa about the participation in the European Championships at Anzio, Italy, on September 13 and 18.

During the sailing season the Lightning Class has shown great activity in many areas in Finland. Most fleets report of many races organized during the summer in their localities. Our District has also got one new fleet, No. 328, Jyvaskyla Fleet, which sails at Paijanne lake. We have about 60,000 lakes in Finland; big and small, but this is the first Lightning fleet which has been established on the lake area. However, we believe, that the en-thusiasm will spread quickly now that the start has been made.

The District Championship races were organized this year by acht club ONS and Loviisa Fleet (299) on August 3 and 7. Nineteen Lightnings from four fleets entered the races, which were perfectly organized, like always in Loviisa. During the series of five starts the weather was fine, light to moderate winds and cloudless skies. The District Championship was captured by previous champ, Raimo-Ragnar Nordstrom, sailing his fine boat, Katrina, with wife Lila and Ilmari Elo crewing. Nordstrom's victory was really overwhelming, he was first over the finish line in all the five races and thus collected 76 points. Runner-up was Raimo's brother, Veli-Ragnar Nordstrom, with "Sill-da-Capo," also with fine series of three seconds and two fourth positions and 70 points. Third was Veikko Larmia with his "Pepita," 69

pts.; all these three are from Loviisa Fleet. Fourth became the best visiting boat, "Kesaheila," Raimo Aromaa skippering, from Helsinki Fleet, with 67 pts.; fifth Pentti Helpio (Cinderella) from Loviisa fleet and sixth was Markku Paloma, young skipper from Oulu Fleet with his fine "Kikka," who had made the longest trip to the races from almost the northern end of Gulf of Bothnia. Then followed: Stig Haglund (Hurricane); Urho Liimatta (Diwa); Urpo Kurki (Suit-Sait); Aimo Hanninen (Marina); Erik Suni (Piraya); Paavo Manninen (Evy-Ann); Jukka Koskimies (Tuttemuj); A. Hyrsky (Dinorah); K. Blomster (Riitta); E. Gustavson (Sea-Hawk); E. Lindstrom (Susanna); H. Wasenius (Pinocchio); and W. Mosaleff (Vesijehu).

Several interfleet events within the District included the great Helsinki Regatta on July 2 and 10. Raimo Aromaa, with "Kesaheila," won all the regatta's five open races, but B-O: Owren with his "Speed VI" took regattas Rautavaara-Kacklund Trophy. Lightnings from Loviisa and Kotka Fleets participated in Eastern Finland Regatta where Veikko Larmias "Pepita" won the points

Raimo-R. Nordstrom from Loviisa Fleet and Stig Wikman from Helsinki Fleet participated in the Lightning Class Buropeon Championships in Lucerne, Switzerland. Nordstrom trailed his boat "Katrina" all the way to Lucerne and finished the races in the fifth place, despite the very unsteady and strange, at least for him, weather conditions. Our other representative, Stig Wikman, who participated with a borrowed boat, wasn't so lucky; he finished the races 15th.

Finland District organized Lightning departments in the Boat Shows at Helsinki and other yachting centers during the last winter and spring. The shows were greatly successful for our fine class and gave much information about the Lightning to the

people.

We are going to get at least 15-20 new Lightnings in our District for next season, and it seems that our fine yacht will be quite a popular sight in the races throughout the country after a

District Report: Amidst fog, protests, wholesale disqualifications and 20-25 mph. northerly winds, our sailing year began with the Sugar Bowl Regatta, January 2 & 3, 1960.

The story of the first race on Saturday, January 2, the race which didn't count, reads like a comedy. The Lightnings, one of 14 classes participating in the Sugar Bowl Regatta, sailed on New Orleans Yacht Club race course. The wind at the start was NE about eight mph. and visibility was less than a mile. Shortly after the start the fog closed in and visibility was less than 100 feet for the remainder of the race. All Lightnings overwood the first windward mark and spinnakers were nurriedly set for a run back towards the mark. All boats finally navigated (followed the preceding boat) around the first lap and began the second windward leg. This is where the real trouble began.

Tommy Allen in Ticonderoga navigated excellently and finished the round first, but he could not locate the committee boat at what should have been the finish line. Therefore, he anchored and set up a line and took the numbers and times of those Lightnings following him past the home buoy.

In the meantime, Lightnings were scattered for several miles in every direction. Some ended up near the Causeway (a 23 mile bridge across Lake Pontchartrain) which is west of NOYC's course; others ended up on Southern Yacht Club's race course which is east of the NOYC course.

The climax, however, was the predicament of the committee boat. It seems that after the first round the race committee aweighed anchor in order to move from one side of the home buoy to the other in order to set up a finish line. In so doing the committee lost the buoy in the fog, never to find it again that day, Finally, they cancelled the race. Fog continued the remainder of Saturday so all afternoon races were concelled.

Sunday morning, January 3, dawned clear and windy. As a result of the high wind and rough water a number of protests arose. Most occurred at the starting line with many skippers attempting to get windward at the gun. The first round spinnaker leg really provided a wild ride. However, the wind decreased during the second round to 15 mph. This resulted in excellent sailing conditions for the afternoon race. Bob Banck in Hi Yala, Francis Favaloro in Annie and Buck Ballatin in Shirley B. finished in three of the first four places but all were disqualified.

In New Orleans the racing Lightnings are dry-sailed from Eager Beaver Landing. This is an association formed jointly by members of Fleets 62 and 209, and its avowed purpose is to promote Lightnings and Lightning races. Each year the association sponsors two series. Eager Beaver Warm Up, sailed prior to tace week on the Gulfport and Eager Beaver Championship, sailed prior to the respective fleet Championship. This year both the Warm-Up and the Championship series were sailed at SYC.

The Eager Beaver Championship was sailed in moderate air except for two legs of the final race when a wind squall hit with gusts approaching 40-50 mph. This resulted in quite a wild ride for all boats, even those few that dropped sails. You know the competition is heated when only a few boats douse sail in 40-50 mph. gusts. The ability of the skippers and the condition of their boats cannot be praised too highly since no damage or difficulty resulted from this brief but severe wind squalf. There were 18 entries in the Eager Beaver Championship series with Tommy Allen in Ticonderoga finishing first followed by Buck Ballatin in Shirley B, Francis Favaloro in Annie, Gil Whitworth in Dutch and Jack Dane in Black Jack.

The final regatta of our sailing year is the Frost-Bit sponsored by Pass Christian Yacht Club. It was sailed December 3 and 4. Unfortunately this report must close on a sad note.

Ethan Allen of SYC, an avid Lightning sailor, died November 30, 1960. The Southern Lightning District, and the LCA lost a most enthusiastic member; a sailor who participated in Lightning activities with all the fervor of the rawest recruit, but who possessed the experience and ability to make a Lightning gothat very few of us ever attain.

Ethan, together with his wife, Lydia, crewed for his son, Tommy, in Ticonderoga. He was President of Eager Beaver Landing, the home of racing Lightnings in New Orleans, for several years.

Ethan Allen was a fiery competitor. On difficult problems confronting the Lightning members his position was always presented clearly and fairly. He stood up and was counted on all issues, dry land problems of administration or racing protests.

The Lightning Class has gone ahead in our District through the years and Ethan Allen has played a most prominent part,

We have lost a dedicated sailor,

We recommend Ethan to St. Peter as a spinnaker man of the finest quality.

One of the most consistent sailors in the Southern District is pictured together with his crew. Francis Favaloro is an electrical engineer employed by New Orleans Public Service and his crewmen, Thad Anderson and Millard Irion, are students at Louisiana State University.

For some years now Francis has been the Chief Measurer here in the New Orleans area for the Lightning Class. He built his boat, Annie 2363, more than a few years ago. So in addition to being an excellent sailor he is one of the few consistent winners that sail an old boat.

Francis Favaloro has some interesting ideas about the construc-tion, tuning and rigging of Lightnings. Being Chief Measurer, he is adamant on the idea that all Lightnings are built so closely alike that boats, new or old, present much the same contour to the water. Hence, upkeep and maintenance, not age determine the boat's maximum hull speed. His thoughts on tuning seem quite different from many others. He believes that most should be almost plumb; if the mast is raked it should be only so slight and it should be aft. The most important factor in boat speed is the setting of the sails. Francis has one suit of sails which he adjusts on the spars almost continuously by use of the out-haul and down-haul. His boat is rigged simply but soundly. Fittings are up-to-date but he does not experiment with any and all gadgets which appear on the market. He is sound in his sailing strategy, a hard competitor, and he is, above all, a fine yachtsman in the true sense of the word.
