The trouble with Lightning racing in these waters is that other skippers take it too seriously. In my case (I'm the guy who mishandles the tiller of "Barracuda"). I treat it like the easy-going sport it ought to be. I hardly think of it from the end of one season to the start of the next. Well, of course, I did send my crewman George Harrington to crew with our Club Champ at Quantico, to pick up a few pointers, and I crewed for Surf City Champ Howard Mullin in the Southern Circuit last winter to pick up his secrets, and I had my boat sort of fixed up at the Lippincotts' in the spring, but a guy has to do these things if he hopes to rise from the runner-up spot he has held in the fleet.

But who would have suspected that Club Champ Tom Coe would organize an "Early Bird" series in April at the Club, while I was still in Florida, and get his boat and crew tuned for the season? The guy won the Early Bird Series, too. I only wish

I could say it did him no good in the regular Club series, but I can't. He won the Championship again during the summer, plus the Sunday Series and Shakedown and Fourth of July races, helped by crewmen Fred Spaeth and Tim Slack. So in spite of work and planning I was runner-up again.

However, let's not take this runner-up thing lightly. There is a guy in our fleet named Joe Serrill, who used to be the nicest and most easy-going skipper you'd want to meet. He started getting serious this past summer, and all of a sudden there was the transom of his boat winking at me up ahead in lots of races, and we just inched him out in the series. The guy has a hideously old boat, too =7580—and it's just not right for him to get serious and do so well.

Luckily the Schmit family didn't race much this summer or they'd have been a problem. Bob and Pat Roth began racing for the first time, though, and now they're getting that maybe-we-ought-to-have-a-better-boat gleam in their eyes, so they've gone serious. And those nice O'Briens, who will start racing with us next summer, are already begunning to heat up their boat with racing gadgets. What I mean is, nobody stays a pigeon long enough. Then take the Kelly boat. It didn't cause any great trouble until the very last race, when all of a sudden three Kelly brothers got it moving and won the Labor Day race. Who can you trust to let you beat them, these days?

Then take our up-bay rivals, Surf City Yacht Club. They used to be, in the main, a relaxed bunch of guys, a pleasure to sail against in interclub races. But then Howard Mullin and John Sullivan and Dick O'Donnell bring hot boats into the Surf City fleet, and people like Doc and Helen Sullivan, and Ed Lavery and Jack Elfman turn into men-eating sharks (Sweeney and Stoneback never were easy to handle) and it takes all the lounge-chair ease out of racing against them. Surf City won its four-race series against us, but at least Tom Coe (and this is the one time I'm glad to have him around) upheld Brant Beach prestige by taking individual honors in the series, tieing for first in our Spring Regatta against hot Surf City opposition, and taking second in Surf City's Fall Regatta.

The way things are going, this tiller jockey is just going to have to resign himself to being in the tank in a lot of races. I hear a lot of scornful comments about guys going in the tank, but us Powells (my son Steve crews with me) do a lot of sailing in those waters, and you meet a slew of nice boats in the tank and have lovely shouting matches going around markers with them. Whereas those serious guys who are up front with their wind clear and nobody trying to luff them out of the Bay can't be having much fun at all. Might be a favor to them if we took things more seriously next season and got up there to show them how much they've been missing.



We had a long distance night race in which Paul Maddox started about 10 minutes late and proceeded to work through the


entire fleet to win handily.

In last years report we mentioned that we hoped to have 23 boats in Fleet 188 in 1960. The past year was even better than we had anticipated and we ended up the year with 24 Lightnings, with at least two new boats expected to join the fleet in the spring of 1963.

We added six boats to the fleet in 1960 and only lost one boat when Pip Nation was posted to Winnipeg, Manitoba by the army and took the Maple Leaf with him to sail on Lake Winnipeg.

Dave Quarterman and the Whiting boys both had a big season with their new boats. Dave beat the Whitings out for the Fleet Championship after a see-saw battle all season. Quarterman finished up our four regular championship series with a total of 219½ points and the Whiting boys amassed a total of 221½ points. A post season sailoff between the two boats ended up with Quarterman on top after five close races sailed in September winds gusting to 25.

During the past season we again split the fleet into "A" and "B" division. The "B" division championship trophy went to Digby McLaren whose total points in the four series was 100. His close rival during the season was Brian Laidlaw who ended the season with a total of 40 points.

On July 23 and 24 we held the fourth annual National Capital Lightning Championships at the BYC. The Rhodes Cup for the regatta champion went to Dave Quarterman, who sailed Bobolink to win over his nearest rival, Gordon Russell of RCYC of Toronto.

The Mistral Trophy for the 20 mile up river race to Pinney's Point and return went to Peter Whiting sailing Whitecap. This was the first race for the Whitings new boat and after the start she almost sailed out of sight, beating the Dragon class boats who started ahead of the Lightning Fleet.

Dave Quarterman made it twice in a row when he finished on top in our Saturday Series and won the Ogilvy trophy for the

second straight year.

The annual ladies series again proved to be one of the most interesting when six crews of ladies got out on Wednesday evenings and battled it out for the Lorelei Trophy. Elizabeth Buske sailed John Killicks "Madcap" to victory in this five race series.

Dave Quarterman again made it two in a row when he won The Blue-Belle trophy for the Spring Tune-up series for the second year. This series was sailed as a fall frost-bite series as the flood waters in the spring made it impossible to sail it when scheduled. The floods were so bad this spring that it was impossible to start sailing until the end of June. This made our short season really short this past year.

In August we sailed our overnight race to Constance Bay and return. A distance of some 18 or 20 miles up the Ottawa river on Saturday afternoon with the return leg sailed back to the club on Sunday. After a grueling race sailed mostly on a planing reach both up and down river, Quarterman again came out on top to win the Book Trophy.

After the first leg of the race we beached our boats and during the evening seventeen Lightning sailors and crew climbed aboard Dave Quarterman's boat and sang, drank ginger ale, etc. The only thing that kept the Bobolink from sinking was the fact that she was moored in only six inches of water.

The up-river race to Armitage Wharf for the Corinthian Trophy was won by newcomer Ossie Blouin who sailed his Mug to first place over the whole fleet.

The last up-river race of the season was sailed in September and was won by Peter Whiting who got the Queens Park Trophy

The last series of the season was held on the first weekend in October. This was our annual five race fall series for the Evans & Kert trophy. John Whiting sailed Whitecap to victory in the "A" division while John Reiffenstein brought the Sparrow in first in "B" division.



In November our annual Haul-Out Party was held at the fleet secretary's home where 40 members of the fleet gathered and made excuses for their poor performance over the past season and told us how much better they would all do in 1961.

The fleet planned regular monthly meetings during the winter and spring months. Most of the meetings were scheduled for the first Saturday of each month from January to May, and would be held in a different home each month. In this way the fleet is able to keep together during the off season and discuss plans for the coming sailing season, which we believe will be, by far, better than any in the past.

This year Fleet #216 tried racing in two fleets: boats numbering from #5000 upward in Fleet A and all others in Fleet B. It was strictly experimental but proved very satisfactory with fine competition in both fleets.

The July 30th Invitational Regatta was a hard-fought threetace series that saw Mooker capsize while reaching with his spinnaker in the river—claims he'll learn to use it come next season. The last race found Phillip Patterson and Wes Weidrick fighting for first place with Doc Murphy, Joe Dissette and Chuck Requadr in a tie for the third spot. But Herb Cox, although two points, down, sailed a brilliant race to earn third place. Final tally: Patterson, Weidrick and Cox for the A Fleet: Dembowski-Raeck, Reinhold and Johnson for the B Fleet.

Probably the most exciting race of the season was on August 4; the race started in light air but winds picked up so that the third leg was too dangerous for spinnakers. At the start of the second windward leg, gale-like winds caused the B Fleet and part of the A Fleet to call it quits. That leg was really a fight for survival, but the reach on the next leg was a real thril. All boars began planing immediately after rounding the mark and remained so the mile-and-a-quarter leg. Joe Dissette was our in front and sailing toward a well-deserved victory when, 100 yards from the finish, he broke his mast. The race ended with Patterson, first; Jim Ault, second, and Requadt third; these were the only boats to finish the race.

A scheduled August 28 race was cancelled because of heavy winds so that all boats would be in good shape for the Labor Day Regatta. But Thursday night tornado-like winds hit the Bay City area causing heavy demage. Our three "dry" sailors were almost eliminated from competition when the winds lifted their boats from the trailers, dropped Bob Drew's boat in the brush, and turning Patierson's and Requadt's boats completely over, resulting in broken, spars. But with an assist from Nickels & Holman and a borrowed spar, all were ready for the first race. After three days of beautiful sailing weather, the hardware went to Requadt, Patterson and Ault in the A Fleet and Dembowski-Raeck, Reinbold and Dave Beardsley in the B Fleet. These were the first races Beardsley had entered, and with Shirley at the tiller, they won the last race.




