Following this weekend series Sam Stowell, in his latest Yankee Dandee, 7, took charge and handily won the Summer Sunday Series, with Bedeke Bellerose second and Roger Keyes and Ralph Seeley tied for third.

Sam continued his winning ways taking the Fourth of July series with Dave Stagg second and Dr. Bellerose third. The last race was delayed due to high winds, with one boat going over as it left its mooring.

Due to a conflict in dates, the State of Vermont Championship was held August 27-28, rather than in September. We were happy to have four visiting boats from Lake Champlain and Lake Dunmore. Sam Stowell again showed us the way, followed by Bedeke Bellerose in second place and Dr. Seeley Estabrook, of Lake Dunmore, closing fast to take third and thereby taking the "Vermonts" to Lake Dunmore next season.

Our fleet championship climaxed the season over Labor Day weekend. Bedeke Bellerose and Sam Stowell were all tied up going into the final race which was a seat squirmer all the way. Dr. Bellerose passed Sam on the final spinnaker run to take his first fleet championship. Robinson Keyes, up with the leaders all the way in the final race, was third.

Sam Stowell represented the fleet well throughout New England, for in addition to winning the Vermont Championship; he was first in the New Hampshire regatta at Lake Spafford; third in the State of Maine, and third in the New England Championship.

Thus the two brand new boats in our fleet this year received their royal christening.

Thanks to the combined efforts of Marcy Lippincott and Dale Allen, the fleet now has a perpetual trophy for the club championship series in the form of a miniature naval canon. This series was won by Dale Allen in Jade, second was Don Mount and third was Charles Highsmith in Apple.

Our Annual Governor's Cup Regatta was held the end of June with 14 Lightnings participating. Saturday the wind was 35-40 and the races were cancelled. Sunday was a typical light air day and only one race was sailed. The Sidney Lopatin Perpetual trophy went to Dale Allen, Don Mount was second and Marcy Lippincott, third.

Our Summer Series ended up in an interesting tie for first place between Dale Allen and Nelson Hoffman. John Parker was second and Charles Highsmith was third.

Over Labor Day weekend, four boats from here went to the Red Dragon Regatta nine miles up the River. Three races were sailed in heavy air. Just after the start of the first race John Parker capsized and Nelson Hoffman broke rigging. They got themselves shipshape and sailed the last two races. Dale Allen took first place, John Parker second and Roy Doerre, third.

In spite of all the out of town regattas this fall, that were at-tended by our members, a Fall series was completed. Don Mount took first, Nelson Hoffman second, and Roy Doerre, third.

During the sailing season starting in April and ending in November, our boats traveled to Regattas at Brant Beach, Perth Amboy, Bay Head, Spray Beach, Surf City, Internationals at Tawas Bay, Washington D. C. and Quantico, Virginia. Two boats also attended the Southern Circuit in February.

Fleet meetings were held every other month during the win-ter to discuss racing rules, to make plans for the coming rucing season and to socialize. Plans are now in the making for a Fall Lightning Regatta. Hope to see lots of you then.



The Chinook Lightning Fleet did a lot of sailing that wasn't competitive, moonlight sailing cruises for example. These are scheduled when the moon is full. The night winds on the lake are usually ideal for lazy cruising.

Our new North West District Commodore, George Britton, welcomes everyone to our Memorial Day Regatta series and of course, to the Pacific Northwest District championship series which will be held on Fern Ridge Lake next year. So all you West Coast sailors, grease up those trailer wheels and get the Lightnings on the road to Fern Ridge Lake next summer.

the perpetual trophy which has been donated by Ken Ireland.

The competition for the top spots in the fleet was very keen with Ken Ireland, Warren Hyde, Bill Donovan, Charles Echeverria and the Flynn brothers always fighting for the places. Ken Ireland won out by 11/4 points at the end of the season.

In races outside the club our fleet participated in the "ECYRA", Governor's Cup, Long Island Championship, Atlantic Coast Championship, Cedar Point Invitation, Nyatic Early Bird Series and The Conn-RI Districts. A fair amount of hardware was brought home from these various events.

On the domestic side, we constructed a third hoist (electric) which will reduce the mad rush of getting boats in and out before and after races. We made a donation as a fleet to the Coast Guard Auxiliary which patrols all the boating activity at Milford and adds much to everyone's peace of mind during rough weather races.

This year we had 12 boats in regular competition and are looking forward to greater participation next year with everyone keeping an eye on Harrie Patrick and his new boat-#7520which finished third in the 1960 Internationals.



on the starting line.



Harry Parker from second-place, won by his wife, Woofie, and third place Jack Burwell. The Junior Regatta honors fell in order to Ann Gordon, Hank Parker, and Barbara Fulle.






