



Earl Ross won this series but these evenings were notable for a relaxed kind of sailing, a trading of boats and equipment, and provided a general comparator for the more serious weekend racing ..., a great idea.

In one of the Ding Dong races Earl Ross and Don LaCross performed the impossible by both converging on starboard tack and beautifully locking masts. Don's proved to be the stronger and Uncle Earl promptly got a new one which only made him more faster. Never again the twain shall meet.

On May 7, eleven boats answered the starting gun aboard the Buffalo Canoe Club "Burgee" to start the first race of a memorable 1961 season that saw a very active Fleet 12,

The races at home on Abino Bay were highly contested, and most of the silverware was dispersed to skippers throughout the Fleet other than the perennial top five. Away from home our sailors performed exceptionally well at regattas stretching from the Niagara Frontier, to the waters of Mission Bay on the West Coast and to Long Island Sound on the East Coast.

Tom Allen, the Lake Erie sailing prodigy, started the season late with his homemade Lightning, Atom II, #7811, but finished strong by winning the Fleet Championship for the 4th consecutive year, the North American Championship, the only three-time winner, and the World's Championship at Milford.

Following Allen to the North American Championship by way of qualifying in the Lake Erie District's, were Karl Smither, Bernel, Tom Fallon and Bill Hughes, who, all except our L.C.A. President, Tom Fallon, trailed their boats and families overland to Mission Bay. In the North American, which Allen won, fellow Canoe Clubbers, Smither and Bernel, finished 3rd and 8th, while for the President's Trophy, consistant Bill Hughes gained a 4th, one behind Tom Fallon in a chartered boat.

The upset of the year was pulled off by sailing sensation, Al Bernel, in the Lake Erie District Championship, when he won the series and cut defending champ. Tom Allen's consecutive victories at eight. Al Bernel did well in the World's Champion-ship, finishing 6th behind winner Tom Allen. In the same series veteran skipper, Karl Smither placed 12th and Tom Fallon 13th.

The Niagara Frontier Invitational saw 32 boats start in fresh

to strong winds which caused the cancellation of two races and many damaged and overturned boats. Bill Heausler's Cajun broke its mast by locking spars with a heavier International 21 while over Stu Anderson with Jack Swanson 3rd, Bill Hughes 4th and Karl Smither 5th.

This summer the races were harder to win in Fleet 12 because of the competition furnished by improved sailors, Paul Stievater, Bob Adams, Towny Wilson, Jack "Doc" Hylant, Bud Sloan, Ed Rose berry and Bill Heausler. Bud Sloan, made an excellent showing in his "old" boat, "Linament", #397, and forced many of the more experienced sailors to sail a little harder.

Two new gold platers, besides Allen's Atom II, were added to the Fleet, Ed Roseberry's Berry, #7815, and Bill Heausler's Cajun, #7819. Irish Tom Fallon returned from the World's Champion-ship with a new, black hulled, Saybrook Lightning which he promptly painted green and re-named Flare II.







Fleet 20 started the 1961 season with a heavy heart, having lost its finest sailor in June of this year. Johnny Primach collapsed after his first race of the season, and died a week later. He was the moving force behind Lightning sailing at the Michigan City Yacht Club and until 1959, at the Gary Boat Club. Johnny started his sailing years back in a Snipe and was one of the first of the Lightning sailors at Gary. He nursed a growing fleet along at Burns Ditch, and spent many hours fighting sandbars, and low water, and balky race committees. When suddenly in 1959 the steel industry forced the sailors out of these waters, he and the sailors from fleet 222 moved to Michigan City to join fleet 20.

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
