


We have completed a very busy season at Sandy Beach Yacht Club, sailing five series, plus the Lightning Champion series.

the Consollation Division.



Immediately thereafter, he capsized and washed up on the lee shore. Luckily no damage was done although the boat took a pounding and the race committee postponed the afternoon race, so he got back in the act on Sunday and walked off with the big prize deservedly.


On Memorial Day itself, the Fleet Handicap race was a beaut. A gusty Northwester, blowing better than 20 knots, had the five competitors who braved it planing, with or without spinnakers, most of the way across both Huntington and Northport Bays for one of those fantastic rides that are just about the most thrilling in Lightning sailing. Meehan, planing along on a close spinnaker reach hot in pursuit of the two scratch boats, flipped for the second time in four days in a terrific gust and Harry Iurka was so intent on standing off John Porterfield at the finish that he carried his chute across the line which was set very close to the lee shore. As a result, after having gotten the gun, he had the choice of planing right up onto the beach or going over. Choosing the lesser evil, he flipped in full view of Dave Gebhard who shot the remarkable sequence pictures shown elsewhere in this issue. Porterfield was second and big Bill Moss third.

Then came regular Sunday races which Ed Perry won with disheartening consistency until mid-August, with Meehan, Bill Moss III, and Sherwood fighting it out pretty much for second in the fleet. Centerport Yacht Club's Fourth of July Regatta went to Ed with Sherwood second and Meehan third. Ladies Day was taken as usual by Ardith Perry (Yes, the Perrys are hard to bear) with Bonnie Byers second and Sue Sherwood third. Big Bill Moss finally won a special regatta after six years by taking the Northport Yacht Club's Labor Day Series with Perry second and A. O. Powell third. This wound up the regular season with Perry comfortably on top as Fleet Champion, Bill Moss III second, and Bob Sherwood, who closed fast, third. The "Under 5000" contest went to Sherwood with Porterfield second and our most persistent competitor, Al Davison, third. Chuck Moss took the fleet Transom Trophy with Holoson. Tri-Club honors went to Bill Moss III, fid Perry, and Jim Meehan respectively.

District competition was not very successful for the fleet although Sherwood won the Commodore's Cup at Port Washington. Hurricane Esther put a damper on the Fleet 98 Fourth Ainnual Invitational September 16 and 17 by hitting the area during the week preceding with the result that only three outside boats competed and several of the local boats were laid up. However, those that competed had a good time and Perry won the Wally Ross Trophy again with Art Buhr of Fleet 133 second and Meehan third.

Ed and Ardie Perry put in a lot of work on the World's Championship at Milford acting as a welcoming committee for the overseas visitors and Ed loaned his boat and crewed in another so it was a busy week.

All in all it was a good season with close competition, good sportsmanship, and few protests. With new boats and new faces the 1962 season for Fleet 98 should be the best yet.

Dr. Buzby then entertained at a gala midnight swimming party where, as the host was unceremoniously dunked, the sails were lowered for another happy season.



We managed to get the movies from Tawas Bay National Championship, and everyone enjoyed the exciting racing and also the good sound and background music.


During the last season Fleet 104 lost a few boats but has replaced them with some new members. Hope they will come out for our Sunday races and add to our competition next season.




