While all our "hot shots" were doing very well at the out-oftown regattas, the ever popular Hank Handy walked away with the fleet championship.



The 1961 season was by far the most active and successful for Fleet 126 to date. Our roster, which saw 3 boats added in 1960, was increased by 5 more this year; so we now have a total of 18 Lightnings, most of which were in active competition this season.

Pre-season activity began in the late Spring with a series of four clinics devoted to racing tactics, rules and "go-fast" tips. This skull practice was conducted by Ted Fontelieu, nationally known one-design skipper, and while open to owners and skippers of all classes was directed to and heavily attended by our fleet members. Competition began officially Decoration Day weekend with the Vice Commodore's Cup Regata which was appropriately won in three straight firsts by Vice Commodore H. B. Sprague. Weekly races were held each Saturday and Sunday until Libor Day with the Sunday event held jointly with our neighbors, Fleet 153 of Pequot Yacht Club, Southport, Conn. Our July 4th weekend Commodore's Cup Regatat was won by Bob Jicks by a narrow ¹/₄ point matgin over Gay Land. The Labor Day three race regata for the Rear Commodore's Cup was taken by H. B. "Banny" Sprague

Season's championship honors went jointly to Sprague and Ficks, co-owners and skippers of #7337 "Whiskaway," who sailed her alternately and were consistently up front. A close second for season award went to Jim Allen in #7050 "Lil' Dude." September 16th and 17th, Fleet 126 held its second annual Lightning Invitational. Right on the heels of the World's Chimyonship as Mulford

September 16th and 17th, Fleet 126 held its second annual Lightning Invitational. Right on the heels of the World's Chimpionship at Milford came some of the finest sailing weather of the year and we played host to nearly 30 boats from both sides of Long Island Sound. Winner was Don McNair of Manhaiset, followed by Dave Sinclair of Noroton and Walter Hansen of Noroton. Up to the last race our local honor was being upheld by Bob Ficks who had a first, fifth, and second in "Whiskaway" but was disqualified in the closing race on a barging foul. Our entry list was double the size of the previous year and we look for an even bigget timout in 1962 when we don't have to compete with a World's Championship.

In November, three of our skippers risked life, limb and rigging to compete in the 96 boat free-for-all at Quantico. Banny Sprague in "Whiskaway" managed a 23rd, a 9th and a 5th for eight place overall in the series. (Imagine coming home to report you beat 88 boats and still wound up in 8th place!) Jim Allen in 'Lil' Dude" and Larry Brundred in "Panby" also made the trip but had hard luck by way of gear breakdown and a collision with the rule book.

Frost-bite racing began at Cedar Point in mid-November, and a number of our Lightning skippers are keeping their hands in and polishing their tactics. Next season, with indications of several more additions to the fleet and a high enthusiasm and interest, promises to be Fleet 126's best yet.

Our fleet has enjoyed another season of fine racing. In fact, for some of our more avid members the season is not over even yet. Frostbiting on Sunday afternoons continues into December.

The boating season opened in Seattle on the morning of April 29th with a parade of boats through the ship channel from Portage Bay to Lake Washington. That afternoon the first sailing races were held and from then on through the 32 scheduled races competition among Lightning sailors was extremely keen with 15 to 20 boats competing in each race. Ken Brostrom and Cappy Clarke again made it a close race for Fleet Overall Champion. Each had the same number of firsts, seconds, thirds, fourths, sixths and ninths. It was a DNF and a DNS of Cappy's which gave Ken the edge.

The Spring and Summer series of races on Wednesday evenings were again very popular with Ken and Cappy splitting the honours in characteristic fashion-Cappy placing first in the Spring series and Ken in the Summer. Other Corinthian Yacht Club races, Fleet Championships and Fall series were won by Cappy Clarke and Bill Davies respectively. Our Predistrict series was won by Rae Ellen Ramey sailing Bob Clark's #7975. Bill Elfen-dahl was the recipient of our new perpetual "Transom Trophy". This is awarded to the boat finishing last most often and is appropriately labeled "Ascend"

Trailering was popular this year with many boats attending out of town regattas. Trips to Eugene, Oregon were made on two occasions—for the Memorial Day Regatta and the Northwest Districts. District Champion this year is Ken Brostrom. Dave and Jean Gosse journeyed to San Diego and took part in the President's Cup race. Bob and Coral Clark were on hand to see the performance of their fiberglass boar #7975 skippered by Jack Swanson. It placed 16th in the North American Championships. Clarke fiberglass boats now number five in our fleet. An October weekend in Vancouver, sailing with Fleet 90 was the highlight of our out of town races. Adrian Thomson took the first position for Vancouver and Bill Davies saved the honour of fleet 132 by capturing third.

Under the direction of Marge and Joe Guthrie, the fleet sponsored sailing classes for teenagers. Lessons were initiated on a small scale with a Mariner Scout Troop. The girls proved to be very onthusiastic and eager sailors and the experiment was considered a success. We expect to continue the courses next year.

The 1961 season was dominated by the joint owner boats. Our fleet championship was won by Wally Crump and Bill Howe, the skipper/owners of Caprice #6346. The runner-up boat, Spitfire #7806, was skippered by Dave Sinclair, his wife Sue, and Sue's brother, Tony Widmann. In third place was a father and son team, Bob and Jim Crane, in Jimlin IV. Regardless of the wind conditions or which skipper was at the helm, these three boats were right at the top of the fleet in every race.

To add to the interest and competition, we broke the season into three stories with each series roughly comparable to the calendar months of June, July, and August. Thirty-one races were held in all, including the three "Commodores" races which did not count in the season's standings.

The June series of ten races was won by Bob and and Jim Grane with the Sinclair/Widmann boat second and Crump/Howe third. The July series of nine races was captured by Sinclair. Widmann with Crump/Howe second, and Walter Hanson third. It was the August series of nine races that decided the season championship. Wally Crump and Bill Howe dominated this series and in so doing, picked up enough points to edge the Sinclair/ Widmann boat for the season championship. These two boats were in a virtual tie going into the last race. Each needed only to beat the other to gain the championship. The rest of the fleet looked forward to a terrific match race, and nearly the entire fleet was on hand to watch. Unfortunately, Mother Nature didn't cooperate, and the drifting match that ensued proved to be a disappointment to all but the winner.

Last year's prediction that the Noroton Junior Yacht Club would be an important factor in Long Island racing in 1961 was well founded. The Noroton Juniors dominated every regatta they entered. Jimmy Crane won the junior Lightning competition at Larchmont Race Week. He accomplished this even though he skipped the last race so that he could sail with his father in the Connecticut-Rhode Island Districts. Incidentally, Jimmy and his father proceeded to take second place in the Districts !!! Lester Abberly was the Noroton representative in the Sears Cup competition for the North American Junior Championship. Lester and his crew of Ted King and Harold Scott had no serious trouble with the eliminations which were sailed in Lightnings and went into the finish at Fort Lauderdale hoping to follow in the footsteps of Kevin Jaffe who won the Sears trophy for Noroton in 1958. The adjustment from Lightnings to Thistles proved to be a difficult one, and they were unable to achieve their objective. Regardless of the outcome, Noroton was extremely proud to have again placed a candidate in the eight boat Sears final. Kate Morgan proved that the girls were a factor to be reckoned with by coming within one half point of winning the Long Island Junior Girls Championship.

Noroton was again host to the Long Island Sound Championship and placed each of its four qualifiers in the top ten. Jimmy Crane finished second, Walt Hanson fifth, Tony Widmann seventh, and Bill Howe ninth in a fleet of thirty top boats. In other "outside" competition, Noroton did equally well. In the Cedar Point Invitational, Dave Sinclair took second place one point behind the winner, with Walt Hanson taking a close third. Bob Crane futher distinguished himself by placing second in the North American Lightning Championship at Mission Bay, Califormia.

As we look forward to next summer, we see even tougher competition, with the return of Bob Bavier and the prospect of several new boats.



We are still looking forward to hosting the 1963 World Championship Series here in Kaneohe Bay. 'Tis the best sailing in the world!!!!





This year has been expecially interesting for Lightning skippers on the West Coast, with the North American Championships providing the pleasant and stimulating opportunity to meet and race with Lightning members from east of the Rockies. We are looking forward to another exciting season in 1962 under Al Ziengenfuss, our newly elected fleet captain.




Howard Macken and crew in "Panique" leaving dock for start of race



LOVE LETTER TO FLEET 173

Dear Fellow Sailors:

In leaving the fleet after eight years, I am going to miss so many things that, if I asked a Univac to count them up, it would probably blow its tubes.

This has been a good fleet to sail in. If I were trying to get another skipper to join the fleet, I'd say, "Of course you want competition. Everybody who races Lightnings is out for blood, not just for a pleasant sail. You can get all you want in Fleet 173. If you're hot, you can yell for buoy room from our fleet champion, Tom Coe, one of the finest small-boat skippers in the country. If you're just getting started, we have other new skippers, and you'll spend all summer reading the names on their transoms unless you sail as hard as they do.

"But competition is the easiest thing to get in small-boat racing. You ought to hope for friendship, and for a helping hand and advice if you need it. Fleet 173 is a friendly bunch, for all its hard racing. I can't remember any periods of bickering. There hasn't been a boat-against-boat protest in years; when a foul happens, the offending skipper drops out and notifies the Race Committee. Other skippers will give you all the help you want, sometimes to their sotrow. I remember giving young Tom Kelly some tactical advice once, and in the next race found him clamped onto me like a pilot fish, practicing the lesson. Last season Tom Coe found me a little harder to handle after giving mie a tip on the setting of my single-sheet jib leads.

"You ought to look for a growing fleet, and 173 is growing. Eleven boats raced in 1961, a jump of three from the previous year. Next year at least two more boats will join the fleet.

"There's something else you can get out of racing with any good Lightning Fleet. Lightning racing here has been good for the men and women and boys and girls who took part in it. It has helped turn boys into men. It has knit families closer. It has helped smooth out business cares, and sent men back to work with renewed spirit and energy.

"These are the things Fleet 173 can offer you."

The records for the past season show that there is reason to congratulate every skipper. Tom Coe won the championship for the fifth straight year, placed second in our Spring Regatta, third in the New Jersey State Championship, first in our Fourth of July and Labor Day Races, second in the Sunday Series, and led our fleet to its first interclub victory over Surf City. Joe Serill climaxed his long love affair with old 580 by sailing it to runnerup for the title, and then bought your scribe's 5837, "Barracuda," to sail next season. "Barracuda" was third for the title, first in the Sunday Series, and second in the two trophy races.

The Coe-Serrill-Powell trio that dominated fleet racing in recent years would be in danger next year even if your scribe weren't leaving. Anybody who saw the grin on Bob Roth's face, as he swept across the line third in the Labor Day race, would realize that changes are coming. The Galloway boys placed well several times. And Doss Struse, in his first year at a Lightning tiller, beat every skipper in the fleet at least once. The Schmits keep on improving. It gave this old salt a thrill to see Don and Nan O'Brien flying their spinnaker last season for the first time, and to see the Kelly boat out again with that masterly Jack Kelly touch on the tiller. Look out for Doctor Hedges next year; in his first race, on Labor Day, he beat two boats. And, of course, keep an eye on John Hay, who will return to Lightning racing next season after buying Joe Serrill's 580. I remember the battles I had with him when he raced the "Bandir", four seasons ago.

As I say, I'll miss all of you, and when I get up north next summer, I'll hardly know who to cheer for. Meanwhile shed a tear for me, racing in Florida's Fort Myers in a fleet that has no Lightnings. I guarantee to get another Lightning and help start a Fort Myers fleet if some of you will move down.
