


In the second division, Fred Tim (2923) won first place for the second year, with Art Wade (2840) second and Dave Duhme (2924) third.




One year ago fleet 206 had only a few boats well conditioned and in activity. Today there are 14 first line boats that have done the considerable number of 60 races in this short meantime.



The Bay even got in the last laugh by giving the District Champ, Herm Nickles a little "Sunday afternoon bath" before he made it back to port.

The great success could not have been possible without the wives, who prepared the wonderful lunches, the Local 110 Fleet, who made up the race committee, and the local powerboat owners who made sure that anyone who wanted to watch the races received front row seats. To these people goes the fleet's warmest "Thank You".

To top all of this excitement, a great series of eighteen races was run during the regular season. Again two classes were raced, giving good competition in both the newer "A" boats and the older "B" boats. In the season's first regatta, Jim Ault took home the "A" hardware and the honors in "B" went to Huey Dembowski and Carl Raeck.

Enjoying the weather, a large turnout battled in the July 4 Regatta. In Class B action, Tom Wisniewski took too honors, followed by Harry Hooker and Carl Raeck & Hu Dembrowski.

Tuning for the districts, Ault, Dissette and Patterson came up

for the "A" trophies in that order in the Bay City Yacht Club Regatta. At the end of three close races in B, the Wisniewskis edged out Hooker and Fred Reinbold for top spot. Jerry Wing became the season's first mishap when he was dunked into the Bay waters, and without this heavyweight crew, Gordy was forced to pull out of the race.

In other regattas, Bob Drew and Dissette competed at Traverse City with Joe bringing home the fourth place hardware. He also represented our fleet at the Pontiac Invitational. In addition to all this racing, our skippers also sponsored the Pram Racing program for the young "luffers".

Two new 8000 series boats will be on hand for next year, their happy skippers being Sherm O'Dell and Jim Johnson. Sherm tried his out this fall and promptly flipped it. Showing true Saginaw Bay enthusiasm, he was out again within two hours. With spirit like this, how can we fail to have another wonderful season next year?


