
In our districts, Warren Hyde led the pack through most of one race in the light air which is his specialty. He finally finished third in that race and 9th over all.







Elzet champion V. Pallavicini with Lightning "Nunola"



Overcome with grief and sorrow the fleet activities were tem-porarily suspended and when they were re-initiated the sudden decease of its Captain, and also Vice Commodore of the Guayaquil Yacht Club, Mr. Emilio Estrada Y., again brought grief and sorrow as he was an excellent friend and sportsman whose loss will long be felt.

Ecuador, with a crew formed by Fleet 272 members Humberto Plaza, Captain and Luis and Francisco Sola, showed its colors during the recent World's Championship held in Milford, Conn.

Our team, one of the youngest among the participants, put on a good show, winning one race, finishing another in spite of losing its rudder and placing 9th in the final standing.

Preparations are now being made to enter three crews in the forthcoming VIII South American Championship scheduled to be held in January 1962 in Ancon Bay, near Callao, Peru.

the top three places.




The Argonaut Fleet is affiliated with the Volos Yacht Club and all the boats belong to the Club for the use of its members.


