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

This past season saw much improvement in tactics and technique, and the Fleet showed a very healthy growth. It is anticipated that the 1963 season will be even bettet.







This trophy is given to the winner in that class who has the highest number of boats finishing this race. It is the first time


that the Lightning Class has won this trophy






Rudolf Herzog, with his Lightning 7804, represented the fleet again in October at the Greifensee where he won the six race competition.
