





1964 has been a year of intense activity for Fleet 272. Early in January it moved some 90 miles, from its center of activities in Guayaquil, to Salinas which is situated on the shores of an ample bay on the westernmost tip of the southern hemisphere.

The move was made to prepare the site for the X South American Lightning Class Championship that was scheduled for March 6-15, and had been chosen for this event because it offers ideal conditions for competitive sailing: wide, protected, steady winds and minimal currents.

During January and February we held a series of races to select the teams that would represent Ecuador, with the enviable honors going to:

With everything ready the X Championship got under way with the attendance of Argentina, Chile, Colombia and Peru, and when it was over Fleet 272 was proud to have among its members the new South American Champion Santiago Maspons (#7811) who was ably assisted by Antonio Pino and Horacio Feraud.

With a few weeks of beach season remaining after the championship a series of friendly races were held with Carlos Lecaro (#8239) adding up the most points.

The Fleet returned in May to its base in Guayaquil and the boats were gone over while waiting for the summer winds to start, and when these appeared in July and August, a series of preparatory races were held on the Guayas River with Carlos Lecaro again leading the pack.

During September and October Fleet 272 sailed the series for the Annual Cup put up by the Guayaquil Yacht Club. Lorenzo Tous (#7811) took it, with Carlos Lecaro (#8239) and Humberto Diminich (#5859) collecting the hardware for second and third places. The race held on October 19 had the added attraction in that the winning team would have its name inscribed on a plaque fixed to a special trophy exhibited in the Yacht Club. This honor went to Eduardo Rodriguez (#5970) and his crew consisting of Naval Ensign Alfonso Pinto and Julian Tanca.

Lorenzo Tous (#7811) put up a cup that was sailed for during the final series of the year and it went to Carlos Lecaro (#8239) who did some good sailing throughout the year. During one of the races of this series Fleet 272 experienced the only accident of the year when the boats of Lorenzo Tous and a boat sailed by a naval team collided, both being dismasted.

Next February Fleet 272 will again move to Salinas to sail the series that will determine the teams to represent Ecuador in the XI South American Championship that Uruguay will hold in April, 1965.

This is going to be the start of what promises to be another year of intense activity. Several newcomers are learning the ropes with enthusiasm and new boats are being built by Humberto Diminich for Werner Moeller and Oscar Bjarner.


The annual meeting of Finland District at November 7th 1963 started an active season for the District. At the meeting Mr, Esko Lindstrom was elected Commodore and Raimo Aromaa as Secretary/Treasurer and other posts of the District administration were filled by Terho Aromaa, Aimo Hanninen and Bjorn-Ole Owren. This team has led the District through the season successfully, and some previous seasons, too, as can he seen by the increased number of boats in several fleets and also in several parts of Finland where there has not been any sailing activity before.

During the off-sailing season our District has participated actively in many Boat Shows in different parts of Finland. Biggest of them was in Helsinki, where our District had a Lightning on a display and an information booth besides, which got quite a lot of even international publicity as can be read in the September 1964 issue of "Lightning Flashes" (page eight), and an August issue of Australian Yachting magazine "Power Boat and Yachting". We have also given the Swedes some Lightning knowledge at the Stockholm Boat Show, and with an article in the Swedish Yachting magazine "Till Rors". We dearly hope that our western neighbours in Sweden and Norway will notice the merits of a Lightning so that we may get more international racing contacts. Our previous year's Champion Terho Aromaa was, however, just able to retain his title as he beat his most dangerous rival Heikki Alho with one point. Third was a real "black horse", the youngest skipper of the races, Fleet 328's Ilkka Lilja, who sailed a very fine and courageous seties and beat many "old salts" of our Lightning class. He was not too successful, finishing 26th of the 36 participants, but was satisfied with the opportunity to race with Canadian and U.S. Lightning sailors.

There has been quite a lot of big regattas in the Finland District during the season. The biggest have naturally been in Helsinki area, but also other fleets have had their share of big racing in their local waters, as can be seen in the various fleet reports.

The Helsinki Fleet has taken things a little more slowly than in the previous season, for reasons that are difficult to define. Racing activity has declined a bit compared with some earlier summers, even though our boats have really raced in about 50 races in the Helsinki area, and have visited in other towns even in Switzerland, and one of our members even in Canada and U.S.A. There have been fewer boats in the local races but they have been quite "high-classed" and given a keen competition for each other. We have gained three new boats in our Fleet: #8658, 8994 and 9166, but have lost several older boats, and a couple of fine racers also, so that our Fleet's boat list is a little shorter than in the previous year.

During the snow season our fleet held some informal meetings in which our best skippers gave lectures on the racing-rules, tactics, safety at sea, etc. Our Fleet members also participated actively in the Helsinki Boat Show, where they built the Lightning Information Department, provided a Lightning for the show, and acted as guides and informants at the Lightning department. We do not include any photos of the Boat Show here, as one of the photos was published in "Flashes" recently, and that same photo was also published in the Australian "Power Boat and Yachting" magazine. Lightning-internationality does get around.

The biggest racing events for Lightnings in the Helsinki area have been the Fleet Championships with 18 participants, the Helsinki Regatta with 9 Lightnings and Elimination Series for the European Championship with 9 boats. Terho Aromaa, with his "Masi" has won almost everything, except the Helsinki Regatta's "Koristo-Westerholm Trophy" which was won by his older brother Raimo Aromaa with "Tuuletar."

Terho Aromaa, with Ilpo Halva and Markku Aromaa crewing was the only Finnish participant in the European Championship at Neuchatel, Switzerland. They sailed a very fine series in the weak, unsteady winds and a very hot weather and finished seventh of the 41 participants.


Six Helsinki Fleet Lightnings went to the District Championship which was held at Lahti at the end of July and first days of August. Terho Aromaa returned from Switzerland just in time to defend his previous year's Championship title and did that successfully. He had to fight in earnest as another fleet member, Heikki Alho with "Vib" gave him quite a scare and was only one point behind at the end of the series. Our other members were: fifth Aimo Hanninen in brand-new "Marina II", sixth Leif Haglund in "Ariana", ninth Raimo Aromaa in "Tuuletar" and tenth Paave Manninen in "Tiwa". Our Esko Lindstrom participated in the open Canadian Lightning Championship at Hamilton, Ontario. He did not have his own boat, and not even his own crew. He finished 26th of the 36 participants. Esko participated also in a race at the Long Island Yacht Club with a Lightning which was generously loaned to him by Temple Robinson of Great South Bay Fleet. He finished there in about the middle of the list, but was very happy for the opportunity to race in American waters.

The Helsinki Fleet Championship was held the first weekend of September. The Fleet had again been divided in two groups, A-Group consisting of active racing skippers and boats and B-Group as a "Beginners Group", for skippers, crews and boats which had not participated in the open races. The A-Group had 10 participants, one of which was from Lahti Fleet (349) who did come to try his skills against us. He did well as he finished second in the series. B-Group had eight boats with tight competition. The Group Trophy had to be given by a toss of the cc in, when the two best boats had the same points and same finishes us the two completed heats. We could sail only two heats as the wind died. This was the first time in the season that a race had to be abandoned.

Pori Lightning Fleet has enjoyed a fine growth in the two past seasons. Three years ago our Fleet had 4 or 5 old boats which did not race or have any other activity. 

During the past season our Fleet had another Team Race. We sailed against Lahti Fleez's (349) team on their beautiful waters at the southern part of Lake Paijanne. The race, which was held for the second time this year, was again very tight, as our Fleet's team won it with only two points. Well, last time we won with only one point, so that it seems that we are improving. On our home waters our Fleet has been divided in the Fleet Series Races in two groups: A-Group consists the boars under 400 kg (= 830 lbs.) and B-Group boats over 400 kiles. Best in the series, where points were counted for the whole season's results, were in A-Group: first, Ilkka Lilja, "Nina", 50 points; second Veikko Miettinen, "Katrina", 45 points; third, Martti Nurminen. 


