the chance to make new ones.


Our Champagne Regatta is an intramural event in which the fleet is divided into two teams. This team type race always proves to be one of the season's best. Instant and extreme loyalties are formed for fellow team members and it's all very strange, very vocal and very competitive. This year would have been the 4th annual contest but we were blown out. Undaunted, we had a tug-o-war to divide the spoils and went on to have an amusing afternoon and evening at the club.

Our club races are divided into five series which are designed to adapt to the varied schedules of our racers. Our "Early Bird" is a 4 to 5 race series held in late May which is primarily intended to shake down the boats and to clear the ice from the area. The Buffalo Canoe Club maintains a very intensive sailing schedule starting as soon as the Lake Erie ice breaks up (about May 1st) and ending in the middle of September. We race every Saturday and Sunday and on Wednesday evenings during June and July. In addition, an active program from junior Lightning sailors during July and August is carried on. Our Lightning fleet enjoys all season the smoothly operating and extremely competent race committee organization which was in evidence during the North American Championships and about which so many visiting sailors complimented the club. The effectiveness of this race committee is due to a large group of club members, both sailors and power boaters, who enthusiastically give time to this part of the sailing program.

World Lightning Class Champion, Tom Allen, won the Canadian Open Lightning Championship at Port Arthur, Ontario, the Lake Erie District Championship and the Harvest Regatta at Silver Lake Yacht Club. Ed Roseberry, our fleet captain, won the annual Haul-out Regatta at Sandy Beach.

Ken Seubert, Dick Dangl, and George Spitzmiller joined the fleet this season. Ken bought a new Allen fiberglass boat and was racing it for the second time on a rather blowy day when he was port-tacked by a 30' Knarr. The Lightning, unfortunately, received the worst of this encounter.

Two Lightning families dominated the racing season at our club this season. Anne Allen, in addition to crewing admirably for her husband, is a top skipper in her own right; she won the Mother Carey Series for lady skippers. Anne's husband won the Maccubbin Series, and her father, Karl Smither, won both the

Coleman and Fleer 12 Series. Dr. Bergantz's three sons, Bill (age 19), George (age 17) and Jimmy (age 14), sailed together in every race, taking turns skippering. Bill skippered in the senior races and won the club championship and the A Skippers Series. George and Jimmy alternated as skipper in the junior races, both winning a series. Jim also skippered and won the Wednesday evening series. It was Bill's turn to skipper in the North Americans and he placed sixth in the first flight. These boys are not a weighty crew and many of our visiting sailors during the North Americans no doubt noticed, during heavy weather, the agility with which they could get further away from the center line of their boat than most other crews.

Of the twelve boats from the Lake Eric District qualifying for the North Americans, we sent Tom Allen (1965 Champion), Bill Bergantz, Tom Fallon, Curt Montgomery, Ed Roseberry, Jr., and Karl Smither. All the sailors of Fleet 12 enjoyed hosting the North Americans. There was tremendous interest in the series, attested to by the large number of spectator boats, particularly for the fifth race on Saturday. It seemed that everything in the club that floated, including a sailfish, was at the finish line.

During the season we enjoy some fun races and of these the race to Port Colborne is the best. We race along the coast of the lake for about 10 miles and then have a clambake on a breakwater about a mile off Port Colborne. This year, after the feast, some of the more venturesome boats tacked down the Welland Canal but were stopped when they could not clear a low bridge. The bridge tender absolutely refused to raise his bridge in spite of loud imprecations about freedom of passage, etc.

The club hosted the annual Niagara Frontier Invitational Regatta in June and Stu Anderson of the Niagara Sailing Club won the Lightning crown. Tom Allen, Bill Bergantz and Karl Smither took 2nd, 3rd, and 4th places respectively. Bruce Goldsmith and Jay Doty from Chicago also competed in this regatta. Both their boats and that of Tom Allen had been completed only a scant 12 hours prior to the first race.




