McKinley continued his pace the next week at the Michigan Districts, but lost the Championship by one point. Cameron ended 4th, Schreck was 6th and defending Champ Demarest discovered that it was his turn to go down the tubes.

On to Higgins Lake where McKinley returned to first place form, and Cameron ended 3rd, well ahead of Demarest in 4th.

In August Fleet 152 finally got to show off Tawas Bay as it hosted the Gakewi Cup Regatta. Sailing in good winds, Demarest scored a victory, albeit a close one over Cameron, McKinley was 5th and Schreck 7th.

Four Fleet 152 boats traveled to Rehoboth Bay, Delaware for the North American Championship. Demarest, Cameron and McKinley qualified for the Championship Flight (Demarest qualifying 2nd), while Schreck went into the President's Cup, Demarest sailed very well and finished 5th overall with races of 8, 13, 7, 1, 11. McKinley took 15th and qualified for next year's World Championship along with Garry.

Back in Michigan, Demarest and Cameron ran 1-2 at Pontiac. The next week at Devil's Lake McKinley won his third regatta of the year, with the Chapman, Cameron and Demarest combine taking 3rd. Demarest skippered to a 4th at Chicago's Red Flannels and later Cameron finished 7th at Stumpeye Lake.

For the season, Demarest once again won the Joe Stueland Michigan District Traveling Trophy by compiling the eight best races (all firsts) in the District. As a Fleet, our sailors in District regattas put together a strong record of seven firsts, seven seconds, and four thirds.

At Tawas Bay Yacht Club Demarest taught a successful junior sailing program. As a further step toward developing young sailors in the Michigan District, Fleet 152 hosted the first Michigan District Junior Lightning Championship. Eleven crews from the Dstrict, 18 years old and younger, raced on the fine waters of Tawas Bay. Everyone involved agreed the regatta was a great success for both the Class and the participants.

The extensive improvement program for the TBYC facilities has been completed. Our members now look forward to hosting the Class for a major regatta on Tawas Bay, one of the fine bodies of water for one-design racing in the U.S.A.
