District activities in 1975 continued the trend started in 1974 and featured increased participation from all three fleets in district functions.

The 9 th Annual California Circuit was sailed in three segments from March 23rd through the 28th and included a 3-race regatta at King Harbor Yacht Club in Los Angeles, a 16 -mile marathon from Coronado Yacht Club in San Diego Bay to Mission Bay Yacht Club in Mission Bay, and a 3-race Easter Regatta hosted by Mission Bay Yacht Club. The week offered a variety of wind and water sailing conditions to satisfy the most demanding skipper. Twenty boats participated, the largest turnout of Lightnings in Southern California in a long time. The San Francisco fleet came down with six boats and King Harbor and Mission Bay contributed seven boats each. Myron Lyon, of Mission Bay, won the last race of the seven-race series and thus came from behind to nip Jack McCarthy by one-half point for the overall trophy. Stan Starkey, of San Francisco, took overall third place.

John Lyon, who was not bashful about challenging his father all week long, was fourth, and Wendall Harter, of Ki Harbor Yacht Club was fifth. The first race of the regatta at King Harbor Yacht Club was won in easy fashion by Ilkka Kaitila, who is a Finnish skipper temporarily in this country and crewing regularly for King Harbor Yacht Club skippers, He sailed Jack Giverink's boat. Myron Lyon was second and John Lyon third. In the second race, Jack McCarthy got out in front with only Starkey pushing him closely. The same
combination repeated in the third race with Harter third in both races. The trophy winners of the King Harbor Regatta were: 1 McCarthy; 2-Starkey; 3-Myron Lyon; 4-Wendall Harter; 5John Lyon.

The 16 -mile marathon race from Coronado Yacht Club to Mission Bay Yacht Club had a downwind start. Both wind and water movement built up increasingly as the boats moved down the west part of San Diego Bay and into the ocean. Waves were high and confused and for a while the problem of survival had precedence over race position. After the boats rounded the turning buoy and hoisted spinnakers, both wind and water movement gradually eased. Places changed constantly. Jack McCarthy, Starkey, and Hole all had turns at leading the pack. However, at the end Mark Patty of San Francisco was the winner, followed by Bill Hole, John Lyon, Jack McCarthy, and Stan Starkey as trophy winners.

The Easter Regatta began with a wild race sailed in San Diego Bay with small craft warnings flying. One boat capsized and a number did not finish because of gear failure and other problems. Stan Starkey was the winner of this wet race, followed by Myron Lyon, Bill Hole, Jack McCarthy, and Wendall Harter.

The final two races were sailed in Mission Bay instead of in the ocean because small craft warnings were up again. The morning race began in almost drifting conditions, but after three or four boats rounded the first mark and put up spinnakers, the wind shifted about $150^{\circ}$ and came in with a blast that pushed the chutes back against the masts and spreaders. From then on it was an unpredietable day as the weather front went through and the normal ocean breeze fought with the Santa Ana winds from the desert. Planing on gusts of 20 to 25 miles per hour alternated with some periods of drifting of light winds and violent changes of direction were frequent. McCarthy won the morning race, chased by a pair of Lyons, father and son. At this point it looked as though McCarthy had the overall trophy in the bag. However, Myron Lyon took the lead in the last race and held it throughout all wind changes while McCarthy slipped to fifth, giving Myron the overall title by one-half point. The trophy winners in the Easter Regatta were: Myron Lyon, Jack McCarthy, John Lyon, Stan Starkey, and Bill Hole,

Unfortunately, none of the San Francisco Bay skippers were able to make it to the District Championships at King Harbor Yacht Club on July 26th and 27th. Mission Bay Yacht Club skippers acquitted themselves nobly, coming back with four of the five trophies. Warren Gross is the new district champion; John Lyon was second, Wendall Harter of King Harbor Yacht Club was third, the Barber brothers were fourth, and Charlie Gotschalk, fifth. Charlie sailed Fred Knauer's boat and did well winning one race and getting second in another. The second place turned to last place however when he learned he had been over early at the start. Fred Knauer was taking it easy on a Princess Cruise Ship to Alaska.

The Lightning Pacific Coast Championships were held at Richmond Yacht Club, on San Francisco Bay on August 16th and 17th. San Francisco Bay was up to its usual tricks and generated a lot of very rough sailing. Ken White of Klamath Falls, Oregon, was the winner; Jim Nelson, second; Wayne Fitch, third; John Benedetti, fourth; and Mark Patty, fifth.

Sixteen boats made the trip to Lake Cachuma, near Santa Barbara, for the Billy Boswell Memorial Regatta. Sixteen boats participated; five from San Francisco, six from King Harbor Yacht Club and five from Mission Bay. The San Francisco boats came down tuned up and raring to go. The top finishers in the first race were: Wayne Fitch, Stan Starkey, Fred Knauer, Mark Patty, and Myron Lyon. The same five finished on top in the second race except Patty and Lyon exchanged places,

On Saturday night, there was a huge dinner in the organizational area of the campgrounds. In Sunday's race, Wayne Fitch and Stan Starkey were one - two again. Mark Patty, Myron Lyon, and Bill Hole took third, fourth, and fifth positions respectively. Fred Knauer had a bad day and slipped to seventh. The final trophy winners were: 1 - Wayne Fitch, San Francisco; 2 - Stan Starkey, San Francisco; 3-Mark Patty, San Francisco; 4-Fred Knauer, Mission Bay; 5 - Myron Lyon. The trophies were beautiful - an outline of Lake Cachuma etched on gold plate, mounted on wooden plaques and suitably engraved for the Billy Boswell Memorial Regatta.

Sunny skies, breezes of 8 to 10 knots and heavy water movement greeted the 13 skippers who went out to the ocean on September 27th and 28th for the Bowen Memorial Regatta at Mission Bay Yacht Club. Five boats from King Harbor joined eight from Mission Bay. In the first race, Myron Lyon was first, followed by Fred Knauer, Warren Gross, Wendall Harter, from King Harbor Yacht

Club, and Al Poindexster, one of our new skippers from Mission Bay.

In the second race, Fred Knauer lead all the way around, closely followed by Warren Gross, Myron Lyon, Wendall Harter and Charlie Gotschalk, giving Fred a one point series lead. There was a great dinner that night at Mission Bay Yacht Club featuring barbecued steaks with all the trimmings.

On Sunday the race was long, twice around the triangle, plus windward, leeward and windward. Fred Knauer rounded first but later was passed by Greg Pierson from King Harbor Yacht Club, sailing Myron Lyon's old boat 8122 , and still later by Myron Lyon. The finish of the first four boats was close - Pierson, first; Lyon, second; Knauer, third; and Gross, fourth. Wendall Harter finished fifth.

Final trophy standings showed Lyon and Knauer tied with 51/ points, won by Myron Lyon on the best two out of three rule. Warren Gross was third with nine points, Wendall Harter, of King Harbor Yacht Club, fourth with 13 points, and Charlie Gotschalk, of Mission Bay Yacht Club, fifth with 18 points.

On October 11th and 12th, Fred Knauer, Hank Fastenau, and Dick Brewer, from Mission Bay Yacht Club, journeyed to King Harbor Yacht Club to join six of their boats in the annual Hurricane Gulch Regatta. The name was appropriate for the wild seas and strong winds that prevailed. Saturday's race was appropriate for the wild seas and strong winds that prevailed. Saturday's race was a three-hour marathon (approximately 15 miles). Fred Knauer just beat Wendall Harter to the weather mark by under tacking him. Then held the lead throughout the long 10 leg race to King Harbor, and Dick Brewer, behind him. The victory gave Fred two trophies for first in the Lightning Class in the Cecil R. King Regatta, and for sixth overall in that regatta in which numerous other classes sailed on a Portsmouth handicap rating basis.

On Sunday the remaining two races of the Hurricane Gulch Regatta were sailed. The morning race which was calm saw Knauer recover from a horrible start, trapped behind a short line to again lead the pack in. Again, Wendall Harter was on his transom, with Newman, Foster, and Brewer close behind. The afternoon race featured 18 -knot winds and very heavy seas. Brewer rounded first, then broke his spinnaker pole and dropped back. Knauer then took the lead and again lead Harter around the wet six leg race for a clean sweep of the regatta. Mike Boswell, from King Harbor, Dick Brewer, and Bob Newman followed. Trophies went to Fred Knauer, Wendall Harter, Bob Newman, Dick Brewer, and Quinton Foster.

For 1976 we're looking forward to even greater participation by all fleets at district events. Consideration is being given to sailing the district championships at Huntington Lake, 7000 feet up in the High Sierras. There are probably few Lightning districts in the world that can boast year-round ocean, bay, and lake sailing within easy driving distance, All three fleets extend an open invitation to all Lightning skippers visiting or relocating to California.

The following weekend at Red Dragon, Bill Clausen took top honors, followed by Djoerd Hoekstra 2nd, and Alan Crew 3rd. The same three again placed first, 2nd, and 3rd at Riverton in the final regatta of the Gamma series to make the series results Bill Clausen 1st, Djoerd Hoekstra 2nd, and Alan Crew 3rd.

In February, 1976, CAD members will again meet with members of the Metropolitan District-this time for a seminar with Bruce Goldsmith at Monmouth Boat Club. Again, each district will hold its annual winter meeting, and a cocktail party and dinner are planned.

1975 has been a very active year for the CAD. In addition to sponsoring many well-attended regattas, CAD members fared very well against boats from all over North America. We are looking forward to an equally successful season in 1976.
