At Devils Lake the results were Bob Knop first, McKinley second, George Sipel third, Furrey fourth, and Hodgson fifth.


Clark Lake closed the regatta circuit with trophies going to Bales, Dissette and Hodgson.



This year's winner can truly be termed a champion as the series was held in all manner of wind and weather conditions. The boat to beat was again Rod Johnson who mopped us up with a tremendous four firsts and a second. The runner-up in a close duel for second was George Blumel from Maple Bay, followed by Ken White.
