After all the boats were back on their trailors, it was found that Lightnings finished in the first 9 places. Who says the Lightning isn't the best racing one design going?? ILCA Class Vice-President, John Benedetti, finished first on corrected time becoming this year's "Queen of the Lake."

The 5th Annual PIYA Regatta at our home club, Vancouver Lake, was again a success with over 120 boats registered. Unfortunately, first place in the Lightnings again eluded us and went to a familiar corinthian from Seattle, Jamie and Julie Nelson put in our best showing with a fourth. Our own Dennis Torgeson made an even better showing by capsizing his boat — while at anchor.

The Pacific Coasts were held in San Francisco Bay, a tremendous place to sail. The Regatta was flawlessly run and our thanks go to the Richmond Yacht Club and Mark and Ann Patty and the whole S. F. Fleet for a great weekend. The new Champion, Ken White, isn't from our fleet, but at least he lives in Oregon! Jamie Nelson finished third and John Benedetti fourth — in spite of a creative spinnaker-wrapped combination capsize and "tow in" type DNF.

Lastly, Lake Chelan, the infamous, Regatta upheld its tradition as being THE Party of the year, when an uninvited hang glider enthusiast joined the party in his birthday suit making small talk with anyone willing to "listen".
