



Our 1977 season started with our most important event, the District Championship. There were 18 boats participating with skippers from Rio de Janeiro, Sao Paulo, Brasilia and Florianopolis. The Championship was very well organized by the Federacaode Vela e Motor de Santa Catarina, the Veleiros da Ilha Yacht Club in Florianopolis – Santa Catarina State and the ILCA Fleet 162. The race course was set on the Florianopolis South Bay. Steady winds from 8 to 18 mph, few currents and flat sea concurred to make for the successful results. Counting his 5 best races out of 6, Mario Buckup had a brilliant performance. He finished first four times and in one race second. Second over-all was Walmor Soares, who also showed great speed. In the next positions were Robert Buckup, Claudio Abramowitz and George Rider. There was a friendly and enthusiastic atmosphere all the time and it was great being together with the Brasilian Lightning family. Unfortunately Fleet 373, from Pernambuco was absent.

A few weeks later, two of our best skippers went to Chile, in order to participate in the XXIII South American Championship, at Lake Villa-Rica. As our boys told us later, the organization and the hospitality were excellent and they sailed with the beautiful landscape of the Andes Mountains in the background. On this race course the two Claudios, — Abramowitz and Kunze, had a difficult time choosing the good side of the lake, as the winds were very shifty and unsteady. Feeling at home and knowing, (not guessing), where the next wind would come from, the Chilean, Jaime Fernandez was first after six races. Once more everybody could feel the fraternization among all South American Lightning sailors.

In July Mario Buckup, Walmor Soares and Michael Norris took their sails and luggage and flew to old and hospitable Switzerland to participate in the IX World Championship held at Lake Thun, Spietz. There Mario had the great responsibility of defending his title. As he would use a borrowed boat, although a quite new one, he left Brazil with mixed emotions. He and his crew — Joaquim Feneberg and Ralph Christian, did a tremendous job by finishing second. Mario has to be considered one of the best small boat skippers in the world. He is still trying to understand (and we are sure he is not the only one) how the "old fox" Tom Allen could be so fast, but we all agree that Tom was and still is one of the top Lightning skippers in the world. The young Michael Norris was 42nd out of 53, and this was a very important result too, if we consider that he is a beginner in International Competition.

Later on in November, we were visited by Bill Shore. He came to Brasil to train the Sao Paulo sailors and to try and better their level of competition. His trip was sponsored by the Federacao de Vela do Estadio de Sao Paulo (Sao Paulo Sailing Association). It was a very active week for Fleets 147 and 462, with the training divided into three parts. In the two week-ends we sailed 10 races, each one consisting of 2 relatively short triangles. In each regatta Bill skippered a different boat, During the week he gave individual instruction to each crew on tuning and tactics. Almost every evening we had conferences, slides or films. On the first two evenings John Bertrand also talked to us, - about his experiences. He had just won for the second time the World Championship of the Laser Class - this time in Cabo Frio, Rio de Janeiro. So we had, with Mario Buckup also present, a meeting of big champions in this profitable week. We want to thank Bill once more for his coming. We naturally also had some "churrascos" (barbecues) and cocktails with lots of "caipirinhas" (brazilian sugarcane brandy with temon, sugar and ice).

Presently all the Brazilian District is working hard to prepare for the XXI Brazilian Championship as well as the XXIV South American Championship. Both will be held at Guarapiranga Lake (reservoir) in Sao Paulo — at Easter 1978. We will do our best to give our South American guests as warm a welcome in return for the friendly way they've always treated us in their countries.

It is also very important to say that our District must work hard to keep all the activities of the class at a good level. With the prohibition of importing new equipment there isn't any possibility of renewing our boats — and that is bad!!! Another difficult problem is the fact that a large number of boats is concentrated in the Fleet at Sao Paulo, which has approximately 20 active boats, — while in the others the number is not greater than 5 or 8.

Anyway, we will go to working to take the Brazilian Lightning Class to the position it deserves.

1977 has proven to be the most exciting year of the past decade for the California District. Although promotion was this years top priority item, District racing, as always, provides the bread and butter of our organizational diet. The California District comprises only three fleets, but the members of those fleets are the most dedicated, tightly knit group of Lightning sailors found anywhere.

Tom Allen graced this year's California Circuit during Easter Week. No doubt determined to hit the "California Big Time" before a casual swing through Switzerland, he cannonballed his *Plymouth Hilton* straight from the Southern Circuit. The weather for our circuit was beautiful, and although attendance was down a few boats, we still had good District representation along with another special guest, Brian Coleman, all the way from British Columbia.

The Circuit opener, a two day, three race series at Fleet 102's home, King Harbor Yacht Club in Redondo Beach, served as a calling card for the Tom Allen Speed Show. Final standings were: Tom Allen, first; John Lyon, second; Jack McCarthy, third; Warren Gross, fourth and Myron Lyon, fifth.

The Fleet transferred south to San Diego and Coronado Yacht Club for the Marathon segment of the Circuit. Finishes were: Tom Allen, first; Myron Lyon, second; Warren Gross, third; John Lyon, fourth, and Mark Patty, fifth. The 15 mile classic from Coronado, out San Diego Bay, around Point Loma, and up the coast to Mission Bay was climaxed by an incredible three mile spinnaker screamer followed by a torturous six mile beat in very heavy ocean conditions.

The weather lightened a little for the two day Mission Bay segment dominated by Myron Lyon, first; Tom Allen, second; John Lyon, third; Warren Gross fourth and Randy Smith, fifth. Overall Circuit standings were Tom Allen, John Lyon, Myron Lyon, Warren Gross and Jack McCarthy.

Our District Championships were hosted by Fleet 102 and were marked by the surprise participation of long lost Manning and Merrit Barber. Vowing to return to the active scroll, they finished third, followed by Quinton Foster and Wendell Harter. Our District Champ is Myron Lyon of San Diego who seems to be quite comfortable out front these days. Runner-up, in an excellent challenge was Bruce Arnold from San Francisco.

The San Francisco Fleet hosted the Pacific Coast Championships out of Richmond Yacht Club and offered such wonderful conditions as too much wind and no current, too much current and not enough wind, and varying degrees of famous Bay chop thrown in for good measure. Actually, better variety for a Championship could not have been supplied, and regatta organization by RYC was as usual — excellent. Dominators were Ken White, fifth; Jack McCarthy, fourth; Charlie Gotschalk, third; Myron Lyon, second and Jamie Nelson of Portland, Pacific Coast Champ.

Our next intermural event was the Billie Boswell Memorial at beautiful Lake Cachuma near Santa Barbara. The San Francisco Fleet missed this regatta due to being placed on probation by their local Small Boat Racing Association. In all prudence, we shall leave that story alone and say only that they missed a great one Championed by Myron Lyon, Charlie Gotschalk, and Warren Gross, all from Mission Bay.

The Bowen Memorial Regatta held at Fleet 194's home, Mission Bay Yacht Club was won by Chris Gotschalk, first; Myron Lyon, second; Warren Gross, third and Mark Patty, fourth. A couple of weeks later, Fleet 102 reciprocated with their invitational, "Hurricane Gulch", which closes the District calendar, running from April through October, Mark Patty, in his farewell-to-Fleet 102-regatta, having been transferred back to San Francisco, won this very close contest with Charlie Gotschalk, second and Mike Boswell, third.

General racing participation was down slightly this year due largely to tremendous promotion efforts. Each fleet had at least a couple of projects in the works and the small average rate of success is certainly not a reflection of the effort. Finally one person, Myron Lyon, made a personal commitment to establish the long wished for west coast source of Lightnings.

Tom Allen's visit in the spring was really of a partly business nature. He was delivering the first new boats to enter the State since 11802. Since the delivery of those two boats, Myron (now our west coast Lightning distributor) has solved the plaguing transportation problem, and several more new boats have hit California. But Myron's biggest scheme was to sponsor a Lightning in the Long Beach Sailboat Show, the second largest boat show in the nation.

Sure enough, in conjunction with Tom Allen and with coordination and booth staffing by Fleet 102's Mike Boswell, the really big show became a reality. This single event is probably the most significant story of our District year. And Myron continues to do more.

Lastly, the California District would like to present to all members of the Lightning Class, our new ILCA Vice-President, Myron Lyon and to give special recognition to Andrea Lyon for her patience and encouragement, Myron is California's best; he will serve all of us well.

A few were fortunate enough to make the trip south in March for the Southern Circuit to begin the season. The less fortunate majority waited till May and the Newport Invitational. This has been a joint affair with the Lake Erie District for the past couple of years. For once we were ready for them and managed to keep the top three spots for the local boys, Kirk Reynolds, Fisk Hayden and Dick Hallagan. As usual, the Lake Erie guys got even (and then some) at the Niagara Frontier in June.

It's really great to see a fleet spring up almost out of nowhere and become active. Such has been the case with Fleet 4 at Lake Delta. Lightning sailing was dormant their for many years, but within the past two years, a thriving fleet has emerged. I'm sure we will hear a lot more from this corner of the district in years to come. They did a fine job of sponsoring the Lake Shore Lightning Squadron regatta which this year was the first leg of the Triple Crown.

The Triple Crown has been a two-boat duel between Dick Hallagan and Fisk Hayden for several years now, and this one was no exception. They traded first and second spots at Lake Delta and Pultneyville. The third leg was at Keuka which is easily our largest regatta of the season. (Somehow it got on the Lake Erie schedule too). Neither Dick nor Fisk won the big Champagne money, but Dick was close enough to take the Triple Crown handily. Fisk Hayden was second and Jeff Penfield third. Our Lake Erie visitors took most of the top spots at Keuka with Mark Bryant winning it again! (We're going to hide Keuka Lake next year where Mark can't find it). Dave Parker also sailed an outstanding series there to pull down a second in the midst of some real tough competition.

Our District Championship was held at Red Jacket Y.C. on Cayuga Lake, and provided a good test of skill and teamwork with four races in moderate-to-heavy air. It looked like Fisk Hayden was going to win this one, but Dick Hallagan pulled it out in the last race to win by a one-point margin. Merle Pindell sailed a very consistent series to take third place.

The Junior Districts also at Red Jacket attracted a healthy seven entries. Bill Dodge overcame a three-point deficit in the final race to win.

The CNYYRA regatta was held at Rochester where the younger skippers took all the Lightning hardware. Bill Dodge, Dave Parker, and Jim Pindell were 1,2,3. The best any of us old guys could do was fifth.

The final regatta of the year at Onondaga was a super heavy air series. Jed Dodge looked like a shoo-in till the last jibe mark. While Jed and crew were self rescuing, Tom McAuliffe breezed by to win the race and the series. What a way to end the season, eh Tom?

The Chilean District showed intense National and International activity during the past season.

Due to the fact that the XXIII South American Lightning Class Championship was to be held at Lago Villarrica, Pucon, the Chilean Association of the Lightning Class invited Mr. Tom Allen to participate in the training of the Chilean team.

The Favaro Cup served to classify Chilean helmsmen, and was won by Alberto Gonzales M. The following people also classified as part of the team: Manuel Gonzales M., Jaime Fernandez, Pablo Gallyas, Rodrigo Zuazola and Manuel Gonzales B.

Previous to the South American Championship, a new edition of the traditional Chile-Peru Cup was held in these same waters.

The results were as follows: First - Manuel Gonzales (Chile), Second - Alberto Gonzales (Chile), Third - Jose Barreda M. (Peru), Fourth - Jaime Fernandez (Chile), Fifth - Gunter Ritter (Peru), Sixth - Luis Loli (Peru).

Crews from Argentina, Brasil, Ecuador, Peru and Chile participated in the XXIII South American Championship amid the beautiful landscape of Southern Chile.

It was the first time that a South American Championship was run on a lake; the water and wind behavior being to the entire satisfaction of all participants. Ample information and details of this Championship appear in this Year Book. It was narrowly won by Chilean Jaime Fernandez, with Javier Melero and Tristan Aircardi as crew.

The National Lightning Class Championship was held at Algarrobo in April of this year and it classified the crews that were to participate in the IX World Lightning Class Championship. It was won by Manuel Gonzales M. with Cristian Parro and Felipe Galvez; Alberto Gonzales was runner-up and third place went to Hugo Cuneo.

Chile participated with 3 crews in the World Championship, obtaining results notably superior to those reached in previous championships of this type even though the crews were not able to have the best boats available.

Finally, to celebrate El Mercurio, Valparaiso's renowned newspaper's 150th anniversary, an International Regatta was organized, to which the present World Champion and Vice Champion of the class were invited. Jose Barreda, the outstanding Peruvian yachtsman also took part.

The Championship was won by Mario Buckup with Ehelma and Joaquin Feneberg; second place went to Tom Allen with Brenda and Tom Jr. and third place to Rufino Melero, a Chilean helmsman who proved to be the revelation of this season.

This Regatta was very interesting as it enabled an interchange of ideas with these visitors which will, of course, benefit the Chilean

Lightning Class.

For the coming season, a new Commodore, Mr. Fernando Magnasco, will head the Chilean District and will undoubtedly have a very good performance.
