Of the five boats from the district that qualified for the North Americans, we had representatives in all three fleets. No ones final standings were startingly good, but here was some awfully good sailing done by Mississippi Valley District sailors.

After the North American's the local regatta circuit continued with the Carlyle Sailing Association's Labor Day "impromptu" regatta. This is a regatta that started actually before Lake Carlyle was formed, racing for a case of beer. It has grown from that humble beginning to a good regatta attended by quite a few out of town boats. Unfortunately this regatta has a rival in the southern half of the district where the Island Bay Yacht Club has its McDougal Regatta on the same weekend.

In mid September the Mammoth Whale-of-a-Sail Regatta is held by the Carlyle Sailing Association which is a multiclass, multicourse regatta usually drawing somewhere between 200 and 300 boats in some 15 different classes. In recent years the use of three separate courses and race committees has done a great deal to smooth out the traffic problems that were earlier experienced. We all hope that Lightning participation in the Whale will improve as it has been minimal in the last couple of years.

In late September there is the Watkins Regatta at Kentucky Lake which is an open regatta and usually includes The Lightning Class. The last regatta of the season is the fabled Blue Nose Regatta hosted by Island Bay Yacht Club and Lightning Fleet 262 on Old Hickory Reservoir near Nashville. This is a regatta that is known to many people from outside of the district for its hospitality and good competition.

The Mississippi Valley District has, as detailed above, many regattas and welcomes Lightning sailors from nearby fleets. The particular dates for our regattas for next year are listed in the district ad elsewhere in this book. Please come and visit us.

The 1977 District schedule opened in Burlington, Vermont in early June where the Mallet's Bay Boat Club sponsored the New Hampshire-Vermont championships. The "factory team" of Bill Shore and Greg Fisher prevailed, followed by Don Brush Jr., Dave Little, and 16 other skippers on a cold, blustery weekend. Defending District Champion Don Brush won the award for the highest N.H.-Vt. finisher after a close battle with clubmate Dave Little. The following weekend 21 skippers and crews answered the starting gun at Newburyport. The weather warmed up, but controversy plagued this regatta. Both of Saturday's races were protested and no one seems to remember who won the hardware. One week later order (and good racing) was restored at the Annisquam Yacht Club. Greg Fisher bested a field of 14, followed by Jack Burwell, Georges Peter, Don Brush, Sr. (with a pickup crew from Vermont!), and Stu Nickerson.

Three weeks later, the District Championships were hosted by the Harraseeket Yacht Club in South Freeport, Maine. Thirty plus boats contested for the championship and eight North American berths in a regatta that will be long remembered for both the fine competitive sailing under the direction of R.C. Chairman Gardner Brown and the "Down East" hospitality, led by Jack and Marilyn Burwell. John Collins and Don Brush tied on overall low points, with Collins (and crew of Ann Hayes and Larry Fretts) winning his third District Championship in four years on the tie breaker. Dave Curtis finished third after leading the regatta until the final leg. Fred Hamblet (4th) and Georges Peter (5th) also finished in the money.

Two weeks later at Marblehead Race Week, Georges Peter edged out Buddy Duncan and John Collins for the Larsen trophy. Peter and Collins tied for the State of Massachusetts Championship (comprised of the weekend races) followed by Brush, Len Pratt, and Joel Humphrey. The weekend of August 13-14, just prior to the North Americans, both Wellfleet on Cape Cod (22 boats) and Mallet's Bay Boat Club on Lake Champlain (17) hosted Lightning events. At Wellfleet Bill Shore bested Stu Nickerson, both having just returned from the World Championship

In the President's Cup, Collins finished 5th, Other N.E. representatives, in addition to the Junior qualifiers, were Peter Hubbard (with a very creditable 6th in the Governor's Cup). The District cocktail party again provided a welcome respite from the week-long, highly competitive sailing.

Back in New England, the District schedule, concluded with September regattas at Lake Massebesic and Lake Spofford. Don Brush, followed by Buck Wynn and Hale, topped 15 boats from throughout New England, 5 of which capsized in Sunday's gusty 30 knot breezes. Lack of water was our worst enemy this year and our Portland regatta was no exception. The races had to be moved to Yale Lake, some 40 miles from the dried out reservoir. The conditions were perfect! Clear skies, warm weather and wind ranging from 8 - 14 mph on Saturday and 12 - 18 mph on Sunday. There was no doubt after three races that Zettler was the man to beat. Rod Johnson had problems on the starting line in one race and to top it off split his boom as well. Therefore after some good racing Greg Zettler was first, Kurt Seiffert second, and Rod Johnson third. Yale Lake is very picturesque and perhaps more races will be held here in the future.

In conclusion, the overall winner for this seasons racing was "The Incredible" Greg Zettler. This fellow is unreal and I hope he will offer us tough competition again next year.

The Southern District stretches from Mobile Bay in the southeast corner of Alabama, across the Gulf to New Orleans and north west to Shreveport, Louisiana and is comprised of five fleets totaling 50 or so Lightnings. Regatta competition begins with the Sugar Bowl Classic held around the first of the year on Lake Ponchartrain in New Orleans, on to the Holiday-in-Dixie event in Shreveport the last week-end in April and concludes, usually, with the Jackson Mississippi Yacht Club hospitality shindig the end of October, Fairhope's Wadewitz is calendered the first week-end in October, Besides these always "fun events" there is the Gulf Yachting Association Lightning Class Championships, won this year by Buck Ballatin, and the Southern District of ILCA Championships, captured in 1977 by Rick Skinner, These two events are the main attractions of the year usually drawing Lightnings from all the fleets of the area, and are held in June and July. Southern Yacht Club, New Orleans, has a Labor Day Lightning regatta every year.

Marshall Walker, Shreveport Yacht Club, Tommy Allen, Southern Yacht Club and Buck Ballatin, New Orleans Yacht Club represented the District in The North Americans in 1977, Buck Ballatin took second place in the Governors Cup.

Officers during the first half of the 1977 sailing season were John Butcher, Commodore and Larry Frost, Secretary. New Officers, Frost and Hughes took over at the annual meeting during Southern District Championships.

The Jackson Mississippi Yacht Club annual Hospitality Regatta invites Lightnings to attend their regatta each year late in October. The Lightning Fleet at Jackson is inactive, yet seventeen Lightnings arrived on the scene this year — all from distant yacht clubs. If you sail within 300 miles or so of Jackson Yacht Club, we highly recommend this "Indian Summer" affair.

The Shreveport Yacht Club's "Holiday-in-Dixie" regatta the last week-end in April each year usually fields a large fleet of Lightnings (28 in 1977, 32 in 1976) and always has strong to stronger winds, You are invited to come to Shreveport's regatta and get a taste of "Early Summer" and great Lightning racing. Fleet 175 at Shreveport Yacht Club is very much alive.

The Texas District has been on a slow downhill slide with the exception of Fleet 435 (Rush Creek Yacht Club) for the past five years. In my opinion, this problem is caused, in part, by failure of builders to reach satisfactory terms with retail dealers. The number of inferior sailboats sold to inexperienced purchasers in this area is incredible. Eventually, many of these people may turn to Lightnings if their sailing experience leads them to an enclave of Lightning people, which in this area is not likely. We feel that more people would buy Lightnings if the boat dealers would sell them. The Texas District now has one active fleet, fortunately it is one of the best.

On the bright side, due to the efforts of Fleet 435 and more notably Jim Craig and Bob Chilton, it appears likely that a Lightning fleet will be started at the Fort Worth Boat Club. Fort Worth has some excellent sailors who for years have sailed keel boats, some of extreme size for an inland lake. The club is experiencing a back to basics movement by a number of sailors who have bought Lightnings. We hope this will be the nucleus of a large and competitive fleet in years to come.

Thanks to the efforts of Duncan Porter, Jim Craig and Jeannie Craig, the Rush Creek Yacht Club has been selected as the site for the 1979 Lightning Worlds. This event will definitely help promotion of Lightnings in our area. The District is sending out a newsletter informing all nonaffiliated Lightning owners in Texas of the worlds site selection and encouraging them to join the L.L.C.A. It is hoped that this effort may increase the District's membership in the L.L.C.A. and permit more of our boats to qualify for the North Americans. For the past several years the District has only been able to send two boats, for 1978 it is our goal to send three.

The District has been doing better in national competition. Our District Champion, Stephen Craig, qualified in the blue fleet at the N.A.'s for the first time in several years. It is hoped that the new boats in Fort Worth will help raise our level of competition.

We are hopeful with the establishment of a fleet at Fort Worth, the coming of the World Championship and the continued promotional efforts of some of our dedicated Lightning pushers, the Texas district will grow and the good news of Lightning sailing will be brought to potential Lightning owners in the Texas District.

## "LIGHTNING" FILM

This 16mm sound/color motion picture "Lightning" gives a brief glimpse of the heart of small

boat one-design sailing - the people and their boat.

Filmed on the waters of Tampa Bay during the 1974 Mid-Winter Lightning Championship and at "Red Bank" on the Navesink River during the Monmouth Boat Club Regatta; and on land at the St. Petersburg Yacht Club, the movie combines racing shots with regatta activity shots.

"Lightning", of course, stars the Lightning, a 19' centerboard, three man boat, and features Lightning crews and families.

The movie was sponsored by the Lightning Class Association and some of the Lightning Builders and Sailmakers - Allen Boat & Sail Company, Eichenlaub-Mueller Boat Company, Nickels & Holman, Todd Boat Company, Murphy & Nye Sailmakers, Seidelmann Sails, and Shore Sail Company. Steered by Lightning sailor Anthony V. Curto of New York, the movie project began in the Spring of 1973. Tony located and contracted Victor Kayfetz Productions Inc., New York City commercial film producers, to do the job. Victor Kayfetz proved to be a fortunate selection. A sailor himself, a professional perfectionist, Victor has produced a colorful interesting movie. Using sound recordings of on location interviews along with narration against a specially composed musical background the audio portion of the movie complements the film.

One bit of history is recorded in the movie. The designer of the Lightning, Olin Stephens, took time out from his tight schedule during the 1974 America Cup competition to speak about the Lightning and its design.


was 2nd, Tom Bierman 19th and Jack Huntsman 26th. Jon Schwartz was 1st in the Governors Cup.

The next big event was the combination Senior Invitational Regatta and the Michigan Junior District Championship sponsored by the Bay City Lightning Fleet held on Saginaw Bay. The winner of the senior race was again Hank Hodgson with three "bullets" followed by Dave Fury with three seconds and Gordon Gotberg with three thirds. These races were fun but not near as interesting as watching the nine juniors race. Among the nine was this authors little son skippering for the first time in big water with a total crew weight of 340 lbs. Our last regatta before the N.A.s was held on beautiful Higgins Lake, said to be one of the most beautiful lakes in the world. This was won by past Michigan District Champion Garry Demarest with this years Champ, Hank Hodgson close behind in second place

This year we sent eleven boats to the N.A.s in Buffalo with young Clarence Holman doing the best as he qualified for the Championship Fleet. In addition, we had five boats in each of the other two fleets. Pontiac Y.C. was the best represented with five boats in attendance. After Buffalo, everyone went home and rested up for the biggest regatta in Michigan at the Pontiac Yacht Club. This event has a higher participation record than most districts with 40 to 48 boats usually sailing. This year we held true to our name of the White Cap Regatta with 30 m.p.h. gusts on Saturday. This was enough to do in your secretary with a capsize, turtle, mast stuck in the mud and finally a three piece mast when it finally came up.
