1980 was an exciting and interesting year in our area. The season started early in January with participation in the XXVI South American Championship. We sent two crews to Bogota, Colombia: Roberto Ricoveri, Rolando Turrado, Hugo Arazi, and Javier Pascuchi, his wife Maria and Angel Vila.

After this we worked very hard in the Junior activities. Hugo Castro with crew Gabriel Coca and Pablo Montes won the trials and was sailing in the second World Youth Championship with Angel Vila as coach, and he took the third place. In late July Roberto Ricoveri, Rolando Turrado and Hugo Arazi were in the United States and sailing successfully at the North Americans. They took fourth place in the President's Cup.

Fleet 202 and the Club Nautico Olivos was the host of this year's District Championship. This event was also the trials for the XXVII South American Championship to be held at Salinas, Ecuador in April 26, 1981. We had a very close competition, with boats from all Districts' fleets. We now look forward to a good season in 1981.

Last year Brazil brought home the Gold from the Pan American gmaes with Mario Buckup. In 1980 Otavio Machado de Almeida almost did the same in the Junior World Championships. Otavio and his crew were runners-up, only two points behind Ian Jones. In this year's Senior Nationals he placed a very honorable 8th, and first in the Junior category. We shall be hearing more and more of him as his experience grows.

The 1980 Nationals were held in Sao Paulo in March. With lots of rain and light winds, the winner was Claudio Bieckark. Manfred Kaufman was second. Mario Buckup third, Robert Buckup fourth and Valerio Soares fifth. Due to Bieckarck's commitment to the Olympic Team (where he took a fourth in Finns), he couldn't compete in the North Americans.

In the North American qualifiers Manfred Kaufman was brilliant, taking three firsts and a throw-out second. But in the final series Manfred had trouble with choppy seas and could only finish 14th in the Blue Fleet.

Brazil was also in Bogota for the South Americans with two crews. Claudio Abramowitz and Alzyr Faria couldn't get used to the crazy winds and only managed to place fourth and 18th, respectively.

At our last General Meeting two measures were approved that will be giving new growth to our class in Brazil. Approval for the class to purchase its own extrusion die for aluminum spars and to sell spars at cost. Secondly, approval was given for the class to get local builders interested in making a Brazilian fiberglass Lightning by financing the mould. As of this moment, we are very near this dream, as contributions from present and future Lightning sailors are coming in for the project. It is our goal to be able to arrive at the next World's, in Chile, with totally Brazilian made boats.

The highlight of the California District was the North Americans hosted by Mission Bay Yacht Club. It has been sixteen years since they were held on the West Coast, and most of the skippers were looking forward to an opportunity to sail against those revered Eastern sailors.

The first district-wide competition is always the California Circuit. This year, Jay Lutz joined us and ran away with the circuit. Jay took two of the three races held in Santa Monica Bay in Los Angeles; ground down Max Rosenberg in the modified marathon out of San Diego Bay, and took two of the three races held in San Diego Bay. Following Lutz were Max Rosenberg, Warren Gross, Peter Huston and Al Poindexter. Midway thorugh the circuit, Warren Gross took delivery of his new boat and promptly won the first race in which he sailed it. Bill Buckles, who had delivered Warren's boat, joined us for the San Diego Bay series taking a fourth.

All interest then focused on the District and qualification for the North Americans. The winds ranged from 0 to 30 on the first day, then settled down for the second day. After five heavily contested races, one of the district's really "nice guys" emerged with his first major regatta win - Dick Brewer. Dick was followed by Myron Lyon, Warren Gross, Max Rosenberg and Charlie Gotschalk.

From the Districts, it was up to Klanath Falls for the Pacific Coast Championships. Unfortunately, we did not turn out a large California contingent; only a few boats from San Francisco made the trip. But, what we lacked in quantity was made up by quality as our District Commodore, Mark Patty, showed the Pacific Northwest District how to sail and kept the Pacific Coast Championship trophy in California.

Then the highlight! The North Americans! The apprehensive California sailors were awaiting the East Coast sailors, and wondering if we could squeeze one boat into the Blue Fleet. The combination of chop, swells and light air was old hat to the "locals" as we placed four boats in the Championship Fleet - Myron Lyon, Mark Patty, Warren Gross and Dick Brewer. Not only was Myron our top finisher with a 21, but he wrapped up a year of extremely hard work as Chairman of the North Americans with a well run North American Championship. Although we won no silver in the Blue Fleet, Kirk Johnson sailed to a fifth in the President's Cup while Peter Huston, fourth, and Bruce Arnold, fifth, took home trophies from the Governor's Cup.

The final event for the district is the Billie Bowell Memorial Regatta held on a reservoir north of Santa Barbara. This is one of the perennial favorite regattas of the sailors in this district. The winds are always good (except the second day of racing this year), the camping is always fun and old friendships are once again renewed. And, to top it all off, we sail fresh water for a change. Saturday's races were typical with winds from the north, over the dam, at a steady 12-15. However, Sunday brought very shifty and extremely light air - a rare scene at Cachuma Lake. Charlie Gotschalk managed to survive the fleet spreading and compressing several times and won his first Billie Boswell Memorial Regatta.

The district officers for 1981 were elected at Cachuma, Quintin Foster will serve as District Commodore assisted by Al Poindexter, Secretary.

The Central Atlantic District started 1980 with the traditional joint winter meeting held this year at Monmouth Boat Club, Sailing started for some of our skippers-including Jay Lutz, Jim Carson, Paul Gelenitis, and Djoerd Hoekstra-at the Southern Circuit. Jay also travelled all the way west and won the California Circuit (let the record show he won five of seven races sailed, too). Some of us shook out the cobwebs at Monmouth's wonderful Long John Regatta; others waited til Cedar Point's Early Bird. By the early part of June we were all stoked up and 30 crews, more or less, descended on Ocean City Yacht Club for the District Championship. John Parker, Jim Accardi and Don Gartland and the rest of their fleet were fabulous hosts, though it was a mite difficult sorting out the weather mark from the crowd of anchored motorboats busily fishing and cussing out the passing sailors. The fleet sailed three races on Saturday, but only two counted because a starting mark dragged. Then were was Sunday. Last year when Red Dragon Canoe Club held the districts there were no Sunday races because of an unfortunate lack of wind; this year the Wind Gods blew us right off the water. Jack Elfman went out and sailed around, but when that noted heavy weather hot-shot came back to the dock with his jib down, the rest of the fleet headed for their boats and started dropping masts for the trip home. The winner, was Jim Carson, and Jay Lutz was runner-up.

Central Atlantic District Fleets also were hosts in 1980 for the Atlantic Coast Championship regatta, held at Metedeconk River, and the New Jersey State Championship, held at Brant Beach. The home teams did pretty well, as members of the host fleets won both regattas. Jay Lutz took the Atlantic Coasts, and Glen Reitinger won the Jersey States.

August brought the North Americans. The district sent three boats all the way to San Diego—Carson and both Lutzes. All three qualified for the Blue Fleet, but they could have used some extra luck in the final series. Jody Lutz, brought home a prize, winning the Junior North American Championship, earning a candy-stripe Lightning emblem to match the one brother Jay captured a few years ago.

In the fall, John Parker won the Gamma Trophy for best placing the regattas on the Delaware River, District sailors showed the flag at Cedar Point, Annapolis and Quantico. Jim Carson ended his season on an upbeat with a victory at Quantico.

So another season rolled around. District Commodore Buck Kloss gives way for 1981 to John Parker. When this sees print, we will be looking forward instead of backward. From Barnegat Bay to the Delaware River, the Central Atlantic District wishes all Lighting sailors fair winds and a fine new season.

- (4) Fleet 50's Potomac River events where you can go from vertical to horizontal in a flash if you get too close to jet plane backwash at National Airport.

- (5) The Upper Chesapeake Regatta where Fleet 192 puts on the best steak feast of the summer.
- (6) The Delaware Governor's Cup at Rehoboth—the finest sailing anywhere (except for a few days in 1978)—where Kitty Racine makes 20 reservations for crabs and beer and 47 people show up.
- (7) The Dixie Junior Championship, where our active bunch of juniors show that they certainly know how to enjoy themselves.
- (8) The District Championship, a three day, five race event where we get 30-40 boats each year.
- (9) The Atlantic Coasts, held every other year on the Chesapeake, where we do battle with the hot Jerseyites, particularly the Metedeconk Mashers.
- (10) Miles River on the picturesque Eastern Shore at St. Michaels, where the 100 year-old log canoes still compete.
- (11-25) More of the same activities, where you get to see Rehoboth, Annapolis, and Washington, D.C. several more times. Twenty-five weekends of racing!

If you want to sail Dixie in 1981 and compete against the best in Dixie as well as the top people from the rest of the East, plan on attending the following events at a minimum:

- The Atlantic Coasts at Severn S.A. in Annapolis, to be held over the last weekend in July.
- (2) The Frigid Digit at Severn S.A. also, on the third weekend in October. We had 40 boats this year, including 15 people who sailed in the Blue Fleet in San Diego.
- (3) The Quantico Frostbite on the weekend right after the Digit, which has been going for 28 years and is going to regain its somewhat lost prominence—we promise!

These are the highlights of a typical season in Dixie. Competition is an important aspect of the weekends to be sure, but the pure relaxation and enjoyment are just as important, if not more so.

Regarding results, Bob Wardwell won several regattas; Don Delorme won the Districts and a couple of others; Steve Bachman won a couple (Don and Steve sailed in the Blue Fleet in San Diego); and Ron Buchanan, Fred Mertes, Rob Pratt, Joe Friebele, Dave Racine, Bill Buckley, and Bob Astrove each won a regatta (hope I haven't left anyone out).

Our active membership is at about 100, and the typical regatta draws 18-20 boats with a range from 10 to 40.

The Lightning Class seems to have some kind of future here in Finland. That may not be shown in the figures, i.e., number of boats, number of members of number of fleets, because these have not grown very rapidly; but, it is shown by the number of people, yacht clubs, different kind of organizations etc., who have asked us where to get a LIGHTNING. Unfortunately we can't help them very much at the moment, because we have only two boat builders who are interested in building Lightnings and both of them are making only hulls. To have a sailing Lightning you need besides the hull also a mast, a rudder, a centerboard and a set of sails to start with, and that seems to be the main problem of the Lightning Class in Finland. That makes the main task of the Finnish Class Organization to be getting a "Turn-Key" — Lightning into market.

Our season started with the Annual Meeting in October in Helsinki where District officials both new and re-elected were appointed, the site of the District Championships was named and the regattas for our Ranking Series were picked up from the national calendar of yachting events in 1980. During the winter we tried to activate the fleets sending them "Training Letters" with questions to be solved in fleet meetings and to arouse discussion about Lightnings and how to sail them. These "Letters" were quite nicely welcomed by the fleets and we are planning to continue this training method in the future. In March the Lightning was displayed in the Helsinki International Boat Show, through a slide show with a speaker telling the facts and figures of the Class. In late March we had the traditional "Training Seminar" which lasted over a weekend and presented several lectures by our top Lightning sailors.

The sailing season started in mid-May with the first of the Ranking Series regattas on Lake Tuusulanjarvi. There were more than twenty early birds trying to catch the worm and even if the weather wasn't too warm, the competition was hot. The rest of the Ranking Series regattas, which were spread all over the country, had satisfactory numbers of participants in each of them. The real top score of the season was the District Championship with 40 boats participating. That was the new record of the District. The host of this great event was Valkeakosken Purjehtijat (Valkeakoski Y.C.) and Valkeakoski Lightning Fleet 468. The District Champion Lasse Hammar of Oulu with his crew Harry Hammar and Simo Koski won the title for the fifth time and that is something. Congratulations!

One of the highlights of the season was the European Championship held in Neuchatel, Switzerland in July. Five boats in a truck and one on a trailer headed for The Alps. The crews and the tourists with kids and gear were packed in an air-conditioned coach and they followed the truck with the boats. The races were sailed in wet and windy conditions, i.e. rainy and stormy conditions which, seemed to be good enough for Jean-Claude DuPasquier, The Champion, but not for our team. The Finnish finishers were: 8th Osmo Savola, 13th Timo Patosuo, 14th Hartti Nisonen, 19th Ahti Immonen, 20th Leif Haglund and 27th Markku Paloma.

The last of the season's events was the 50th Anniversary of Raimo Aromaa, the Executive Director of Finnish Yachting Association and former District Secretary and Vice President of L.L.C.A. for many years. The unity of the Lightning Sailors made it possible for us to supply Raimo's boat *Mesaheila* with a new set of sails for his 30th District Championships in 1981.


