1981 started with great highlights. Mario Buckup won the South Americans, Claudio Bieckark won his second consecutive District Championship, and our locally-made glass Lightning is a reality.

Mario pulled it again. With crew Joaquin Feneberg and Ralf Christian (ex 1975 World Champion and current Pan American Champion) in the same known waters at Salinas, Equador, Marion Buckup won the 27th South American Championship. The top five boats were equal in speed, but the light to medium winds with choppy waves separated them. Marion had a tough time keeping Fransisco Sola and Manuel Gonzales off his heels, but took the Championship and an automatic berth to the 1982 Worlds.

In March, Fleet 162 of Florianopolis hosted the 1981 Nationals. Boats started arriving during the weekend before the mid-week to Sunday championship. Claudio Bieckarck and Manfred Kaufman were testing the local waters before most of us got there. On Monday, when more crews arrived from the North, Bieckark and Kaufman were sitting on shore waiting for the wind to die down—anemometers read to 40 m.p.h.!

Sao Paul Fleets 147 and 462 trailed and arrived complaining about the 12 hour trip. Not so the Cariocas. The next day five boats from Rio de Janeiro arrived "in caravan" smiling and happy after almost 20 hours of treacherous roads and highways. All told there were 21 of the best in Brazil to compete for the Districts and the berths for the South Americans ; and the Worlds in Chile in 1982.

After sail measurement and hull weighing, the Championship got under way. With "back to back" races (grueling for some of us in the older category) Claudio Bieckark immediately showed his superiority. He won with light winds, strong winds — any kind of wind. Second was Marjon Buckup, third was Manfred Kaufman, followed by Wlaor Soares Jr. and Valerio Soares. With this win, Bieckark qualified to participate in the North Americans where he took a very honorable 15th.

Dr. Don Delorme and Steve Bachman are gearing up for the Worlds in Chile in January 1982. Our best wishes go with them.



As you could read in the last years report, the main problem of the Lightning Class in Finland was the lack of boatbuilders who could get a "Ready-to-Sail" Lightning into the market. Now I am happy to tell you that the problem seems to be solved. Through the effort and enthusiasm of Mr. Jorma Lehtonen and with the help of Class members and the Class organization, we were proud to present a new Finn-made Lightning at the beginning of the sailing season in late May. Furthermore we found a sailmaker who was eager enough to start developing competitive Lightning sails for Finnish sailors. The past season was more or less a testing period for this new equipment and perhaps next summer we'll have a fully equipped competitive Finnish Lightning boat sailing in our regattas.

After the Annual Meeting held in Helsinki in October we had the long winter ahead of us and we had to concentrate in the theoretical and administrative aspects of sailing for the following seven months. The Finnish District bulletin Lightning-Viesti was published three times during the year by the editorial staff formed from the Class officials of the District. District.

The first of six Ranking Series regattas was held in Lohja in early June with eleven boats participating. Before that we had had the annual "On The Rocks" regatta in Lake Tuusulanjarvi in mid-May. A total of 39 boats took part in one or more of these Ranking regattas but only 12 boats were officially scored in the Ranking results according to the rules of this series. This gives some idea of the activity of Finnish Lightning sailors at the moment. But active or not there still were 34 boats participating in the Finland District Championships held in Saynatsalo south of Jyvaskyla, the home of Fleet 328. The weather conditions during this regatta varied from total calmness and hot sushine to the worst rainsform and record rainfall of the summer. The races were most exciting and it was on the last leg of the last race when Saku Vento of Tuusula could have his sigh of relief when he noticed that Kari Maenpaa of Helsinki finished sixth instead of fifth in the last race. So, the Champion of 1981 is Saku Vento with crew Petri Wikman and Jussi Vesterinen. Saku, 19 years old, is also the Junior Champion of the year and has thus shown the old folks that we better look out for the juniors if we want to make it in future races. Also the Runner-Up, Kari Maenpaa with Erkki Maenpaa and Oki Wikman were juniors just a few years ago. Third was Osmo Savola of Kotka with crew Marianne and Reijo Puupera.

Unfortunately we didn't have any entries in the Europeans held in Sicily, Italy, but we are going to make it up next year in Greece. The Worlds which will be held in Chile in January 1982 have aroused interest among Finnish sailors in such a manner that we are going to see two boats with letter "L" on their sails at Pucon, Chile.

We are expecting to have a very active sailing season next year, because the Ranking series of 1982 is also the qualifying series for the 1983 Worlds in Naples, Italy.

Frank Atkinson, Jr. from the host club sailed very well to finish first, with Fisk Hayden from Lake Eustis the runner-up and Jim Alman from Biscayne Bay one point behind for third.

In July, Jack Swenson and Ken Watrous, representing Old Port Lightning Fleet, invited Biscayne Bay to a team race challenge at their facility. After five races, Mike Weber, Jim Alman and Frank Atkinson, Jr. won it for the visitors. A rematch is slated for the summer of '82.

Three Florida skippers sailed at the "North Americans" in '81; Tully Patrowicz and Fisk Hayden from the Lake Eustis Fleet and Jim Alman from Biscayne Bay. Jim won the Thermis Trophy for first-timers, and it was especially meaningful as it has been awarded since before Jim was born!

Also during the North Americans, the Executive Committee approved Fleet 461's request to move from the Southeast District to the Florida District, Our District Commodore, Fisk Hayden, was elected an International Lightning Class Association Vice-President. We're very proud of him!





The Lightning Class is alive and well in the state of Michigan! On July 9-12, skippers and crews manning 55 boats gathered at Grand Traverse Bay to compete in the largest Michigan District competition ever held.

The early arrivers on Wednesday had the opportunity to sail in a pre-race wind of 15 knots in 95° heat which warmed Traverse Bay water temperature to at least 58°! Unfortunately, the wind gods escorted the front eastward and the 55 competitors were frustrated to the limits with the light and shifty winds for the three days of racing. (The local weather band predicted 10-20 each day - so much for Nowell weather radio.) Four races were finally posted on the scoreboard - a fifth was abandoned after several hours of floating, frisbee, and tennis ball toss activities.

Bruce Goldsmith (Devils Lake) consistently sniffed out the shifts to finish in the top spot with a very impressive 3-2-1-2 victory. He was assited in this endeavor by wife Sherry and "Van" VanOoyen. Garry Demarest (always in training for a marathon run or a triathalon event) proved that you could swim, bicycle, run and race a sailboat - all in a day's work. He was particularly effective off the wind and his crew. Paul Bailey - a newcomer to sailing - was overheard to have asked Skipper Demarest if they were going so fast because he was "fluffing" the spinnaker more than the other boats! Never mind the jargon - the technique was very right! Garry's second place position consisted of 4-1-7-5 finishes. Rounding out the top nine which qualified for the North Americans were: Tom Jungjohann (Pontiac), Tom Babel (Traverse), Carl Engels (Gull Lake), Dave Nickels (Fenton), Hank Hodgson (Union Lake), Rick Frank (Pontiae), and Wally Smith (Pontiac).

Many thanks to Grand Traverse Yacht Club for hosting such a successful event. The fact that the National Cherry Festival was in progress added to the fun of the weekend. The festival fireworks display over the Bay was very impressive, and the lawn of the yacht club proved to an ideal spectator

The late scheduling of the North Americans made it impossible for many of the college age crews and teachers to go to Connecticut. And the promise of more light and shifty winds on Long Island Sound during August also dampened the enthusiasm of several skippers. This year was a prime example of why you should plan to attend such events despite "typical" weather patterns. As Brian Hussey so aptly put it upon arising one morning with sore muscles - "How nice! A little wind for a change!"

The Michigan junior sailors followed the example set at districts by setting an attendance record of their own at Junior Districts. Eight crews converged on Gull Lake July 18-19 and were treated to races on one of the most beautiful lakes in Michigan. Defending champion, John Mathers, making his last campaign as a junior, sailed his freshly painted and rigged 10850 to another victory. The excitement of winning the event was still fresh in his mind when on the return trip home, he rolled his car and boat over on the highway. The car was demolished, but skipper and boat survived the mishap in good shape. We understand that John is touring the country with a choral group right now, but hopefully he will be back in time to set his sails next spring.

Now for the rest of season. The first regatta is traditionally held on Lake Lansing. YES, they are still dredging. The Devils Lake team made up of Merrill Bales, Bruce Goldsmith, Jim Sayre, and Jack Tibbs sailed to a convincing victory. Pontiac was runner-up in the contest.

Saturday at Douglas Lake dawned gray and thunderstormy which was the prediction by weather forecasters for the entire weekend. But the Douglas Lake area was given a reprieve and by ten o'clock masts were being stepped and the Race Committee was setting a course — a more enthusiastic committee cannot be found and their efforts are appreciated by those of us who don't mind driving almost to the Mackinac Bridge for a regatta on a huge lake surrounded by virgin Michigan forest. For the first time of the season, a five race series was completed. They take their racing seriously up there! We were on the water til 7 p.m. Saturday and were back on the water in another brisk breeze by 9 a.m. Sunday morning. Arlyn Kinkel of Crescent and Douglas Lake, won his first Lightning regatta, with Hodgson 1/4 point behind. Harry Collier of Ohio was third, Louie Nickels (Fenton) fourth, and Dave Peters fifth.

The Higgins Lake Regatta is traditionally held in conjunction with a points series for Hobie Cats and other catamarans which number about 85. 1981 was a quite good sailing season with some great regattas from the beginning of May to the end of October. End of May the Swiss Championship was held at Murten and a good series of three races with winds up to beaufort 7 could be sailed. Then the wind fell asleep. Because only these three races could be sailed, and because only 19 boats instead of 25 took part at this championship, Jean-Claude DuPasquier didn't receive the official title of Swiss Champion by the USY (Union of Swiss Yachtingclubs). Nevertheless he won the title of a Swiss District-Champion 1981 ahead of Luthy, Lambelet, Weilenmann, Wyler and Durr.

A series of three other regattas throughout Switzerland were counted for the annual trophy "Kami-Kaze-Cup." The winner in Sempach and Fallanden was our light-wind-specialist Urs Schar. The regatta in Murten could not be sailed because of lack of wind. A fourth regatta was sailed at Gravedona on lake of Como with our Italian friends of Flotta-del-Lario (467). This event was won by Hanspeter Schmid with three firsts in steady and strong winds of beaufort 5. The best three swiss boats won the tropheo Ludovico de Marzi declared by us as the greatest regatta of the season. In the overall standing in the annual scoring Christoph Luthy was finally one point ahead of Schmid followed by Schar, Scharer, Weilenmann and Jager.

Nine boats travelled south to Marsala, Sizily to participate in the European Championship. For us Swiss it is always a great pleasure to sail at this fine place because we seldom have strong wind and sunshine the same time on Switzerland lakes. Hanspeter Schmid, who won the last Winter-European-Championship held at Marsala, was third in the overall standing and the best Swiss, although he is still sailing his older wooden boat and had less speed in planing conditions against the Swiss Euro Lightnings, the Sizilian, (also wooden) Pellegrino boats and the American Allen-boats. The former Champion, J. C. DuPasquier was sixth and Claude Lambelet who was elected again as vice president of the Swiss District was seventh, Luthy 12th and Wyler 13th.

Although we had several Lightning regattas in Switzerland, only three of them could be sailed with a participation of more than 12 boats. The most active was the Greifensee fleet 309, which will organize the next Swiss and District Championship in Uster.
