When he was not on the road on the New England regatta circuit, Dick sailed with us on Saturdays, and with his own fleet at Massebisic Lake, New Hampshire, on Sundays. We hope you both race with us next year.

For the second time in three years, Fleet 189 hosted the New England Districts. Twenty eight boats, including eleven Marblehead boats, sailed five races in light 5 to 12 knot breezes. John Collins could only race in two of the five races. Aided by Hollis' and John's no-shows, Rick Humphrey won his second consecutive Marblehead Race Week.

Our fleet is organized around a summer colony, so we start our sailing season later and finish it earlier than most clubs in our area.
