# DETERMINATION, AN EXCELLENT CREW AND PRACTICE WIN '82 JR. NA'S

In 1980 I crewed for Dan Dressel in the Sears Cup and we had everything going our way to win, but in the fourth qualifying race we broke our Thistle centerboard in half. Our dreams were shot. In 1981 at the Cedar Point Jr's I skippered and again had things going our way, but after our third in the practice race we broke the spar when the lifting bridle broke. All our psyche totally gone.

1982 rolled around and I was determined to win the last junior regatta of my life. My crew consisted of Mike Cummins and Mike Gaberr, whom all the juniors knew as "Gabes." Mike started racing two years ago at a small regatta in Ohio. In the last two years he has sailed about every regatta with me. Gabes has been sailing eight years, almost as long as I have. He and his family race Thistles.

Mike, Mike and I got together a few weeks before the juniors and started practicing. We arrived at BCC on Monday and set up the boat so that on Tuesday we could start sailing on Lake Erie. Tuesday we brushed with Dan and John McGowan. Wednesday was the practice race The Women and Juniors started together and after seven legs and two collisions, we were still able to cross the line first.

Finally Thursday rolled around and the " 82 Juniors were underway. The first race was started with the wind 8 - 10 from the west. We had a second row start and my crew got on my case about that (rightfully so). By the time we had reached the weather mark we had worked our way back to third behind Tom Fink, Peter Hallagan and Dan right on our tail. At the leeward mark the positions had not changed. We tacked right at the mark to clear our air and did not hear the race committee shorten the course to finish at the weather mark. At the finish Tom held on to win, Dan second, Pete third and we were a half boat length behind. John was fifth and Keith Taboada was sixth. The afternoon race was cancelled due to too much wind.

Friday we headed into SW wind $10-15$. We had an excellent start about five boat lengths from the boat and were leading at the weather mark with Keith and Pete close behind. Keith passed us on the second leeward leg and increased his lead the rest of the race. The positions stayed the same until the last weather leg. We covered Pete to try to make sure he did not catch us, but our attempt failed. Keith won by a couple of hundred yards. Pete was second and we ended up third. The race committee sent us back to the leeward mark for another race.

The wind lightened to 7-9 frm the west. We pre-bent and went for a leeward end start. We were at the pin on port right at the gun and were able to port tack the entire fleet! We led at the weather mark with Pete in second and Keith in third. Pete got by us on the next weather leg and led at the second weather mark with us second and Keith third. On the last weather leg I thought the wind was going left (HA HA - not at Buffalo) and split with Keith to try to catch Pete. At the finish Pete won, Keith caught us, we were third and Jody Swanson was fourth. After the finish the race committee directed us back to the leeward mark for the third race of the
day. We took our sails down and drifted back.
The wind picked up toward the end of the last race and was still building. Still from the west, but 15 and puffy. We had a good weather end start, but not as good as Tom's. He led at the weather mark and with his crew weight of 530 there was no catching him on the next very tight reach. We rounded second, Dan third and Jody fourth. Mike and Gabes said that only weighing 460 we could not catch Tom, but I did not agree. We never did pass Tom and he went on to win his second race. We held our position, Dan third and Jody fourth. The race committee had heart enough to let us go in now. We got the boat put away and hit the dock at 5:45, a long day for everyone.

After four races the standings were favorable for the three sailing "The Black Flash." We had 4-3-3-2=12, Keith had $6-1-2-6=15$, Dan had $2-5-5-3=15$, Pete had $3-2-1-10=16$ and Tom had $1-10-13-1=25$. There were the top five after four races and all five still had a good chance to win, because we were sailing a six race throwout series.

Saturday the wind was 10 NE and we had one race in the morning. We had to try not to make this race our throwout and make it a good counter. We went out about an hour before the race to check the wind and found out that every 15 minutes there was a 15 degree shift to the right. We planned our start accordingly. We were in the second row right at the committee boat and were the first boat to the right. Five minutes after the start the left was definitely favored and we were on the right. Pete, Tom, Dan and Keith were all doing well. Thank God we were right, about ten minutes after the start we got a 15 degree knock and had a comfortable 200 yard lead at the weather mark. The next leg lightened up and

got very tight. We rounded the jibe mark way in front and then the wind quit, only for us. Pete was second, Dan third and the whole entire fleet with full chutes. The wind got to us when Pete was about 25 yards behind. We rounded the leeward mark first and noticed a 30 degree shift to the left. We sailed higher than Pete and Dan. The course was not changed, but we did not gamble our lead and fly the chute. Keith rounded in 10th and was fourth at the so called weather mark. We led the next leg which was a good weather leg blowing 15-18. Keith rounded in second at the next mark, Dan third and Pete fourth. We flew chutes to the leeward mark and beat back through the fleet to the finish. No changes were made in the positions at the finish.
With the finishes this way only three people could win the regatta: us, Keith and Pete. In a tie we would beat Keith, but lose to Pete, so we decided we had to beat them and not worry about the rest of the fleet. The wind was from the North 18. We started the last race at the leeward end. Keith in the middle, and Pete at the weather end. We were locked up and could not do anything for a few minutes. After finally working above the guy above us. we tacked and to my surprise through the main window 1 could see Keith and Pete 200 yards to leeward. We covered them to the weather mark and rounded in 8th with Keith 10th, Dan 12th and Pete 13th. The reach was tight and we flew jibs like everyone else. The next leg was broad and everyone flew chutes. A puff hit about 25 and we got on some tremendous planes. After the puff ended we looked around and we were in 6 th, Keith 7 th and unfortunately Pete turned over. We rounded and starting covering Keith who in turn was covering Dan. Dan was able to end up second if he put two boats between himself and Keith. Finally Dan got away, but the wind came in from the left where Keith and I were. We rounded in third behind Tom and Gien Zimmerman. Tom and Glen went high on the tight reach blowing 22 while Keith and 1 stayed right on the
mark. Glen started to put up his chute and then Tom did, both had problems and got on their ear, but did not turn over. We passed both of them and rounded the jibe mark first. Tom rounded second with a full chute, Keith third and Glen fourth. Keith and I put up our chutes an we all rode a plane to the leeward mark with the wind blowing 25 . We broke our overlap and rounded first only to have a terrible rounding. The pole got stuck on the leeward jib sheet and we could not pull in the sails because of this. Tom was second, Keith third. The went a little left and we went right without a choice. Finally Mike freed the sheet and we could get back to some serious hiking to try to catch up and win the race. We tacked on a header and thought we had them, but no, Keith dumped on us forcing us more right. Thanks Keith! We got another header of 15 degrees tacked and crossed both Keith and Tom. We worked the boat hard until the finish and won the last race and the Championship! Keith crossed second and finished second overall. Tom finished third and was fifth overall. Dan sailed his throwout race sixth and ended up third. Pete ended up with a 19th and unfortunately was fourth overall.
Again I have to thank my superior crew Mike Cummins and Mike Gaver. I have never been as fortunate to have a crew as good as these two. I also have to thank the Lord and my parents for all their support. I have to congratulate Dan, the guy I've been sailing with and against my whole life. Keith did an excellent job the whole regatta. Pete had some bad luck in the last race, but sailed an excellent series. Good luck to everyone next year, especially Keith and Pete.
The race committee did an excellent job all week for the regatta and the Buffalo Canoe Club should be commended for the job they did.

Anne Allen sailed fantastic and won the Women's Regatta, congratulations. Congratulations to Jay for winning the ' 82 NA's. Hey, Jay, this is great!

As the boom swung over the spinnaker collapsed slightly then filled as Brenda got the pole on the mast and we were on our way to the next mark. The smiles broke out and "We made it" was heard all the way to the spectator boat. The committee shortened course as the wind kept increasing. On the weather leg I just couldn't seem to keep the boat going. Fay passed us without much trouble to win the race while Katie was close behind us for third followed by Judy.

The afternoon race was finally cancelled due to too much wind. We all relaxed, rested our tired muscles hoping for lighter air the next day.

I was unhappy with my upwind sailing. I listened to some of the Jr.'s discussing their race and tuning, asked some questions, did some thinking and talking with the men in my family. It was a very tight reach, we went high and maybe halfway down the leg we put the shut up (next time around we did it sooner). Judy went with us while Fay stayed low and never flew her shut. Things stayed about the same til the sixth leg when the wind lightened. At the finish it was Allen, Regan, with a close finish between Nicoll and Walker.

Race number three was back to back and started in light air. Jackie Nolan sailed a good windward leg to be first to the weather mark with us close behind followed by a whole bunch (I was glad to be out of that mess). We popped the shut quickly, Nancy played it for all it was worth and we finally got over Jackie. Fay was back in the pack, we hoped she would stay there but she sailed extremely well so that at the finish she was second followed by Pam Tuttle and then Jackie. As we crossed the finish line the committee announced, "The good news is you won the race, the bad news is we are going for another race." There was a little grumbling from the crew (I had been on them a little in the last race about hiking), something about we had been out there since before nine in the morning.
