# THE XI WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP IN PUCON, CHILE <br> by Walmor Soares Filho 

For me, Valerio Soares and Cezar Barbi the World's started the day after Xmas 1981 when we started our long journey to Chile. We went by car trailing our Lightning "Goiabada" for 3.722 kilometers through treacherous roads but beautiful country side. We arrived 4 days later in the middle of the night and ended up sleeping in the car in front the of the "aduana".

When we woke we were astonished; we sensed immediately why people had talked of Pucon's natural beauty. We drove to the Grande Hotel Pucon, the hosts of the S. American and World Championships. They weren't ready yet for sailors, so we found the "Hosteria El Precipito" right down the street. It was so enjoyable that we stayed there for the rest of the championship.

In that beautiful scenery, cold waters and "conguacitos" (a fly the size of a bettle) we unpacked "Goiabada" and started to think seriously of boat, tactics and the coming regattas.

We raced badly in the South Americans. We were nervous, couldn't get the boat to move well, and almost everything went wrong. We finished the S.A. in sixth place, a championship we were expecting to finish in the top 3. Our best race was a 2 nd which was achieved with very light winds in the fourth race. In the other races we finished 6 th 3 times, a 5 th and a 7 th. Not very promising considering that there were 13 S.A. boats, plus reigning World Champ Glen Darden and N.A. Champ Mark Bryant, who won 5 out of the 6 races. We were really disappointed with our racing and at one point thought of packing up and going home.

Between the S.A. and the Worlds we had two days free. We took advantage of the time and went to Santiago, 800 kilometers to the North. We went by over-night train and spent a full day sightseeing and shopping. This was a good break for us - not a word was mentioned about boats, sails, racing, etc.

Returning to Pucon we got back to sailing. We talked with Bill Shore about our tuning and sails. We decided to get a new jib and main. My Dad, Walmor Sr., Valerio, Cesar I had many talks together on tactics and psychology that really animated us. Thanks to these talks, the support from friends, the responsibilty ahead of us being the only Brasilian entry, are the reasons we pulled together and went on to win the coveted World Championship like this:
1st Race - Wind 5 to 8 knots from the South. Alberto Gonzales from Chile was outstanding in this race and fought with Jay Lutz the whole race. Jay's experience predominated and went on to win. Gonzales was 2nd, Sergio Messina from Italy 3 rd. We came in a mediocre 1 Ith.
2nd Race - Wind 5 to 10 knots from the Southwest. We got a good start and led for the first triangle. At the third mark we were about 50 meters ahead of Jay Lutz. A big shift favored Jay and he went on to win. We came in 2nd and Glen Darden was third.
3rd Race - Wind 5 to 8 knots from the Southwest. We again started well and had good boat speed. We led at the mark and pulled away on the spinnaker leg. On the last leg we had a good lead and we weren't too worried about the rest of the
fleet. We tacked toward the peninsula and almost lost our lead to Don Delorme sailing "Marmelade". Don sailed superbly, coming from 7th to a final second, and Bill Buckles was 3 rd.
4th Race - Wind very light and varied. This was the torture. The race strted at mid-day and was almost not completed. Glen Darden pulled away in the light winds. Glenn completed the first mark with about a 5 minute leeway and won with only 3 minutes to go on the $31 / 2$ hour time limit. A real drifter, positions changing constantly and what heat! Mark Bryant went from 10th to finish 2nd, Larry MacDonald 3rd, tom Allen Jr. 4th and we drifted in 5th.
5th Race - Winds 8 to 12 knots from the South. Before the start the R.C. shortened the course since it was close to 6 p.m. We were to sail a triangle and one windward leg. Jim Carso led most of the way but Richard Hallagan passed him on the last leg and won. Terho Aromaa from Finland raced beautifully and came in second. Jim Carson settled for a third and we took a hard fought 8th but well ahead of Darden's 11th and Jay's 36th. At the end of five races and considering one drop-out, the standings were the following: We were tied with Lutz with 16 points, Darden had 25 points and Carson 30 points.
6th Race - Friday January 15, 1982 the day of the "Chubasco". It was already difficult to get boats into the water due to one meter high waves breaking on the beach. Many boats needed tows from the Chilean Navy boats just to get over the breakers. At the start the wind was blowing about 25 knots and increasing. We got a reasonable start and hiked, and hiked! At the windward buoy Darden was a bit ahead, we were about 8th, but had a small lead on Jay Lutz.

Chutes were up and what a ride to the jibe mark. Before the mark the "chubasco" hit us with heavy rains and winds close to 90 kilometer per hour. Our rudder broke in half and we went over. Boats now were turning over right and left. We ended up at the end of the beach of the hotel and since the weather hadn't improved we left the boat there for the night.

## 6th Race - (Another try)

The weather Saturday morning didn't look too good. It was dark and grey and the wind was picking up into the twenties by the time of the start. Some boats went in, but most of the fleet waited until the last minute. Finally the race committee anulled the race and at exactly mid-day bad weather came again with terrific winds.

We won the championship 27 pts., followed by Glenn Darden 40 pts., Jim Carson 49 pts., Jay Lutz 52 pts., and Rodrigo Zuazola with 52 pts.

Never before had we been so honoured by the Lightning Class, the Organization Committee which gave their all to the Championship, and by the Chilean people who were so warm and friendly to all participants. We three sail other classes also, but the unity between Lightning Sailors is something that is not easy to find.

Congratulations to the many leaders of the Lightning Class.

Hope to see you all in Naples, Italy in 1983.
