Twelve Long Island District crews gathered at Southampton Yacht Club for the 1984 District Championships, held July 7th and 8th. Many of us Great South Bay and Hewlett Bay fleet members who attended were glad to have an opportunity to sail in the relatively deep waters of picturesque Shinnecock Bay, rather than "drag our centerboards through the mud" at low tide in our home waters.

The cold front/stationary front which had been inching toward us all week was still not past on Saturday morning, and an exceptionally strong southwesterly was blowing, with heavy rains. The combination of the high winds and poor visibility forced the cancellation of races for Saturday.

Sunday broke clear and cool, with a gusty north-northwester on the bay. Tim Rumph jumped out to an earely lead in race one, while Frank Atkinson struggled to hoist his jib on the spinnaker halyard, after a jib halyard failure right at the gun. Rumph rounded first, followed by Bruce Atkinson. The heavy breeze made for a fine ride on the reaches, but proved too much for Bruce Atkinson's mast, which broke in three places on the first reach. Tim Rumph managed to sail to a comfortable win, while Frank Atkinson passed Mike Gargiulo on the final beat to take second.

Tim Rumph, in the lead again at the weather mark in race two, could not hold his spinnaker on the first reach, and watched Frank Atkinson sail by under main and jib. Atkinson built an impressive lead to win, followed by Rumph and Bud Dailledouze. Going into the final race, Atkinson and Rumph were tied for first, with Gargiulo and Dailledouze tied for third.

The wind moderated for race three. The first shift after the start was to the right, and Bill Weiss and Erich/Gary Glanz seemed in good shape on the right side. However, the next shift was left, and Tim Rumph took that one right into the lead, and was never seriously challenged. Atkinson won a tactical battle with the Glanz brothers on the final beat for second place.

The Metropolitan District's 1984 season started with the Mid-Winter Seminar and Meeting held together with the Central Atlantic District and hosted by the newly revived North Shrewsbury River Fleet at the home of Mary and Sandy Huntsman (former ILCA President). Jack Huntsman and Jim (Fuzzy) Carson gave a seminar on high performance rigging. After short meetings the Huntsman's put on an excellent cocktail party and dinner.

Mets' sailing got underway with 40 boats sailing the Long John Regatta at Monmouth Boat Club (Fleet 70) on April 28-29 in 5-10 knot, shifty winds. In the first race the wind started out from the east. Most of the fleet went to the right but, when the wind shifted to the northeast the few boats that went to the left, led by Mark Doran, Jack Huntsman and Denis Farley. had a commanding lead. Jack passed Mark downwind and went on to win. followed by Mark, Denis, Jim Carson and Jody Lutz. In the second race, the wind was shifting between south and southeast. Playing the shifts, Sandy Huntsman rounded the weather mark first followed closely by his son Jack. Although Jack took the lead from his father at the jibe, Dick Hallagan of Newport Yacht Club was inside on a good lift to take over the lead on the second beat and went on to win. Sandy was 2nd, followed by Mark Sertl, Jack Huntsman and Glen Reitinger. In the third race Dick Hallagan won the start at the weather end and stretched his lead into a horizon job in the race and victory in the regatta. Jody Lutz came in 2nd in the race and the regatta, and Jack Huntsman finished 3rd in the regatta.

The two Huntsmans, Jon Schwartz and Rob Held of MBC journeyed to Seattle for the North Americans. Jack finished 9th in the Blue Fleet and Jon came in close behind in 12th. Rob Held was 27th. Tony Fink of MBC was third in the Junior N.A.'s in the Seattle and tied for first in the Junior World's at Metedeconk River Yacht Club, Ocean County, New Jersey, Larry Colantuono of MBC came in ninth in the Junior World's. Jack Huntsman also added second place finishes in the Atlantic Coast Championship, held at Little Egg Harbor, New Jersey and in the Delaware Governor's Cup at Rehoboth Bay to his long list of honors.

The Mets' Districts were held on Lake Mohawk in Sparta, New Jersey on June 16-17. Saturday began warm and sunny with no winds. After a postponement a light, shifty breeze filled in from the NE, which is normally the worst direction because of the steep hills on the east shore. The conditions resulted in various parts of the lake being heavily favored for a few moments at a time and consequently positions throughout the fleet changed radically and often. Finally, Mark Schneider of Lake Wallenpaupack managed to keep his boat moving with or without wind and finished first by a wide margin. Sandy Huntsman was second, followed closely by Denis Farley, Jack Huntsman, and Bob Graham of Lake Mohawk.

The second race was sailed in similar conditions, but this time Denis Farley avoided the light spots and won the race. Rob Held of MBC was second and Mark Schneider third. By the third race the wind had shifted to the SE but was still light and variable. Jack Huntsman jumped into an early lead and went on to win. Jon Schwartz was second and Tom Bierman of Lake Mohawk third. Most of the leaders had trouble adjusting to the wind shift as five of the top six boats in the regatta used this race as their throwout. Saturday night the Lightning sailors headed to the Lake Mohawk Country Club for an excellent cocktail party and sumptuous buffet dinner.

On Sunday a much stronger and steadier wind was blowing out of the south. Jack and Sandy Huntsman engaged in a close battle for the District Championship all day. Sandy won the fourth race, after several lead changes, with Jack right behind. Bob Graham was third, followed by Denis Farley and Rob Held. In the fifth race, Jack didn't seem to care that it was Father's Day and went on to win the race with Sandy on his transon. Mark Schneider, Bob Graham and Denis Farly were the next three finishers. The final results were close, Jack Huntsman had become District Champion again, beating out his father for the second year in a row by one point (8 to 9). Denis Farley, Mark Schneider and Rob Held rounded out the top five.

The Met's Mid-Hudson Circuit is sailed each year in June and July and consists of three regattas held, respectively, at the Nyack, Minisceongo and Chelsea Yacht Clubs. Once again, this circuit provided the full spectrum of wind, weather and current conditions. At Nyack, as the Lightnings began to leave the sheltered dock area for the starting area for the first race, a series of very strong gusts blew down the Hudson causing two Lightnings to

capsize. The remaining Lightnings decided to head for shelter and most were glad just to get in safely. Although the first race was abandoned, two races were sailed after lunch. And would you believe it? After too much wind in the morning, there was barely enough wind to sail against the current in the first race of the afternoon. Finally, the wind settled back in for the final race, permitting some solid competition.

Todd Klinger of Nyack won the regatta with near perfect first and second place finishes in the two races, while Tom Ingram of Cedar Point was second with a first and a third. Frank Atkinson from Great South Bay, Long Island, came in third overall. Stephanie Mayo of Nyack took home the fourth place trophy for her consistent sailing. Bill Cook of Nyack was very happy to finally get a trophy, even though it was a brass anchor for

finishing guess where.

One week later there was a heat wave for the Sutherland Regatta, the second leg of the Mid-Hudson Circuit, held at Minisceongo Yacht Club. Light winds and a strong current out of the north made it very difficult for the fleet to start the first race on starboard. Gary Hurban of Nyack did a dip start on port tack and was off in front. Then he crossed the main channel early, worked his way up the weaker current on the western side and left the fleet way behind. Bob Sengstacken of Greenwood Lake finished second and Rich Miner of Lake Mohawk was third, followed by Paul Krick of Minisceongo and Mike Pike of Chelsea.

In the second race, with slightly stronger winds, Mike Pike only looked at the fleet once as he crossed the starting line on port tack and never looked back as he led all the way to the finish. Rich Miner was second, trailed closely by Paul Krick and Bob Sengstacken. In the third race, the Bitler/Lewis team of Minisceongo won the start on port tack at the pin and, despite a barge in their way on the final leg, went on to win. Rich Miner was second in front of a fast-closing Bob Sengstacken. In the final tally, Rich Miner won the regatta on consistent sailing, followed by Bob Sengstacken.

In the Chelsea Open, the third leg of the Mid-Hudson Circuit sailed on July 14-15, the curents were the dominant factor even though the southerly winds were fairly good. The Bitler/Lewis team played the currents well, particularly in the second beat, to win the first race with Bob Sengstacken right behind. River sailor Gary Hurban also played the currents well finishing third, followed by Rich Miner. In the second race Sengstacken took an early lead and finished first, followed by Hurban. Due to an equipment failure, Rich Miner had to jury-rig his spinnaker with the jib halyard to hang on to third place. As the sailors headed for the cocktail party, dinner and dance (at which a good time was had by all) the results in the overall Circuit had become very close. After a throwout, Hurban was first with 12½, Sengstacken was second with 12¾ and Miner third with 13¾.

In Sunday's race Rich Miner played the current the same way the river sailors had on Saturday and finished first. The Bitler/Lewis team held off a strong charge by Gary Hurban in the last beat and finished second by two boat lengths. Bob Sengstacken was fourth. These finishes gave Sengstacken first in the Chelsea Open, followed by Miner, Hurban, Bitler/Lewis and Mike Pike. However, in the very close overall Circuit, Rich Miner took home the first place silver again with 14½, Gary Hurban was second with 15½ and Bob Sengstacken was third with 16¾.

The Mets' Short Circuit is sailed in the fall each year at Greenwood Lake, Lake Mohawk and Monmouth Boat Club. At Greenwood on September 8, after a wind delay, the first race was sailed in light winds in the south end of the lake with weeds being a major factor. Tom Bierman of Lake Mohawk won, followed closely by Bob Sengstacken and Nick Santoro, both of Greenwood Lake. After lunch, the next race was held further up the lake in good winds, deep water and no weeds. Rich Miner started on port and, after ducking a few sterns, was off to a good lead in clear air. Tom Bierman almost caught Rich on the second time downwind, but Rich hung on to win the race. In the third race a big wind shift to the left at the start made it difficult for the starboard pack of boats to get over the starting line. Ron Wulff of Greenwood Lake, who was above the pack, got off to a clear start and led most of the way. Tom Bierman caught him the second time around at the drop mark and won the race as well as top honors in the regatta. Bob Sengstacken was second in the regatta, followed by Ron Wulff, Nick Santoro and Rich Miner.

At Lake Mohawk on September 22nd, the second leg of the Circuit was sailed in light to medium southerly winds. In the first race, Rom Ingram of Cedar Point was first around the weather mark, but a pack of Lightnings was on top of him by the jibe mark. When the pack jibed, Bob Graham, who had been trailing the pack, out-foxed the whole group by not jibing and had a substantial lead by the drop mark. Bob went on to win, followed by Mark Schneider and Rich Miner. In the second race Graham led all the way to the finish. In the third race Wayne Catoe of Lake Mohawk got an early lead and rounded the weather mark first. Graham had a bad start but worked his

way up to second by the weather mark on two good tacks. Bob slipped by Wayne at the jibe and was off to his third straight bullet and victory at the regatta. Mark Schneider was 2nd overall, followed by Tom Bierman, Bob Sengstacken and Rich Miner.

In the last leg of the Circuit at Monmouth Boat Club on October 13, the Lightning sailors were met with 20-25 knots of wind which resulted in screaming reaches during all three races. Rob Held took top honors. The second place boat was skippered alternately by Sandy Huntsman, Bill Ewing and Larry Colantuono. Denis Farley came in third. No boats completed the overall Circuit, so Tom Bierman keeps the trophy for one more year.

Minisceongo's Last Blast Regatta was held September 29th, featuring good winds and tricky currents. George Bitler, who was retiring from racing Lightnings after 27 years, won the regatta followed by Paul Connell of Nyack and Bob Sengstacken. We are all glad that George won his last regatta as a Lightning sailor, but regret to see him retire to a Laser 28 and will miss the Bitler/Lewis team — George, his wife Barbara and Mark Lewis — who have participated in countless Lightning regattas over the years. After the sailing, the Last Blast cocktail party and dinner were an even bigger blast than usual.

As the 1984 season comes to a close, the Mets sailors are already looking forward to an even bigger and better season next year with good times, old friends and great sailing.

Bill McKinley, Louie Nickels and Colin Park took turns winning races with Colin and Louie ending up in a first place tie. Experience won out in the end as Colin beat Louie at the official coin flipping ceremony.

On to Gull Lake and Mike Rathbun's hot tub! The bad news was that the hot tub was down for repairs; the good news was that it was promised to be in working order for the fall regatta—and the winds for the weekend were good! Clarence Holman showed the fleet what reaching in heavy air was all about as he ate up the competition downwind. For the series, Clarence (crew of Bert Okma and Amy Hodgson) and Colin (crew of Glenn Hallett and Tracie Park) match raced down to the wire. Clarence won the fourth race, but Colin clinched the final race and the first place hardware. Jack Engels sailed very well but self-destructed in a couple of races and ended up losing a tie breaker to Dave Hatfield. The Family Hodgson—Henry, Karen and Wendy—showed consistent heavy air speed for "lightweights" and ended up fifth.

Clarence was not to be beaten the following weekend at the Crescent Sail Club's annual Father's Day Series. Doug Summers took the helm of Dad's Boat for the weekend and was off to a very good start on Saturday with a 1-3. The wind piped up on Sunday and storms threatened, but the five race series was completed. Dave Nickels was second, Tom Jungjohann third, Hank Hodgson fourth, and Arlyn Kinkel, fifth.

The Fenton Fleet rose to the occasion of their annual Team Racing event which requires a good deal of organization. Four man teams compete in match racing tactics which this year, resulted in a "duel" to the finish. It offers a different kind of challenge to the skippers and crews and is a pleasant diversion before the district competition. The final "duel" was between Bay City (Andre-Godwin, McCree, Schofield, Park) and the host club of Fenton (D. Nickels, G. Nickels, H. Nickels, Militzer). In this one instance the hosts were not very hospitable as they blew the Bay City team away, with the help of the very blustery breeze.

The 1984 Districts were held at Bay City July 5-8 in lots of sushine and good wind. After a general recall which NOBODY went back for, and an individual recal which EVERYBODY went back for, the fleet got down to serious racing. The race was finally underway in a 12-14 knot breeze which built to 20 by the final leg. Bruce Goldsmith led all the way with Colin Park, Clarence Holman, and Hank Hodgson behind in that order. While the Race Committee thought about the wisdom of another race, the fleet made up its mind and sailed in. Race 2 could wait. Saturday morning came with big waves and 20-25 knots of wind across the bay, but the breeze dropped abruptly, and two races were sailed in moderate wind with a bit of leftover slop. George Sipel led the junior fleet around his home lake, defending his '83 title. George was ably assisted by Dan Norton and Greg Walz, also of Devils Lake.

Traverse City moved their regatta to July and had a good turnout of 30 boats, but it should be better. It is a beautiful family vacation area, offers excellent sailing, and a very hospitable yacht club. Next year—be there! Garry Demarest showed up with a borrowed boat amidst rumors that he may be back sailing in the class in '85. Betty and Tom Vickers provided entertainment to the tune of "No, I thought YOU were holding the boat!" Betty showed true dedication by sacrificing dry clothes for boat and marriage! The races were sailed in a steady Northerly thermal on Saturday and a puffy offshore breeze on Sunday. Park won with John McCree and Regina Wieira on board, while Holman and his regulars finished second. Demarest was always in it for third nosing out a consistent (?) George Nickels (15-2-2-3-2). Paul Militzer with wife Louise and son Kyle sailed their new black boat to some nice finishes and fifth place. Mike Dow, out of

semi-retirement, had two good races on Sunday but did not crack the top five overall.

Higgins Lake was a little short of sailing due to light winds, but the party was great! Doug Summers reportedly surveyed previously uncharted parts of the island and is presently preparing a revised topographical map. "Mom" Vickers was worried during his absence. The following weekend at Devils Lake, Holman was off to a super start chalking up a first, but ended up second overall. George Buckingham, D. Nickels, and Jim Sayre (Devils Lake) were all hot on Sunday. Sayre was sailing his new boat for the first time and outsmarted the competition to win the fourth race. Buckingham was third for the regatta and D. Nickels fourth. Sunday morning Bruce showed another side of his many talents as he put together a great breakfast of omelets and Bloody Marys—then sewed up the regatta with steady sailing.

Matt Fisher joined us at Clark Lake and sailed a good series, but fell prey to "Smith's Corner" at the finish line as (Gold)smith pulled off a last minute miracle. Holman again sailed steadily in the puffy air and would have been the winner, but for being disqualified in the last race.





And when Wayne Watson spear headed the Junior District Regatta, Rob and Scott went down to the last race before the Junior District Champion was decided. Rob beat his brother to take the championship.


