The '85 season was not a very good one for our Class in the Argentine District. Our country has big economic troubles and it is difficult for yachtsmen of small one-design classes to race, or small cruising boats to sail to the beautiful anchorages at the Orient shore of River Plate, Uruguay country. Another factor in decreasing activity is that the Pan-American Games are still too far away, and many very good skippers like racing Snipes or Stars which have international events later this season in our country. Also, for market reasons, sail factories don't make Lightning sails and we need to buy imported sails, increasing the cost.

Wherever you go in Argentina you can find a Lightning on the lakes, but all are wooden boats with wooden masts and very old sails, racing against other classes (Portsmouth numbers), but it is too difficult to gather them to make fleets and race against boats with oval masts even using separate scores.

Starting the season, in early January we were worried because we couldn't get airplane tickets at lower rates to attend the South American Championship at Lima, Peru. At this moment some crews are looking forward to the '86 event at Colombia.

This year we worked to help the people who are making wooden boats with the new system, and we hope that the first one will be launched in December at Lake Pellegrini, near Cipolletti, 740 miles from Buenos Aires. However some Lightning "fans" sailed weckend regattas, and at the season's end in late December we will have about 40 races sailed. The best events of the year were at Lake Salto Grande, 250 miles from Buenos Aires, and the Escuela Naval Trophy, sponsored by Yacht Club Centro Naval, in which we had 10 entries in each regatta.

At this moment, late October, we are waiting for our National Championship in November and the International Olivos Race week in December In both events we hope for 12 entries, but in the last one also entries from other districts in South America.

We are looking forward to the '86 season and the Youth World Championship at Club Nautico Olivos, home of Fleet 206. Juniors from all countries will be welcome to the River Plate and Argentina.


