The Central New York District started its sailing season with the Newport Invitational Regatta held at the end of May. With the opening of the Bay, we could enjoy sailing for the first time on the open waters of Lake Ontario and the small lake atmosphere of Irondequoit Bay.

Thirty-nine skippers and their crew enjoyed the sailing, and the buffet dinner and bowling which was the Saturday night's entertainment. The winner was Peter Hallagan with Larry McDonald coming in second and Dick Hallagan third.

Cazenovia held its Invitational Regatta in the middle of June. There were 23 boats at this one, and all the sailors enjoyed the great sailing and the steak dinner in the evening. The winner was Dick Hallagan, followed by Jed Dodge and Dave Grogono.

The District Regatta was held at Skaneateles in mid-July. This was a warm-up for the 50th Anniversary Regatta which will be held here in July, 1988. Thirty-two boats attended which was one of the largest turn-outs for a district regatta in many years. One of the skippers was eleven year old Chad Sinn, probably the youngest skipper in the history of the regatta. Dick Hallagan won, Jed Dodge was second, and Tom Doran was third. Jesse Miller won the Commodore's Trophy, Landy Atkinson won the Rookie Trophy and Dick Tuttle was presented the "Ugh" Trophy.

Keuka held its Champagne Regatta on August 1. Twenty-one boats attended this third leg of the Triple Crown Series which this year, besides Keuka, included the Newport and Cazenovia regattas. Walter Taylor and the Bully Hill Winery again sponsored the Champagne Regatta and supplied the liquid refreshment for the evening cocktail party. The winners in order of finish were Dick Hallagan, Tom Doran, and Jed Dodge.

The Triple Crown saw seven boats compete in all three of the regattas. Dick Hallagan was first, Jed Dodge was second and Tom Doran was third.

The Michelob Lightning Classic was held at Oswego on August 15. This event has grown over the last few years into one of the highlights of the sailing season in Central New York. Thirty one boats enjoyed the great sailing, the great food and the great beer supplied at a very reasonable price. Everyone particularly enjoyed the dunking barrel which was Saturday night's entertainment. One dollar bought three chances to throw a ball and send a lucky sailor into the tank. The line to try and send Dick Hallagan to Davy Jones' locker was endless. Peter Hallagan was the winner of this regatta, followed by Jed Dodge and Tom Doran.

The Lake Erie - Central New York Challenge this year was one of the Oswego and the Silver Lake Regattas. There was no question about the winner, as Central New York sent 10 boats to Silver Lake while Lake Erie sent only two boats to Oswego. Sheer numbers, if not skill, decided in favor

of the Central New York District.

Our District's showing at the NA's this year was one of the best we have ever had: eight entries, three of those in the top ten, four in the Blue Fleet, and the Governors' Cup Champion, Wiley Crockett. All this with two of our stalwart sailors, Phil Lotz and Ched Proctor staying home to tend to future crew. Each of their wives gave birth the week prior.

On to Niantic. The Annual Governor's Cup Regatta, always a hot District Series, was won this year by Ched Proctor. He sailed a brilliant set of three races in very windy conditions to win the Regatta with three firsts. Donald Barrett was second followed by another up and coming sailor Dave Dickerson.

Cedar Point also had the kind of wind that this area is becoming famous for. Super heavy winds on Saturday resulted in a lot of sailors turning into swimmers and three broken masts. This weekend, it was Jim Crane's turn as he won every race. Off the water, everyone had a great time at the Saturday evening cocktail party and lobster dinner.

The year of 1987 will be remembered for the great sailing conditions in the District, except for the District Championship. This event was blessed with the doldrum winds that are characteristic for the Chesapeake Bay in the August - September time frame, but usually not in July. Fleet 325 hosted the Atlantic Coast Championship at Rehoboth Bay. Out-of-towners Brad Read and Greg Fisher took home the silver after giving the rest of the participants a lesson in sailing skills. Fleet 329 in Annapolis, Fleet 50 in Washington, Fleet 496 in Richmond, and Fleet 253 in Pennsylvania all sponsored events that provided a variety of conditions and entertainment. Success stories range from Phil Grotheer and his "Swill Dog" crew finishing sixteenth and Chris Raubacher charging right behind in blue fleet in the "NA's", to Joe Frieble wrapping up another win as the District Champion in extremely light air and Mary Anna Portner's tying the knot with Hugh Elliot in addition to winning the District Women's Championship. There are still attendees trying to recover from the wedding reception.

Fleet 50 is showing signs of resurrection after experiencing a few years of loss of boats and interested sailors. Frank Gallagher has been singularly instrumental in this improvement through his buying of boats and then finding a buyer that plans to keep the boat in the area and will actively race the boat in fleet and district events. Over the 26+ years that Frank has been sailing Lightnings, the number of boats that have passed through his ownership would probably surprise everyone and would make him the envy of every used boat salesman in the Washington/Annapolis area. Fleet 50's major regattas, have witnessed only four or five boats on the line, are now attracting ten to fifteen boats. There are even some "woodies" competing and they are giving the glass boats a run for their money. Another means of increasing the interest in sailing the Potomac is the creation of the Potomac Cup Regatta held in late April-early May. This is sailed at the site of a new marina being developed south of Washington just north of the Quantico Marine Base. This event has been sailed for three years now and has grown from five to fifteen boats. The water in the area is deep and the river wide, relatively free of power boats and accompanied by a great cookout on the beach. Watch the Flashes for the announcement in 1988.

The annual Lightning-Thistle challenge, also held on the Potomac, drew over twenty boats this year (11 Lightnings). The Lightnings prevailed again,

but the Thistle folks are getting serious as this event was an item of dicussion at the Thistle NA's. They are talking of elevating this regatta to a national level. That should prove interesting, but in the meantime this annual event will continue and hopefully increase in participation.

Early in the season, the newest fleet in the District, Fleet 496, sponsored their "Swift Creek Invitational for Lightnings." This event is held on a very picturesque lake in southern Virginia and attracts a host of partying sailors that are challenged by a variety of winds and a contest as to who (what) will be sacrificed to the Wind God. Usually a "Barbie Doll" is the chosen article, but this year a pair of old deck shoes also bit the dust. Phil Grotheer and his "dogs" took the honors thorugh aggressive sailing on the second day. Shortly thereafter, Fleet 329 sponsored the "No Gas Regatta" which had twenty one boats representing several areas "up north" in addition to local talent. The object of this regatta is to run short courses and have as many races as possible. If everything cooperates there could be as many as twelve to thirteen races held. This year the wind did not cooperate but six races were held and when the dust cleared Peter Hall from Canada was in front with Larry MacDonald second and Mark Sertl third. Steve Bachman and Doug Heussler representing local talent capturing fourth and fifth.

The annual finale is the "Frigid Digit" at Annapolis and the "Borderline" at Kerr Reservoir on the Virginia/North Carolina border sponsored by Fleet 481 out of the Southern District. These events have been tied together with an overall championship trophy. They are always on sequential weekends and attract boats from several areas which result in thirty to forty boats on line skippered by many of the top Lightning sailors in the eastern U.S. This year both regattas had over thirty boats on the line. The Borderline event had 34 with representatives from several states. Simion Coxe upheld the Dixie District reputation by placing a strong fifth with Allen clan and a guy named Hallagan grabbing first, second and third respectively, "Doc" Gilbert won the best natured award by using an experienced crew just to have fun. The hospitality and social events complement the great sailing that always occurs. If you haven't sailed these events, you're missing a most enjoyable time.

Once again the sailing season has finished, and so it's time to look to the past, present and future of the Lightning Class in Finland. After a few years stagnant situation, our different activities are again increasing, which was noticed already in the last Year Book. New sailors have found our Class, some new boats have been built and also used boats are again wanted among sailors. The number of active sailors has increased thanks to the possibility to get new boats from our country. Our training system for all members of the Class has gained a lot of interest both with the top sailors and those sailing in the middle of the Class. Next year will be an anniversary year and we expect to gain some new sailors and perhaps some publicity. The future of the Lightning Class seems to be good.

In this season the sailing activities concentrated on the beginning of the season and around the District Championship the beginning of August. However, already in December two crews took an early start and participated in the Winter Championships in Marsala, Sicily. Hartti Nisonen was third and Jussi Karkkainen sixth. We'd like to thank again the hosts and especially the C.V.M. for lending us a boat.

In Finland we started our season with some training. Bill Shore visited us in April and an opportunity for discussions and sailing was arranged. The sailing was done literally "on the rocks" when three boats and some sailors took their first taste of salt water and tried to avoid collisions with ice blocks.

The beginning of the sailing season was scheduled to be very tight because the Europeans were arranged so early as the middle of June. The crews who planned to sail in the Europeans needed training and so they participated in every possible race, and used every possibility for training. We had organized three of our ranking regattas and many training sessions trying to get the team properly drilled before participating in the Europeans. Only three boats travelled to the Europeans in Italy, Chris Winter with Sure Sales, Terho Aromaa with Masi IV and Hartti Nisonen with his

new Asterix. In Numana there was a wonderful time both in the race area and ashore. Despite our efforts the success was not very good, Chris Winter being 14, Terho Aromaa 15, and Hartti Nisonen 16.

After the Europeans, the next major event was the District Championship. This year the Districts were sailed at Hanko, which is located on the
coast about 100 km west of Helsinki. Twenty-four boats participated,
which was a little less than last year. The whole summer had been cold and it
was the same in Hanko. This decreased the activity because camping in cold
and rainy weather is something only for masochists. However, the clubs
sauna was warmed every day and this was a real pleasure after a few hours
freezing on the sea. As usual, we had all kinds of weather ranging from total
calmness to a real storm. Kari Maenpaa, Erkki Meanpaa and Kimmo
Aromaa with Vahine and Chris Winter, Petri Cederlof and Mikko Maatta
with Sure Sales were the top boats. Once again Kari was the best, but this
time he had to do more work than in the past few years. Pertti Pyy sailed
with his daughters Leena and Maija and finished third.

This year the Finland District ranking series included a total of eight regattas. The first was sailed in the middle of May and the last the beginning of September. Thirty-three boats gained a result in the series. Chris Winter was first. Jussi Karkkainen, who used a different name for his boat in every race, was second and Terho Aromaa third.

1988 will be an anniversary year both for the International Lightning Class and for the Lightning sailors in Finland. The District of Finland has the pleasure to arrange both the European Championship and Youth Championship in 1988. These regattas will be sailed at Tampere the end of July and beginning of August. We hope and expect to see many sailors all over the World this next summer in Finland.

There are two active fleets in the Indiana District. One is Fleet 154 sailing at the Wawasee Yacht Club on Lake Wawasee in Syracuse, Indiana and the other is Fleet 270 sailing at the Indianapolis Sailing Club on Geist Reservoir near Indianapolis, Indiana. There are thirty five registered Lightnings in Indiana affiliated with Fleets 154 or 270, and about thirty more that are not.

Fleet 270 hosted the Indianapolis Open on May 2 and 3, which has become the popular "season opener" for the Midwest Lightning racing season. Thirty one boats from Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Illinois and Wisconsin competed in what turned out to be a very unusual (weather-wise), light air, two race regatta won by Bill Faude from Milwaukee. The light air lead to some spirited shoreside volleyball and other whatnotery, including some sort of weight loss wager between George Buckingham and Bruce Goldsmith.

Fleet 154 hosted the District Championships on June 20 and 21, and ten boats competed. After five races on Saturday and Sunday, in light to medium air conditions, Alan Fox won convincingly with two firsts and three seconds. Alan proved again that there is no substitute for consistency. Doug Schmahl was runner-up with 9½ points and Fred Buckingham was third with 11¼ points. Had Fleet 154's John Nixon not been a no-show on Saturday (Old age caused him to forget?), he could have placed much higher.

Although not an Indiana District event, the 1987 Pan American Games were held in Indianapolis in 1987, and the Michigan City Yacht Club, sailing on Lake Michigan, was the venue for the yachting competition. Several Indiana District skippers, crew and friends observed the final Lightning race from "Ruyiyat", a Hatteras 57 out of Michigan City, and when the squall blew in shortly after the race ended, I can assure you that fifty seven feet of motor yacht is more comfortable than nineteen feet of Lightning!

Fleet 154 hosted the 28th annual Hoosier Regatta on Lake Wawasee on October 10 and 11. Seventeen boats from Michigan, Indiana and Wisconsin competed in a cool (cold?), light air (no air?), two race weekend. Mastering the unusual conditions, Colin Park sailed to two firsts, and won the regatta for the third year in a row. The unfavorable weather forecast and a conflict with Buckeye Lake's Snowball Regatta hampered attendance this year, but this is a fun, easy going regatta and next year will be a good one.

The format is no crew limits, no entry fee, no trophies, no protests and sail as many races as possible. This is a great way to start the sailing season.

The first weekend in June Lansing Sail Club hosted their regatta on Lake Lansing. Five races were sailed in two beautiful days with open water sailing on Saginaw Bay. Saturday was also the first bad weather, with a thunderstorm causing the boats to run for shelter after one race. Sunday was clear and sunny. Crescent Yacht Club on Lake St. Clair hosted their annual Father's Day Regatta. Saturday was clear and bright for all three races. Sunday, however, was gray and windy causing a two to three foot chop. Hank Hodgson, sailing with his daughter, Lisa and Bruce Goldsmith as a third were the winners of the Father's Day Trophy. The last weekend in June Lake Fenton hosted the annual Team Race Regatta. Team racing is done with four boat teams with each team racing one another in a round robin fashion. intended) and won their own regatta. Seventeen boats participated including eight from the local fleet.

The New England Districts were held at the Mallets Bay Yacht Club on Lake Champlain, a class organization who did a first rate job sponsoring this championship. Thirty-two boats raced, with a noticeable increase in young competitors skippering boats.

The Spofford Yacht Club in Southwestern New Hampshire hosted the New England Junior Championship. Jason Gemmell with his sister Amy and Jennifer Mann bested the six boats competing.

Next was the Wellfleet regatta on Cape Cod which usually provides strong sea breezes and good racing.

Squam Lake on "Golden Pond" was to be the final tune up for the North Americans, however, perhaps most had their boats in dry dock preparing for the "N.A.'s".

September was a busy month with three regattas in southern New Hampshire. The Massabesic regatta was held in moderate to light conditions with intermittent rain showers that turned to torrential rains on Sunday. We did manage to get three races together with Ray Harrington again taking first with the Gemmells second and George Dyett of Massabasic third. The Dyett family was well represented on this regatta with three skippers and Shirley as crew in a fourth boat. Norm "Pappy Goose" Dyette is the old "pro", with sons George and Kenny each skippering their own boat. Kenny, a relatively new skipper, managed to win the third race for a fifth overall.

Bow Lake held a one day regatta hosted by Ned and Jeannie Hines. This

The Columbia Sailing Club provided such light air that 11 Lightnings and 20-some Y-Flyers were only able to get in two races. After postponing the first race so long that the race committee had to go to the clubhouse and bring the beer keg out on the water, the wind filled in enough to start what looked to be a reasonable race. However, it died quickly and resulted in ghosting conditions. Krawcheck took home the silver once again.

Our final regatta was the Atlanta Cup held in October. For the third straight year the wind blew hard, real hard. This year a hand-held anemometer clocked it at a steady 29 gusting to 35. Two tough heavy air races on Saturday made for a quiet evening for tired sailors, but Sunday was much more genteel with light, shifty breezes. Bob Wardwell invaded the Southeastern District and won the regatta for the second year in a row.

Ten boats qualified for the season championship: Lenny Krawcheck, Bob Harkrider, Clay Rumble, Bennie Moultrie, Jeff Annis, John Pelosi, Bob Shingler, Gil Klemann, Carl Muska and Bob Wilkins.

A new fleet was chartered last year in Knoxville, TN, and this fleet will sponsor a regatta in 1988 which will be added to the Southeastern district schedule. Welcome to the district, Knoxville sailors!

At the 1987 annual meeting, David Sears was elected Commodore and Clay Rumble repeats as Secretary/Treasurer. Also, at the meeting we resolved to hold informal, instructional meetings next year after each Saturday's racing.
