The Brazilian District sponsored the XXXV South American Championship and the IX Naval Schools South American Championship which was held in the city of Ilhabela during the month of April.

"It's easy to get there from here", were the key words heard in Central New York this summer. All eight active CNY fleets are located within a relatively compact geographic area, so it was the rare traveler indeed who needed to spend much time on the road en-route to one of our six regattas.

With the obstacle of distance largely neutralized, three of our 1989 regattas drew more than 30 entries and all were well attended. Additionally, the level of competition improved. Twelve skippers tasted victory in district races this year compared with a mere five in all of 1988.

Good regatta attendance can have its down side though; the motivated crews tend to focus on regattas rather than club racing. In fleets where two or three boats missing from the starting line affects the success of an entire racing series, this problem is surely as old as one design racing itself.

After a dismal 1988 club racing season, Oswego Fleet 485 decided to shoot a corner and change fleet races from Saturday to Tuesday nights. Bingo! The 14 member fleet reported EVERY boat out several times, and averaged eight to nine starters through the summer series, up from three to four last year. If you wonder how this could happen, ask yourself, what did I do on Tuesday nights last summer? Can't remember? Case rested. On Tuesday skippers didn't have any trouble finding willing crew, and the travelers were able to scratch the itch twice a week instead of once. As a bonus, the after-sail parties were better attended in their new twilight time slot.

Elsewhere, Central New York's long established fleets "kept on keepin' on". Fleet 77, our largest, worked on learning to love powerboat wakes and lake rollers. Fleet 164, Cazenovia, held its usual successful Sunday series. Fleet 225, Henderson Harbor, conducted its colorfully named racing events once more — say, just what is the "Pickslay Ramble" guys? Everyone had something new and exciting to talk about too. For Newport it was being named to host the upcoming 1990 North Americans; in Cazenovia it was Dave Bull dumping the "sub" and ordering a light new coat ("No More Bullship", Dave?); and in Henderson it was the emergence of the first traveling HHYC skipper of the 80's — Jack Jones.

The comeback story of the summer took place at Keuka Yacht Club, home of the fabulous Champagne Regatta. Fleet 252 rebounded emphatically after several off seasons, gaining several new members and experiencing a major increase in participation and enthusiasm.

Oh yeah, the regattas. Fleet 77's Newport Invitational opened our season as is the tradition in CNY. Thirty-three teams enjoyed the stimulating early season double challenge. To win at Newport, a crew must sail well not only Saturday on the open water of Lake Ontario but also beneath the towering bluffs of narrow Irondequoit Bay where Sunday's races are sailed.

Dick Hallagan got the first of his four CNY victories by virtue of his consistency. His winning point total included two sixth places in the five race event but almost everyone else had at least one race in double digits. Tri-skippers Bram Palm, Peter Hallagan, and Jean Palm (team ("Round Robin"), finished second overall after taking strutting rights into Saturday night's dinner party.

The top five was rounded out by 1987 North American Champion Larry MacDonald, 1987 North American runner-up Jed Dodge, and about-to-be 1989 North American Champion Tom Allen Jr. Takes your breath away, doesn't it fellow guppies!

Two weekends later 25 crews snuck over to Willow Bank Yacht Club for our district's best kept secret — The Cazenovia Invitational. The lake is tiny, the winds unfathomable, and everyone has an equally frustrating time of it. Year after year they go away earnestly swearing they'll never come back. Yet somehow this regatta has charm and personality and tests skills as no other. The hard core sailors wouldn't miss it for anything.

Since Saturday's winds were in the 15 knot range, A#1 Race Committeeman Art Dieffendorf went ahead and banged off four races in anticipation of a possible return to normal Sunday. After the evening steak dinner and associated goings on, participants were greeted by an anomaly Sunday morning; the light air didn't develop and race five was also sailed in stiff breezes. Hallagan grimly refused to yield the slightest hint of satisfaction to the watching perpetrators as he discovered his Mainsail installed backwards and neatly rolled and secured to the boom Sunday morning. On the water he couldn't be touched again and won with 7.5 points. Jedder Dodge was next followed by the torrid Don Barter. Dave Bull and George Sereno were fourth and fifth.

Ithaca Yacht Club hosted the 1989 CNY District Championship Regatta. Through the efforts of Jessie Miller and others, the club put on a fine event which also was blessed with great winds.

For many of the newer skippers this was the first regatta they had ever sailed where top amateur Dick Hallagan was not present (Worlds).

Sailmaker Kirk Reynolds filled in for Dick very nicely, winning the first and last races of the series and holding off sailmaker Chip Evaul by two points overall. Oswego amateurs Joe McCloskey, Art Tirrell and Clay Murphy were third, fourth and fifth. McCloskey won race three for his first CNY District victory. Encore, Joe!

The gray boat was back for the ELYC Regatta held at Henderson Harbor YC on the eastern end of Lake Ontario July 23-24 and in usual form as well. Dick "try a little of this Ouzo fellas" Hallagan put together three deuces and two bulletes to win by more than ten points over Class President Bob Wardwell. Kirk Reynolds teamed up with Bill Wilson for third, and Jed Dodge hung on for fourth.

The 1989 Michelob Lightning Classic was held August 5-6 at Oswego YC. Put simply, this was a good regatta. Entries from seven states and Canada joined with Lake Erie and CNY boats to form a 60 boat fleet, up

eight from 1988.

Team "Round Robin" won Saturday's only race in a dying westerly to forge an early lead. Sunday's breezes were more reliable until race three which began with a 30 degree veer just after the start. Boats that started to the right were rewarded with a dandy lead. Once again the Palm/ Palm/ Hallagan team was well positioned and won the regatta with Edson White second, Chip Evaul third, Jed Dodge fourth and Bob Wardwell fifth. This regatta is becoming established as a top regional lead-in to the annual North Americans and is now beginning to rival the largest one design regattas sailed anywhere.

Last on the district agenda was the Dulles Cup Regatta established by revamped Fleet 9 in 1988. Dick Hallagan made it four wins for the season. Others in the top five were Clay Murphy (2), Dave Bull (3), Jack Jones (4)

and Landy Atkinson (5).

Around the District there were numerous signs of vitality. Central New York grabbed back the CNY/LED Challenge crown by the sheer force of numbers. The Challenge uses a convoluted scoring system which only Judy Walker of LED seems to understand. But that's all right. As long as LED keeps naming the Silver Lake Harvest Regatta as it's event, there's no way we'll every lose again. Our guys like that one better than theirs do!

We mentioned that the competition got better this summer. Names like Barter, Beuchner, Carnes, Finn, Gocker, Kuhns, Mastro, Raham, Thompson and White all showed up in the top half of the fleet at many events to challenge those with an edge in experience. The top sailors have been put on notice; in '90, it'll be "same game, NEW winner!"

The Florida District 1989 year showed growth with the addition of Fleet 504 sailing out of the Clearwater Yacht Club. It was also a year in which regatta participation increased, and a year that showed some high levels of sailing from the former middle and back of the pack sailors. Among the notable improving skippers are Ed Cabassa and Enrique Torruella sailing Top Gun, Carol Stout sailing Olivia, Clark Higgs sailing boat 13285, and Bill Meyer sailing Fired-Up.

Nineteen Lightnings competed in the districts hosted by Fleet 502 at the Davis Island Yacht Club. Eamonn DeLisser, Clark Higgs, and Carol Stout competed in the North Americans in the Presidents' Cup Fleet, and all had

strong individual races in the series.

The Adams Cup was hotly contested by seven outstanding teams of women from sailing clubs around the State, with Sandy Scheda and crews Gail Hauesler and Penny Hall of Suncoast Fleet 502 advancing to the finals and placing fifth overall. At the end of their first day of racing they were in first place, and a mishap in the heavy air of the next day dropped the 379 lb. team back in the standings, but we are certainly proud of them and all our women Adams Cup Competitors.

The Triple Crown is a three Regatta series held at Coconut Grove, Davis Island, and a third Regatta set by vote at the annual Meeting. This year the series ended at the Red Lobster Regatta in Sanford. The results of the last

regatta were held for weeks before the participants knew where they stood, and the Florida sailors were furious with the race management at the "Red Lobster". The paper trail finally revealed the Triple Crown overall winners: first, Eamonn DeLisser; second, Kevin Downey; third, Cabassa/Tourrella; fourth, Bill Meyer; fifth, Carol Stout.

Through Commodore Clay Rumble's help the district was able to raise additional funds from advertising in our district newsletter, The Spinnaker Sheet (a special thank you to all advertisers that helped us), which provided us to present beautiful trophies to skipper and crew for this years qualifiers.

In keeping with Southeastern District tradition, the Augusta Sailing Club was proud to host our first regatta on April 22-23. Sixteen boats arrived for what turned out to be a beautiful weekend to renew our sailing spirits. Light to moderate winds all weekend provided us a great opportunity to get back in the swing of things. Lenny Krawcheck sailed a consistent four race series and took the accolades in this first district event.

The following week the Knoxville fleet sailed their Dutch Treat Regatta in which the Lightnings teamed up with Windmills. The weekend turned out to be a very enjoyable one with eight to fifteen knot winds and a steak dinner and keg party Saturday night. Jonathon Lange finished first showing that local knowledge does provide an edge.

On May 6-7 district sailors found out what heavy air sailing was all about. High Rock Lake was located in the middle of a tornado that passed through North Carolina that weekend. Saturday, as we ventured our way out to the starting line, the racing was cancelled due to tornado watches in the area. Charleston, S.C. was the sight of our next regatta, the SAYRA Inshore Championship. The weekend provided great sailing conditions with steady 12 to 15 mph winds and long championshp courses. Lenny Krawcheck used his home town knowledge and was able to capture first place.
