This year we celebrated the start of the next half century of the Lightning design and the close of the first half century of Lightning sailing on Greenwood Lake. We are extremely lucky to be able to look back and see that instantly the Lightning was recognized for the class boat we all know that it is and also to be able to thank those early sailors who started us on a sailing course in Lightnings.
