Many C.A.D. sailors used this race to test new equipment and figure out new sails; it was fun for all who attended.

June saw several C.A.D. members traveling to various regattas with great success. Rich Warren from Surf City fleet and crew took a third in the Cedar Point spring tune-up. Jack Elfman continued his winning streak at the Governor's Cup in Rehobeth, Maryland. Brian Taboada and crew also made a good showing in this regatta as well as on the go carts on Saturday night.

Brant Beach hosted the New Jersey States in late June with the top three places going to C.A.D. sailors. Judy Lutz from Metedeconk fleet took home the gold with Keith Taboada and Jack Elfman following closely behind. This continues to be a fun regatta where several neighboring districts get together on a yearly basis for an enjoyable weekend of racing and socializing.

The District Championships were held at Bay Head Metedeconk Y.C. this year and proved to be a highly competitive regatta vying for the opportunity to sail in the North Americans. Keith Taboada and crew, Brian Taboada and Russ Schon, fresh from an impressive victory at the Rochester Classic, looked to be the boat to beat. With winds blowing heavy on the first day, the Toaboada crew showed their skill down wind and pulled away from the fleet. The final standings saw Taboada with first, Elfman in second, Djord Hoekstra in third, and Jim Carson of Metedeconk, Bob Adams of Bay Head, Rich Warren, Craig Dooran of Metedeconk and Paul Gelenitis rounding out the top eight boats. The following Monday, Metedeconk River Y.C. hosted the Jr. C.A.D. regatta which proved to be equally competitive and a great showcase for our younger skippers. Greg Kinzel of Metedeconk and crew took the Championship with Andy Temme of Surf City following with a close second and Will Bogardus in third. The C.A.D. is extremely proud of our younger sailors and are excited about their enthusiasm and success. Names like Vogt, Maiden, Lang, Temme, Kinzel, and Bogardus are ones you will hear about in the future!

The C.A.D. was amply represented in Rochester for the North American Championships with all seven qualifiers making the trip north. We had three boats in the Championship fleet and four in the President's cup as well as one boat in both the masters and juniors. Keith Taboada and crew took a sixth in the championships with consistent finishes, qualifying for both the Pan-American Trials and the World Championships. Congratulations to the Taboada boat! Jack Elfman and Paul Gelenitis struggled through the fog and finished in the middle fo the Blue fleet. Djoerd Hoekstra and crew, Will Bogardus and M. Buczkowski, finished second in the President's Cup for the second year in the row - nice sailing Djoerd! Rich Warren, Jim Carson, and Craig Dooran also sailed in Green fleet. Jim Carson, and crew. Bob Burridge and Joe Buozkowski, sailed to fifth in the hotly contested Masters Championship; which Greg Kinzel and crew, Todd Pierce and Nancy Schon, took a sixth place in the Junior Championship. (Personally, the highlight of this writer's N.A.'s was the time spent in Silk O'Loughlin's waiting for the fog to lift.)

The 1990 season ended with several fine finishes in some of the Fall Regattas. Keith Taboada kept up his winning ways at the Manahawkin Bay Cup. Glenn Rietinger of Brant Beach and John Faus of Barnegat Light both placed in the top five at the Southhampton Fall regatta. Jack Elfman won a very competitive frigid digit regatta in Annapolis, while Jim Carson took a second out of forty-one boats at the Borderline Regatta.

The number of weekend sailors involved in the Barnegat Bay Yacht Racing Association and the Long Beach Island Yacht Racing Association is growing and includes a list of many impressive sailors. They spent many long hours planning and organizing and with the help of the sailors of the Central New York Lightning District were able to cover all the bases in organizing the championship. Congratulations are in order to Dick Hallagan who won the Master Championship and Women's Champion Jean Palm. They represented our district well.

We saw some interesting things while going over our regatta statistics. The total number of boats sailing in our regattas was down from 186 last year to 180 this year, but we had one less regatta in 1990, and the average number of boats per regatta increased from 31 to 36. Triple crown participation remained the same with seven boats in both years.

The season started off with the Newport Invitational in early June. Racing was held on the waters (and in the fickle winds) of Lake Ontario and Irondequoit Bay. CNY sailors who placed in the top 10 were Mark Sertl, Tom Doran, Kirk Reynolds, Bram Palm, and Dick Hallagan.

Two weeks later the District Championship Regatta was at Cazenovia. There were 33 boats vying for the 20 spots allotted to our district for the North Americans and the competition was intense. The Race Committee was able to get in 5 races despite the very light winds on Saturday and the top 5 finishers were Bram Palm, Mark Sertl, Kirk Reynolds, Clay Murphy, and Dick Hallagan.

Keuka once again held its fabulous Champagne Regatta after taking a brief hiatus in 1989. Bully Hill Winery has sponsored this regatta for several years and we were glad to hear that Walter Taylor, founder and owner, was making a good recovery from the serious injuries he sustained in an auto accident. We took turns signing a large get-well card for him and hope that he will be returning to the up-state area soon. Fleet 252 did its usual great job with its champagne cocktail party, dinner and dance. The top 5 finishers (in sailing, not at the cocktail party) were Dick Hallagan, Art Tirrell, Clay Murphy, Jim Gocker, and Landy Atkinson.

Henderson Harbor held its ELYC Regatta in mid-July. Attendance was up with 27 boats for this event as word spreads that there is good racing, great food and a friendly atmosphere there. First place went to Bob Wardwell, who sailed out of Henderson Harbor for many years. CNY sailors who finished in the top five were Dick Hallagan, Art Tirrell, and Tadd Helmer.

The CNYYRA Regatta was held at the Ithaca Yacht Club on July 28-29. Landy Atkinson won his first regatta and was treated to a dip in Cayuga's waters by his appreciative crew.

The annual Michelob Lightning Classic was held in Oswego on August 11-12. They matched their attendance of 60 boats from the year before and outdid themselves with their organization, food, beverages and racing. Eagle Beverage has sponsored the regatta for many years and has earned the gratitude of sailors from all over the country who have attended this great event. There were many out-of-district sailors this year because they were using this as a tune-up for the North Americans being held the next week at Rochester. The Triple Crown regattas this year were Newport, Keuka, and Henderson. Seven sailors attended all three events and, in order of finish, they were Dick Hallagan, Tom Doran, Clay Murphy, Dave Bull, Jim Finn, Jack Jones, and Dan Koretz.

The season ended with the Silver Lake Regatta which was the final event in the Central New York — Lake Erie District Challenge. Washington's Fleet 50 held the Annual Potomac Cup at their soon to be new sailing site — Leesylvania's State Park. Because the ramps and hoists hadn't yet been installed the thirteen boats relied on 4x4's to tow the boats across sand which then were carried into the water. The great sailing conditions and cold Becks beer proved for alot of fun which makes this regatta one of this District's highlights. The top finishers were Bob Wardwell - first, Jim Dillard - second, and Ron Grotheer - third.

Rehoboth Bay Sailing Association was the host for the Dixie District Championships. Once again the beach provided for great competitive sailing and post sailing activities. Saturdays sailing was moderate and shifty. Although the conditions were inconsistent Don Delorme sailed consistent, winning the first race. Bob Wardwell took the second race. RBSA provided a great clubhouse dinner, and then it was off to an evening of amusements. Soon after the dinner, sailors converged at the "Slick Trak" to see how long they could last before getting kicked off by the attendents. Even after Steve Bachman's sailing absence, he easily reclaimed his "Slick Trak" title.

Sundays steady breezes of 15 to 18 mph made the races very close with race three going to Steve Bachman, race four going to Ron Buchannan, and the fifth race to Fred Mertes. Again it was consistency by Don Delorme and his crew which earned him the championship in a very well sailed regatta. The top three finishers were all within two pionts, with second going to Steve Bachman, and third going to Fred Mertes.

The District was represented in the North American Championships in Rochester, New York with three boats. Fred Mertes, Bob Wardwell, and Simeon Coxe. Both Bob and Fred sailed in the Presidents' Cup and Simeon rallied for third place in the Governors' Cup. Dr. James Gilbert of Alexandria placed 9th at the Masters which was sailed at the Newport Yacht Club, in a fleet of 21 boats.

Kentmore Park held its almost bi-annual Sassafras Regatta. This regatta always features great fun and lots of great sailing. Don Delorme sailing consistently Saturday was in top place after Saturdays racing, but after Sundays racing, top awards went to Mark Schnieder in first, Dr. Tom Hopkins in second and Howard Edson in third place.

Fleet 50's mid September Presidents' Cup attracted nine boats sailing on the Potomac River near Haines Point. Fleet 50's own John Butler took first prize followed closely by Reed Barrett in second. The Annual Lightning Thistle Challenge attracted 18 boats nine of each class, which was won by the Thistle Class this year.

The Frigid Digit was the second to the last regatta of the year, held the weekend of October 20-21 at Severn Sailing Association with 38 boats attending. Sailing conditions on the Chesapeake again were light and fluky. Top three finishers were Jack Elfman, Matt Fisher, and Jody Swanson in third. The Frigid Digit Regatta is the first half of the combined trophy. The second hald was the Borderline Regatta. The Borderline was the final

regatta sailed in North Carolina on Kerr Lake and attracted 41 boats. Saturdays races provided light winds, and Sunday heavy winds were encountered where five boats capsized. The top five finishers were Dick Hallagan, Jim Carson, Tom Allen, Jr., John Pelosi, and Tom Allen, Sr. The combined trophy for both regattas went to Tom Allen, Jr.

Though the sailing in our District starts in May we do some activities before that, 1990 we arranged a sailing seminar in two parts. The first part was full of theory like "how to forecast and recognize the changes in wind conditions before and during the racing". 


