This was quite a season for our District! I don't know of too many
previous hosts of a North American Championship that can claim having prevailed over a hurricane ("inverting lakes" maybe, but a hurricane!). More about that later.

This year, sailors in our District took many of the top honors to be had in the Lightning Class. I'll just start from the beginning and hope I haven't left anyone out.
CT/RI sailors captured three out of the top ten places at this year's Southern Circuit: Brad Read with crew Betsy Alison and Terry Hutchinson, took first place overall, winning the Miami regatta. Jody Lutz finished second overall, and Dave Dellenbaugh was 6th overall, winning the Savannah Deep South regatta.

The 1991 Lightning World Championships were held in Annapolis in June and Dave Dellenbaugh bested the 39 boat fleet. The next highest finish by a District sailor was John Oldham in 6 th place. Other CT/R1 participant finishes were at follows: Jim Crane, 9th; Jody Lutz, 13th; and Phil Lotz, 28th.

The Early Bird regatta at Cedar Point in May had another strongturnout with a fleet of 28 boats. Jim Crane won this event in a tie-breaker with Brian Hayes. Our Distriets were also held at Cedar Point Yacht Club, and with the NA's being held so close to home, the competition was keen. The top five were: Dave Peck, Jody Lutz, Jim Crane, Gianni Cuccio, and Tim Healy.

This year's Atlantic Coast Championship was hosted by the Southampton Yacht Club, and Tim Healy won that regatta quite convincingly.
After sitting out last year, the Lightning Class was invited to rejoin the Newport Volvo regatta if we could guarantee at least a twelve boat turnout. Newport being the site of this year's North American's, we had no problem meeting the minimum, with 15 boats participating. It was largely a CT/RI event, with 10 of the fifteen boats from our District. Dave Peck, tuning up with a NA's crew Giselle Wagner and Dave Dyson won, with Brad Read 2nd, Jon Schwartz from New Jersey 3rd. Tim Healy 4th, and Don Barrett 5th.

As was mentioned earlier, our District, along with the New England District, hosted 102 boats at this year's North American's in Newport. It was the first time that they"ve ever been sailed there (and probably the last). as by now, you've all heard of how "Hurricane Bob" decided to pay a visit to New England, specifically, Naragannsett Bay!, in the midst of the event. However, due to some incredible dedication, organizational skills, the action on the part of our Co-chairmen. Phil Lotz (with a lot of help from his wife, Wendy), Don Barrett, and Kip Hamblet, and Social Event Chairperson Barbara Vann, all was not lost, and five out of the six Championship races were completed, and all of our social events took place.

The results for our District sailors were most impressive. Seven boats made the Blue Fleet: Tim Healy, Bill Healy, David Peck (all three sailing in their first NA's), Jody Lut/, Tom ("What's-one-more-mast") Ingram, Tim Naeser, and Ward Woodruff. When it was all over. Jody Lutz with crew Ched Proctor and Hale Wolcoff emerged as the North American Champions in the 35 boat fleet.

The CT/RI District also has the 1991 Governors' Cup Champion and Crew on it's roster, that being Chris Vann from Niantic, sailing with his wife Barbara and Teresa Parker. How Barbara managed to sail a North American Championship and be our Social Chairperson under the circumstances of "Hurricane Bob", and remain as cheerful (albeit tired) through it all was remarkable. Well. Chris, that's two North American Fleet Championships out of three (he won the Presidents' Cup in 1989). There's only one left to complete the cycle!

And last, but not at all least. Betsy Alison from Newport, sailing with Wendy Lotz and Kathryn Josenhans overwhelmingly won the Women's Championship with 5 bullets! In fact, it wasn't even necessary for them to sail the 6th race.

So that's three Championships out of six events! Congratulations again to the winners and all the participants just for getting through this one! Also, thanks again to everyone at the ILCA office and to the many volunteers from both Districts who worked tirelessly to make this North American Championship happen.

The final two regattas on our schedule, the Connecticut Governor's Cup at Niantic Bay and the Cedar Point Fall Classic in September is a combined event. Bill Healy won the Governor's Cup, with Dave Peck finishing 2nd, and Don Barrett 3rd. The Fall Classic was won by Brian Hughes; Phil Lotz was second, Gianni Cuccio 3rd, and David Peck 4th, making Dave the winner of the overall trophy.

Looking forward to next year's schedule, the Atlantic Coast Championships will be hosted by Niantic Bay Yacht Club on July 25 \& 26, and our Districts will be hosted by Madison Beach Club on July 11 \& 12. Also, don't forget our "Fall Northern Circuit": CT Governors' Cup at Niantic September 12 \& 13 followed by Cedar Point's Fall Classic on September 19 \& 20. Hope to see you then!
