1991 Canadian Open

The 1991 Canadian Open Lightning Class Championship was held at the Boulevard Club in Toronto on June 22 and 23. The fleet totaled 32 with 6 former champions; Tom Allen, Sr., Richard Hallagan, Ross Bailey, Peter Hall, Jay Mann and David Starck and also future Canadian Open Champions such as Matt Fisher, Tom Allen, Jr., Jim Allen, J. F. Simard, et al. There were 5 races sailed in winds which ranged from 13-19 at 85° +/- 15°.

I sailed with my wife Janice for the first time since 1987 (she was out of commission due to baby making; one 3 year old boy and one 2 year old girl) and Charles Spence. We were able to jump out to an early lead in the regatta and hold off a fast closing Tom Allen, Jr. and an even faster closing

Matt Fisher to win the Championship.

Race I was started with the Race Committee indicating a freed up course by flying the code flag F (this comes into play later). We had a mid-fleet start and rounded the weather mark third, right ahead of Richard Hallagan with the Old Janitor and crew leading the way. Reaches 1 and 2 must have been uneventful because I can't remember anything that happened. The second upwind leg we were able to nail a few shifts off the left side and rounded in second behind Dave Starck. With spinnakers up, we started to follow the lead boat on a course which was straight for the leeward mark (remember code flag F). We had a conversation with this lead boat on what type of course was to be sailed and it was apparent that neither of us knew. Looking back at the rest of the fleet it seemed everyone was on the same course, even Pete Sulman (correct me if I'm wrong Pete). Janice then says there's a mark over by the Club, next thing you know we are on a tight reach trying to make the jibe mark. We were able to round first and go on for the win with Peter Hall moving up to place second.

Race 2 was started in similar conditions to Race I. We sailed the right side of the course since we couldn't get left. Everybody beats us over there, however, things worked out okay as we rounded third, behind Tom Allen with Jim leading Tom Jr. Our positions never changed on the reaches. On the second upwind leg we were able to get by Tom Allen Jr. (I think he might have gone too far left) we rounded second, with Jim still in the lead. Again there were no position changes down wind. On the final upwind leg, we were able to get by Jim by hanging a little further left. We ended up first with Jim second and Tom Allen, Jr. third.

Race 3 was started in similar conditions to Race 2, with flag O flying. We started at the pin end and were able to get to the left side of the course, nailed a few shifts, rounded first. However, Tom Allen, Jr. was able to set his chute quicker than us (excuse; we came in on port tack) and pass us. We followed Tom on the two reaches and the second upwind leg to round still in second spot.

This is probably the point in the regatta where Matt Fisher really turns it on and he was able to get by us on the run to be in second at the turn for home. Tom Allen, Jr. won the race with Matt Fisher second, us third and Peter Hall in fourth.

So after Saturday's racing, we were leading with 4.5 points (it's kind of neat seeing your name in first place), Peter Hall was second with 12, Tom Allen, Jr. was third with

Saturday night had the Toronto fleet going with the B.B.Q. with burgers for all. Also on Saturday night the Canadian Lightning Class had their annual meeting and the one thing I would like to mention about the meeting was the site decided on for the 1992 Canadian Open Championship, which is Thunder Bay, Ontario, my home town. I hope everyone can make it.

Having sailed in Humber Bay before, I was pessimistic that Sunday could be as good a day for sailing as Saturday was. Boy, was I surprised! Sunday morning started out with light airs and continued to build.

Race 4 was started in conditions similar to Race 3. We were again forced to go right, however, we were looking good for a while until a large lift came through which put us well above the lay line and allowed the inside boats to fetch the mark, we rounded about sixth and I think Matt was in the lead which he only increased. My buddy J.F. Simard was able to sail into a second with Tom Allen, Jr. third. We sailed our throw-out.

With one race left and the scoring calculations done, the regatta was between Matt Fisher, Tom Allen Jr. and us. Race five was started in conditions similar to Race four with the flag O flying. Again Matt Fisher was able to get to the left side of the course and lead the fleet at the weather mark. Tom Allen, Jr. rounded I believe fifth and we were ninth. We sailed high on the first reach and caught a couple to move into seventh. On the second upwind leg we were able to get past Tom Allen, Jr., Richard and Nabil into fourth which is the position we needed. Now it was a matter of holding off Tom Allen, Jr. and Richard with two legs to go. I think we increased our lead over Tom Allen, Jr. and Richard on the run as they were preoccupied with each other. With the upwind leg remaining, I was concerned (understatement) about covering two boats, however, Dick and Tom cooperated by not splitting off. Matt Fisher won the race with Dave Starck second, Tony Staples third and us fourth which clinched the regatta for us, Matt Fisher ended up second with Tom Allen, Jr. third.

I would like to thank the Toronto fleet for holding such a fine regatta. See you in Thunder Bay in 1992.
