This year has been very active and competitive in our district. With the 1993 World Championships in Ilhabela just around the corner, preparations and qualifiers are keeping crews and committees very busy.

Our Brazilian Championship was held over Easter weekend in Rio de Janeiro with Claudio Biekark as 1992 Brazilian Champion, Alzir Farias in second place and Michael Norris in third.

We are having two qualifying championships for the 1993 World Championships. The first qualifier was held in early September in Florianopolis, Santa Catarina. Twenty-one boats traveled an average of 900 kms to join the Florianopolis fleet in a very tight and arduous competition. The first two race days were cloudy with good winds and four races went according to schedule. The last day of competition brought plenty of sunshine but left the winds behind. Both final races had to be cancelled with lack of wind. Final positions were: 1) Fernando Hackerott, 2) Claudio Biekarck, 3) Michael Norris. The second qualifier will be the 1993 Brazilian Championships held in Ilhabela, site of the World Championships a week later. Tight competition is expected since everyone here wants to sail in the Worlds.

Brazil was very well represented in the Junior World Championship in Chile by Gabriel Ferreira, Juan de la Fuente and Bruno Ruthenberg placing third overall.

1993 South American Championships will be held in February over Carnival weekend on Guarapiranga Lake in Sao Paulo. Good competition and training opportunities for the Worlds.

We hope to see you all in Ilhabela and best of luck to all the participants.

The California Lightning District is made up of only three fleets: Fleet 194 in San Diego, sailing out of Mission Bay Yacht Club, Fleet 102 in Los Angeles, sailing out of King Harbor Yacht Club and Fleet 372 in the Bay Area, sailing in San Francisco Bay. Almost 500 miles separate the Bay area and San Diego fleets, so getting together to sail isn't easy.

The big district-wide regattas and winners this year were (1) the Olympic Classes Regatta in Long Beach, hosted by Alamitos Bay Yacht Club in March. John Lyon took the gold medal, Scott Finkboner the silver, and Kirk Johnson the bronze. (2) The California Circuit in San Diego during spring break in April. This circuit comprises three separate regattas. Scott Finkboner won the Coronado series and the Mission Bay series, and John Lyon won the Marathon. (3) The California Districts, hosted by Mission Bay Yacht Club in June, Scott Finkboner won the Districts, followed closely by John Harrop, John Oldham, Kirk Johnson and Rob Pinkel. (4) The Pacific Coast Championshp. This is not strictly a district regatta since it's sailed in Klamath Falls, Oregon every other year, as it was this year. Finkboner brought the trophy back to San Diego. Next year Pacific coast skippers will probably have to travel to Richmond Yacht Club to try for this trophy in windy San Francisco Bay.

The Champagne Regatta was held on August 22-23 at the Keuka Lake Yacht Club. Fleet 252 again did an outstanding job in organizing their regatta and all those who attended appreciated their efforts. The regatta gets better each year. The top sailors in order of finish were Tom Doran, Dick Hallagan, Tadd Helmer, Tom Buechner, and Dave Bull. During the 1992 European Championship there was a meeting of the European Districts where it was accepted that Finland will be the host for the 1995 World Championship.
