Once again, another successful and interesting year has come to an end. In regards to Lightning sailing, this past season gave everyone the opportunity to compete at every imaginable level here in Finland. Looking back, it is a joy to realize that the Tuusulanjärvi Lightning Fleet was very active in nearly all regattas. A record ten TP-captains and their crews competed in all the races in 1995. Out of ten possible regattas, our fleet took part in nine and of course our names were at the upper end of the results. Only at the Lake Pāijānne sailing competition was there no member from our fleet competing.

The 1995 Lightning season was started with the traditional Lake Tuusulanjarvi "On the Rocks" Regatta on May 13th which was at the same time the first ranking race. The season closed with the Jyväskylä Autumn Regatta on September 3rd. In the five-regatta ranking series in which 23 boats competed the success of our fleet was as follows: In the top ten positions, our fleet took five positions! Our best was our old hand Leo Korhonen who ranks at number one, and in the third position was our youngest captain Olli Lähteinen.

In District Championships, organized by the Helsinki Merenkävijät, in the top ten positions, we placed in five. Leo Korhonen is 4th time District Champion. His crew included the familiar Hartti Nisonen and Antti Varhemaa. In third place, Olli Lähteinen cut in with his level but sure performance. Out of our new captains this year, let us mention that Timo Meri placed 6th in his first competition.

In the open European championship races held in Helsinki, our fleet was represented by four boats and the best Finnish boat to place was Leo Korhonen with a respectful 6th place finish leaving behind among others Tito Gonzales.

In a tough and changing world championship competition held in Kuopio our capabilities did not extend as far as we would have liked. The reason for our poor showing was not necessarily that we were bad but because our competitors were better. Our best placing was by Olli Lähteinen with a respectful 16th position, which was, by the way, the second best placing by a Finnish competitor. The rest of us placed below the 20th place.

Lake Tuusula was also host for the annual Big Challenge single handed race. This turned out to be the shortest race of the season since the conditions were just too big of a challenge (10m/s with big gusts). Previous Big Challenge winners Kimmo Aromaa and Antero Punntila with Niko Lappaläinen as a new contender. Because of the wind, we knew that sailing in these kinds of condition would not exactly be wise, but since we had come to compete, compete we would. How could we not compete since the prizes donated by Antero had to be won. Luckily for us Antero was ingenious and came up with a brilliant idea: a large hat and paper slips which had positions written on them. Our lucky visitor (Miss World) then drew the slips one at a time. The results of this competition are as follows: Niko won by drawing DSQ, DNF, DSQ. Kimmo took second place with PMS, DSQ, DNC and last place Antero took with DNF, PMS, and PIRATE which counted for 10 bonus points. This competition was quick and results were fair with the attitude that the best man shall win. After this, we had the joy of tasting Marjukka's delicious pies with coffee. I believe that the Punttila family is more than welcome at next year's competition!

This eventful season was brought to an end at the end of August by the headspinning Match Racing regatta, which was held in Helsinki. The prearrangements were interesting when Timo had talked "rockstar" John Winqwist into being his helmsman. Peter Graf and his wife Margrit had arrived for the race from Switzerland. All together five boats competed in the two-day race which took place in varying conditions. But in the end, the winner was Marylou with helmsman John Winqwist (NJ K), crewmembers Timo Ahomäki (TP) and Riitta Kangas (TP). In second place to everyone's satisfaction were our guests from Switzerland along with Waltteri Karhusaari as their other crew. We expect many more boats to compete in this race next year and we hope that we will have more delightful guests from beyond our own borders.

All in all, looking back on this past season, it was very busy but at the same time it was very rewarding. It gave us new experiences, new friends and also showed us that we have a lot of work to do in order to equally compete with the world's best. In any case, I believe that with our many new rewards and also having received much advice from the outside world that we will be better than ever next season! . . . Timo Ahomäki

Rick opened a 1/2 mile lead in the first half but I passed him at the halfway point, only to be passed by Jerry in a lull, who was overtaken by Rick again! At the leeward mark we set our chutes, and were treated to a 360 degree spin under full spinnaker as an eddy from the Portage Power smokestacks caught us! We raced upriver over two miles under spinnakers, slowly grinding Rick down to take line honors by a foot after three hours of sailing! Jerry was third, but a Comet corrected out on PHRF for Overall.

Our Muddy Rudder Lightning Regatta was held September 9 & 10, attracting eleven boats including two from Memphis. Bill Baxter brought along their top rookie from last year, Batton Kennon. Our weather was perfect fall sailing, five races, not too hot, not too windy, and no protests. I confess that the best I could do was to have Bill looking over his shoulder on a reach. That was before the pole went overboard on the jibe! The Sea Scouts provided lunch for all, and the after-race get-together couldn't have been held in better weather. Baxter did his usual number on us and grabbed first! Rick Conaway was second and Jerry Chapman (a Comet sailor!) third. Awards were over by 2:00 pm so that travelers could make it home.

The Valley Sailing Association Governor's Cup' for all classes including catamarans was held Sept. 30 - Oct. I. Seven VSA Lightnings entered. The weather was typical for this series with winds 15 and gusts to 30 both days. At least it was warm and didn't rain as it has in so many previous years. Sailing was great with some of the best planing conditions I've seen. On one reach the bow wave seemed to be 1-1/2 feet higher than the boat! Fortunately I had been able to pick up good crew from the miscellaneous fleet, who were sitting this one out. The course was long for the most part, averaging, by my estimate, to be between 7 to 9 miles each, in three lap triangles. We raced until almost dark! Jerry Wnorowski had his first-ever capsize, and Fran Renschen and Rick Conaway had an awesome collision with Fran riding clear up and over Rick's boat amidships! Surprisingly little damage was done considering the potential. All of these skippers could be called the comeback kids: Conaway was first, Jerry Wnorowski second, and Fran Renschen third. Five races were sailed with no protests again in the regular fleets!

With winds varying from very light to 10-15 mph, our Lightning sailors were tested with a variety of courses which made the regatta a true challenge.



Editor's Message

The editor has sincerely enjoyed producing the yearbook the last few years and would like to thank all the district and fleet commodores, captains, secretaries and <u>dedicated class members</u> who made an effort to send reports, articles, and <u>photos</u>, so that this yearbook could be as complete a book as possible about "a year" in the International Lightning Class Association.

If you read all the reports you will also be enthusiastic and wish you could meet "those members," sail "that regatta," and share some of "that fun" in all corners of the Lightning world.

I'm still convinced that the yearbook could be delivered before the Southern Circuit, but it takes the cooperation of all the districts, fleets and members. Plan ahead - There must be a deadline, a definite, "plan ahead or be left out" deadline. (It has been proven that a "No Report" can be historically significant to your fleet.) All of you would probably have been shocked and disappointed if this "yearbook" had been produced after an adhered-to-deadline. (It would only take one year to wake everyone up.) I'm sorry that I didn't have the intestinal fortitude to do it, and that delivery is so late.
