1997 World Championship Report

Canadian Yacht Association's Race Management Manual (1997) replaces the "Guide for Principal Events" (Appendix C3) in the 1997 Rule Book. It is the "Bible" for those of us

who have an interest in organizing major regattas. One paragraph of particular importance reads:

There is one essential element that determines in large measure how the regatta will be judged by its participants. This is the degree to which visitors are made to feel welcome by regatta workers,

club members, officials, local merchants, and others in the community. This job cannot be assigned to a committee or included in the budget. Yet it can be discussed in the planning process and should be considered in making decisions. It is everyone's job.

With this thought in mind, and my intimate knowledge of Pointe Claire Yacht Club, I accepted the responsibilities of the Co-Chairperson for the 1997 Lightning Worlds. Peter Hall (Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club, Lightning World Champion 1989, and Past President of FVQ) and Tony McBride (Pointe Claire Yacht Club, and past President of the International Lightning Class Association) were the prime driving force in bringing the Worlds to Montreal. Peter assured us of good participation from Europe and South America;

Tony said he would fire the guns. I planned to ensure that everyone would leave with very positive memories when the racing was finished. In 1994 Tony, Peter and I submitted a 15-page proposal throughout the lightning community. In 1995 the selection committee chose Montreal over 5 venues in North America.

We selected early June to hold the event because Lac. St. Louis normally enjoys good wind and no weeds at that time of the year, overriding the associated negatives of cold water and extra current. We realized quickly that our estimated budget of \$25,000 needed to be increased and we scrambled for sponsorship to obtain a total of \$40,000. Bell Mobility became our prime sponsor with numerous other companies and organizations providing much needed support of cash and goods. Thus, we were able to hold the entry fee to \$250.00 (US Funds) per boat and provide both an opening and closing dinner.

Although the Lightning Class is one of the most competitive of the non-Olympic classes it is still a fun boat that promotes a family atmosphere. Pointe Claire Yacht Club, with its many volunteers,

- Laid out a social program, which gave everyone a chance to meet Lightning sailors from around the world and to enjoy the night-life of Montreal.
- Organized 10 charter boats for European and South American competitors.
- Provided free housing for more than 20 teams.
- Maintained close relations with the local media resulting

in continuous exposure on TV and in the local newspapers.

- Raised money through the sale of regatta shirts.

All of our efforts resulted in the following:

- Winner: Larry MacDonald Jr., Canada, followed by Chile, USA, Brazil and Canada.
- Competitors: 58 boats from 9 countries.
- Organizers: A group of over 100 volunteers handled most duties and only a few employees from both yacht clubs were needed to operate rescue boats.
- Weather: Light easterly or variable winds on 5 of the 6 racing days with plenty of sunshine. Great for the spectators but challenging for the competitors and the race committee.
- Rules: There were no hearings regarding right of way. The jury did observe approximately 10 boats taking penalties on the water.

- Black Flag: Race #4 did not get started smoothly. In winds of 5-8 knots with minor shifts the sequence of events was as follows:
- 1. general recall
- 2. general recall with I flag
- general recall with Z flag resulting in 20% penalty to 10 boats
- general recall with black flag resulting in disqualification for 8 boats.
- 5. clean start

The jury was very active that evening responding to numerous requests for redress and answering the query "What happened?" Tony McBride and his race committee had done such a good job of timing, flying the appropriate flags, recording the events on audio and video tape recorders that all requests by competitors were quietly dropped when they saw and heard what had actually transpired.

Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club and Pointe Claire Yacht Club are proud of having hosted a successful Lightning World Championship Regatta. •
