In addition to the club schedule, several Fleet 329 skippers and crew hit the road a good bit this year, travelling to many different regattas both in and out of the Dixie District. These included the



The following are several articles written by Phil Grotheer during the season about several of our more notable regattas.

ADAM'S CUP QUALIFIER'S: This past weekend was one of the best two days of sailing we've had in a long time. The format for Lightnings was a little different with the women's qualifiers being sailed at the same time. Two women's teams ended up competing for the CBYRA region. Cap Pin with crew Jen Norwood and Gwen sailing Sean Carroll's boat and Joanna

Byron and crew sailing Mike Beaver's boat 14566. They sailed five races on Saturday and four Sunday. They were tied for points going into the last race which ended up being the tiebreaker. Our regular fleet of 11 boats kept a close eye on the women because it was such a great match race. Cap (or Capucine) and team went on for the win and will be representing CBYRA in the area C's in New Jersey in a month or two from now. Congratulations to both teams for some great sailing. Neither one of the teams have had much time steering Lightnings and did a great job sailing fast.

MD GOVERNORS CUP: The regular fleet had 11 boats. 5 races Saturday and 3 Sunday were sailed. Several DC boats showed up (Gallagher, Anderson, Alsalam) and Chris Raubacher showed up Sunday with his new boat. I'm telling you - watch out for Chris and team! They will be fast this season. We used to chase him around the race course a few years back before he sold 14156. Grotheer came out on top this weekend with Jon Guth second and Jamie Brickell third. The breeze held from the N to NE all weekend at about 10 to 15 knots. Everyone thought the breeze would poop out on Saturday but it never subsided. The cloud cover kept all the motorboats away and we didn't have to worry about sunscreen all weekend. What a great time. Oh yeah - the party was great too. We cooked burgers and dogs on the grill after the races Sunday and hung out until dark.

ACCs: The Annapolis Lightning Fleet out of Severn Sailing Association put on a wonderful regatta the weekend of July 24th and 25th - the Lightning Atlantic Coast Championships. The Lightning is one of the worlds most competitive one design classes, and also attracts some of the nicest people you will ever meet. The ACC's this year went down as legendary status, with a fleet of 60 boats and one killer after-race party on Saturday night. The ACC's is usually one of the biggest mid-season travelling regatta for Lightning sailors. It is also a great tune-up for the North American's which usually follows by about two to three weeks. Ned Roseberry with crew Ched Proctor and Dorsey Roseberry from New York won the event with 16 points (2 bullets included). Second went to Connecticut's own Brian Hayes with crew Carter Utzig and Annapolitan Lesley Frymier. Third went to SSA's own Phil Grotheer with crew Sean Carroll and Nat Coughlin. Sean Carroll holds the current Lightning Junior World Championship title which he won in Salinas, Ecuador last fall. Lightning regattas of this magnitude are always a who's who in competitive sailing. There are always a bunch of sailmakers, pro's and high ranking amateurs that travel the circuit each year.

Our "wilderness renaissance" was recognized early in 1999 when the United States Sailing Association included a chapter describing our somewhat laissez faire management style in the new edition of the Class Management Handbook. It was flattering to see our slow growth from three boats to 14 over the last 15 years attributed to our "fun first - rules second" credo.

The sailing season is spread over 10 Sundays from the 4th of July weekend through Labor Day. We suffered from two rainouts but managed to complete enjoyable July and August series. Attendance ranged from 4 or 5 boats early in the season to 8-10 in August when the vacation season was in full swing. Although the father and son Whatley team was clearly the best on the lake, a scan of the fleet roster reveals that nearly everyone had at least one really good race.

Particularly pleasing to all of us was the performance of new members and old members sailing new boats. Art Cunningham, an experienced Snipe sailor, imported #9829 from Massabesic and immediately began to sail the boat t upwind very well. As soon as he gets some more exposure to the uses of that big, third sail in the front of the boat, he will be a threat to all of us. Art is also traveling to regattas which most of us don't have the time to do. We appreciate his efforts to support our neighbor fleets. Doug DeCluitt, a veteran Thistle racer back home in Texas, kicked off a wave of newer boat buying when he appeared with #14247 and promptly showed us that Texans know how to sail. Wally Ackley imported #14814 and proved that a boat that is 100 pounds lighter can really help a skipper. Finally, Ed Michels

appeared for his annual vacation visit from North Carolina with the first really new, just out of the box, Lightning seen in this fleet since forever.

Ed was so fast with this boat that he left vapor trails in his slip stream. As the first snow fell on the White Mountains in October, we gained another new member as long time local super crew Will Abbott bought #10555 from Dwight Gertz.. Will is the Executive Director of the Science Center of New Hampshire at the Squam Lakes which leads us all to worry that his staff 's continuing research out on the lake will provide him with some secret local knowledge that will leave the rest of us in his wake. This forces Dwight to look for a new boat and requires Jack Russell to train another crew member. The cycle continues.

The highlight of our season was a 16 boat turn-out, in spite of a gruesome weather forecast, for our annual regatta. The threatened deluge held off until after Saturday's races and was gone by Sunday morning. Allen Whatley worked with visiting hot shot race committee chair Harry Mattison to squeeze five races out of some typically squirrelly Squam conditions. The lake looked beautiful full of spinnakers. Georges Peter from Annisquam MA, warming up for the World's in Ecuador, won the regatta while locals Christian Whatley and Dwight Gertz took 2nd and 3rd.

The second best sight of the year was the Around the Lake Race, sponsored by the Squam Lakes Association. A colorful menagerie ranging from Windsurfers to a Prindle Cat flew to the other end of the lake and back in record time with beam winds of 15 knots. The Whatley crew came in 9 minutes behind a first-to-finish Hobie Cat and upheld the Lightning fleet's honor by taking first place on corrected time by 14 seconds.

We finished our season with the traditional awards dinner at Jack and Betty Russell's beautiful new home on the lake. Allen and Christian Whatley received the Fleet Championship, the award for best Lightning in the Around the Lake Race, and the July series. Dave Closson was second for the season, just nosing out new member Art Cunningham. Dwight Gertz sneaked past the Whatleys for the August series and also won the Closson Cup for the best score in the last three races of the season. The Fleet Spirit award was given to Bobby "Hollywood" Sengstaken.

Everyone went home filled with the realization that we have a good thing going on our little mountain lake and that we will want to work to preserve it.






LSC Commodore Pat Dolan won the first race on April 25th to open the 1999 sailing season. He was the fleet's most active skipper and sailed in 37 races.
