The Santa Monica Bay and Mission Bay fleets co-hosted the California Circuit again this year. The turnout was low, but the racing for all fourteen races sailed in five days on four different venues was not only challenging but a lot of fun.

We arrive at King Harbor on Saturday for setup and if all goes well, we get a practice sail in. The racing starts on Sunday. The weather was perfect, clear skies, mid 60's and 12-16 knot winds. We had three races with the places getting mixed up fairly well with Scott Finkboner winning two out of three. Sunday bought much of the same with slightly lighter breezes and the predicted rains held off until we returned to the docks, and even at that it was a very light passing shower, and the sun was back out for the road trip south. Scott was victorious at King Harbor, followed by John DeBenedetti from Portland and Kirk Johnson was third after the tie with Peter Beecher was broken.

The Marathon starts at the Coronado Bridge and finishes at the Mission Bay Yacht Club. There was several new obstacles before even getting out to the ocean for the kelp harvest; there was the "red zone" at the Naval Air Station which marked the outer passing zone for the nuclear carrier, complete with a roving gunner patrol, (not sure that is all the correct Navy lingo, but you probably get my point), and a Navy repair ship that was leaving the dock as the back end of the fleet was nearing the point. They move a lot fastest than expected. Brewers were a

little too close and got a little caught up in the wash, but sailed on unscathed. Once out of the bay and in the ocean, there would be the boat swallowing kelp beds to deal with. The kelp beds weren't as large as the prior year so there was no harvesting necessary to untangle ones boat. Scott Finkboner, sailing double handed with Allison Webber, and doubled handed on the rudder, when his lower pintel came loose and rendered the rudder useless, won. Although he fought for the win, this was completely tactical on the part of the rest of us, as we had to give Scott time to prepare his Mahi-Mahi dinner. Kirk who fought hard to hold the lead, was second, with Mike Brewer in third.

Thursday three races were sailed on the ocean at Mission Bay at which point Scott was pretty secure in first, but second, third, fourth and fifth overall were still up for grabs. Scott won the ocean series, Mike was second and John and Kirk fied for third, At the lunch break on Friday after three Bay races, two points separated second to fourth. Mike won the Bay series, John was second and Scott had his worse finish in third.

When all fourteen races were completed, Scott was the overall winner, followed by John, then Kirk in third. (Complete details in June Flashes)

The Circuit has two additional trophies, the Susan Arnold trophy, which goes to the highest placing woman who sails every race on the same boat, which went to Allison Webber who crewed for Scott, and the Bowling Trophy which went to Kirk Johnson who, in the only Bay Race in which he got to the weather mark first, parked on it. Runner-up was Elissa Hall who experienced a broken halyard, broken car and broken toe, which she conveniently kept quiet until after the awards ceremony.

Our districts were held at Mission Bay Yacht Club. The winds were light on Saturday for the first three races, add the ocean swell, chop and the roaming kelp beds that were on an outing from Point Loma for the weekend, and the conditions were nothing short of challenging. After the three races it was still anybody's regatta. Sunday started with strong 10-15 knots southerly for the first two races and mellowed out to 10 knots for the sixth and deciding race. Scott won, followed by Mike in second and Kirk in third. (Complete details in August Flashes).

Our final event was the Pacific Coast Championships hosted by the San Francisco Fleet. Nine boats sailed the regatta in not so typical San Francisco conditions. Saturday started with zero wind and heavy fog, by early afternoon we had 12 - 15 knots, flat water and good planing conditions. Due to tactical errors, sailing across the restricted starting line, (oops), by several boats, the standings at the end of three races were surprising. Scott and Mike Molina were tied for first, Elissa and Peter Bellin were tied for third and Peter Beecher and Tom Kulinski were tied for fifth. Mike Brewer got into the mix in fourth, but second through fifth was up for grabs as four points separated the five boats. Sunday the breeze filled in much early, so it and the chop had plenty of time to build, and gave us the typical San

Francisco conditions. Most enjoyed the 15-18 knots of breeze with the exception of Elissa and team, who on last quarter of the last leg of the first race of the day, just didn't have the weight to hold the boat flat and dropped from her solid second during the entire race to six. After a long and trophy deciding protest from the last race, Mike Molina with John Lyons and Ron Snitsinger, won, followed by Peter Bellin, Dave Hayes and Richard Hoffman in second, with Scott Finkboner, Andy Schmickle and Joe Balderrama in third.

We sail all year round out here, come enjoy the warm and sunny California weather.
