
The 2003 season began on a sad note for the sailors of Fleet 154. John Nixon passed away on April 4. A tribute to John by long-time club member and acquaintance, Richard "Whitey" Boerger appears below. A new Fleet championship tropby has been named in John's honor.

Since the last report Wawasee Yacht Club hosted three invitational regattas, in addition to its local Memorial Day, Independence Day and Labor Day regattas. The first of the three was last year's Hoosier Regatta, September 28-29, 2002. Eighteen boats were entered, nine from other clubs. Unusually mild conditions resulted in only three races being sailed. John McCree from Saginaw, MI was the winner. Bob Franke from Milwaukee, WI was second, and Craig Cobbum from the home team was third.

The Indiana District Regatta was sailed June 21-22, 2003. Only seven boats were entered, which included only one visitor, Ken McGinity, our stalwart district commodore. Bard Wagnon was the winner. Craig Cobbum was second, and Debbie Probst was third.

The third, of course, was this year's Hoosier Regatta, September 27-28, 2003. The conditions included some rain and winds often 15 kts and above with occasional hair-raising gusts. Nineteen boats were entered, including nine from the host fleet. Sean Fidler from Troy, MI was the winner. Deb Probst from Wawasee was second, and John McCree from Saginaw, MI was third.

Fleet 154 is in good health. It was not unusual to have nine or more boats on the starting line each Sunday during the season. Several of the boats regularly have junior sailors aboard to introduce them to Lightning sailing. At least one addition to the fleet is expected for next year.

John's many contributions to Wawasee Yacht Club include: generous financial help when the club asked for it; creation of Fleet 154's infamous "Onefinalrapumup Regatta," which evolved into the Hoosier Regatta; involvement in the administration of ILCA; fun and innovative pranks around the club house, both on and off the water; years of active participation racing his Lightnings and, in later years, turning the tiller over to the younger generation but staying on board as crew and enjoying yet more racing successes.

Wawasee Yacht Club will truly miss John. His "screw it – let's do it!" attitude was effective on those with whom he worked and socialized. The club and those about him benefited greatly from being thus stimulated.

During the sailing season 2003 the Helsinki Eleet 166 continued to work in close co-operation with the Tuusulanjärvi fleet 456. Kimmo Aromaa with Masi V and Lauri Hemming with Red Snapper were our most active sailors. The season began in Miami when Lauri and Kimmo participated in the Worlds. The sailing was fun, but results were not so fine.

At home the season began literally On the Rocks. The first regatta was sailed in the first week of May, only two days after ice cover broke on Lake Tuusulanjärvi. Cold weather, some wind, and only four boats. Our ranking regatta series began in the end of May in Helsinki and finished in the beginning of September in Valkeakoski. The last regatta was sailed again in Tuusula, in the last week of September. Helsinki ranking regatta was sailed in light winds, on both days races were postponed due to lack of wind and fog. Kimmo won and Lauri was 7th as he had to leave while we were still waiting for the wind. In Turku Kimmo was third and both Lauri and Kimmo skipped the third ranking regatta in Kemi.

The next regatta was District Championships in Tuusula in the beginning of August. This year we had 22 boats, from Tammisaari in the south to Kemi in the north, both classic woodies (#5552 & 6838) and modern boats. The weather in Tuusula was fine, mostly light winds and a lot of sun. The schedule was three days and nine races with upwind-downwind courses. On the first day Masi V was fast scoring 1-2-1, followed by Matti Bruun from Kuopio and Pertti Pyy from Tuusula. On the second day the shifty winds were difficult for Masi V. Kimmo sailed 2-8-7 while Matti Bruun continued with good races 4-2-1 and moved to first place. With three races left, Matti had 12 points, Kimmo 13 points, and Pertti 18 points, worst race excluded. The weather forecast for the last day was again shifty




District Champions Kimmo, Mika and Jari Aromaa.

and moderate winds. Kimmo started the third day with 4th place, and won over Matti, who was 5th. Pertti had a bad race and was 18. On eight races Kimmo secured his victory by winning the race as Matti was far back on 12th place. Thus the District Championship went to the Aromaa brothers Kimmo, Mika and Jari, who had sailed together since 1990. As a skipper Kimmo had won 4 silver and 3 bronzes before his first gold medal.

The last races in Kuopio, Valkeakoski and Tuusula were sailed in light winds or without wind at all. Kimmo was still hungry for victories and won them all. Lauri was not so fond on sailing on small lakes and was not with after the Districts. Lauri was 9th in the Districts and 13th in the final ranking series results.

This season was great success for Kimmo Aromaa and his crew. Kimmo won the District Championship and the District Ranking series, skippered seven regattas winning six of them and crewed two more. Actually, Mika was the only crew member, who sailed the whole season, the middle crew changed in almost all regattas. Looks like that they have tuned the crew work to such level that a new guy can always step in. The championship of the Aromaa brothers came 46 years after their parents won their first championship. The fourth generation is coming, as Mika's daughter Tea has started to crew.

2003 was another year of building for Fleet 192. The Dixie District last year decided to make a concerted effort to build fleet members, identify potential crew, and participate in more regattas on both a national and local level. Goals were set to grow each fleet by 1 boat/owner, and I am happy to say that we exceeded this goal! New members Matt lay and Roger Link both purchased boats and joined in the fleet. Several other potential owners have been identified, and hopefully the fleet will continue to grow.

The winter saw a VERY successful program held again. Fleet 192 (thanks to Myrl Stone!) has a "sailing simulator" that was used this year and the last to create a wonderful visual image of the lightning sail plan. It also allows accurate and predictable adjustments to be made, which works out to show exactly what each control's affect is. From blocking to Cunningham to any other adjustment, it all can be modeled exactly by this "simulator". This year we also attempted to include a boat repair session. While repairing a whole boat is impossible, we hoped to show everyone what tools, equipment, and methods are used. With 30+ participants, it turned out to be an excellent seminar, and one we hope to continue next year!

The season started out slowly as the cold kept people home a little longer than normal. But by mid May the parking lot was full of Lightings, and the fleet was going strong. With a concerted effort to hold a regular Tuesday night program, the push was on to keep everything organized and formal. As a result, we had on average 4 boats out, with more on necasion. While no scoring was done, the short course, high race count, practice style worked very well to help train crew/skippers and provide the best setup.

The fleet's first event was a true success. In many people's opinions, this may be a perfect line of growth for the ILCA in the future. Yes, we are talking "TEAM RACING". With 2 fleets located on the Susquehanna River, the River Cup was born back in the 1950's as a fleet-to-fleet competition (fleets 192 and 253). After about 15 years of inactivity, the River Cup was reborn as a true team vs. team race. With 6 boats per fleet (2 teams of 3 boats) doing a round robin format, if turned out to be an extremely successful event, 2 perfect days, a great RC (thanks to John Heffner), and excellent hospitality at Tidewater Marina created an event that will be an annual event between the 2 fleets, with perhaps a future expansion to encourage other fleets to attend. In the end, Fleet 192 took top place, but the real winners were those who participated!

The annual "Duck Challenge" regatta also turned out to be a resounding success. With participation numbers up to over 20 boats, some of the Dixie District's top competitors decided to make the trip to HdG. Showing the way were fleet 329's Steven Constants (1st) and Jon Guth (2nd). As regular top finishers in the Dixie and national events, it really raised the skill level at the event. 2 days of racing were held in a light to medium, shifty (and I mean SHIFTY) NW wind. With very little chop once the powerboat poker run was gone, the competitors were treated to challenges rarely seen at other venues. The combination of current, shifty wind, and land effect makes for difficult sailing at times in



HdG, and this weekend was no exception. Of course the dinner was a total hit, and thanks to Myrl Stone, Carol Stone, and Scott Gordan (plus many others) for their effort to that end!

With a growing fleet, excited and motivated individuals, and a great location, Fleet 192 is proving to be one of the growing fleets in the ILCA. We plan to continue this with some more events, and an additional emphasis placed on traveling to other local regattas. Hope to see you at some in the near future!.



15th in the Blue Fleet.


