Carol does it again! In a close race with Kevin MacNeil, Carol Park again captures the Frey Trophy for the best sailor on the upper Susquehanna, We all should have seen it coming when she placed second in the Woman's North American Championship.

The Fleet grew by one boat this year, after several years of phenomenal growth, we had a chance to pause and work on the quality of our Fleet. While the growth in number was small, there was a significant growth in the percentage of newer boats, making competition much more intense. Enthusiasm was as high as ever also, with 11–12 hoats on the starting line for the Summer Series. The Fall Series was a different matter with five race dates cancelled because of the lack of wind and one hurricare. Average winds for those six race dates was 14 mpb (do the math).

During the Summer Series we took time for two important events. In July, we took 7 boats to Havre de Grace, Maryland to take on Northern Chesapeake Elect 192 in renewing a King of the River rivalry that goes hack to the 20%. We raced in a Team Racing format and proved to ounselves that we needed more practice in the prevailing heavier winds found there. Next year it will be different, as we'll be the light winds on our stretch of the river.

The Sweet Corn Regatta was moved back a week in an attempt to find more wind and to avoid any conflicts with other Club functions. The wind gods smiled on us for Saturday, but again deserted us on Sunday. Nonetheless, the excellent competition, a Saturday night filled with music, food, beer and company of rare quality made this year's regatta a memorable occasion.

We also saw a significant increase in the Fleet's participation in away regattas, with teams competing at Solomons, Doc Gilbert, Annapolis, Havre de Grace (twice) and the PA Governor's Cup at Lake Wallenpaupak.

Fleet 266 sails at the Carlyle Sailing Association harbor located in Hazlet State Park on Lake Carlyle, a 26,000 acre lake in central Illinois about 50 miles east of St. Louis, MO. The association's season runs six months from the first weekend in May to the last weekend in October. Fleet 266 hit the water running with the 11th annual Mid-Continent Regatta held on the first weekend in May. In this year's regatta we were able to run four races in light but steady air on Saturday but no races on Sunday because of thunder storms. The home fleet's Rick Bernstein won in convincing fashion followed by Terry Burke, Doug Nickel and Mark Polzin.

Carlyle Sailing Association scheduled 50 club races on 24 Sundays in 2003. The other two weekends are devoted to association sponsored regattas: the Leukemia Cup on Memorial Day weekend and the Whale of a Sail held the second weekend in September. We actually sailed 36 races divided up into three short series: Spring (7 races), Summer (8 races) and Fall (6 races) and one season long series: Championship (15 races). In the Lightning Worlds Rick Bernstein crewed for George Fisher in the number six boat and Matt Burridge with John Huhn and Doug Nickel sailed to a 23rd. Dan Moriarty (2), Arthur Merdinian (3), Terry Burke (5), Marc Schillebeeckx (8) and Ben Williams (11) sailed in the Mississippi Valley Districts.

Arthur Merdinian and Marc Schillebeeckx competed in the North American Championships. Matt Burridge with Dan and Tobi Moriarty sailed to a second in the Red Flannels regatta in Chicago. Marc Schillebeeckx and Terry Burke also sailed in the Red Flannels.



#### In Memoriam: Augie Paoli



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Our Fleet enjoyed an active season in 2003. Our membership held constant with 19 members and 14 active boats. Our season begins in mid April and completes in late October. A total of 51 races was held with 11 boats participating and an average starting number of 3.9. These numbers are down slightly from

the 2002 season when 54 races were held with 11 different boats on the line and the average starting 4.4. In order to encourage participation, our Fleet requires that each boat must participate in at least 50% of the scheduled races to qualify for season awards. In 2003, 5 boats qualified compared with 4 in both '02 and '01.

Even with more qualifiers, no one was able to catch our perennial Fleet Champion, Joe Lassaux, although his margin of victory was less. Congratulations Joe!.

Several of our more active sailors racers traveled to away regattas this year; which hopefully strengthened their skills. Ken Woods and Mike Franceschini traveled to the Red Flannel Regatta in Chicago and the McGinity's and Franceschini traveled to the Hoosier Regatta at Lake Wawasee. We are making a concerted effort to increase the number of travelers in 2004.

The Burl Harmon Memorial Indiana Open regatta was held for the 41st time on the first weekend in May. We had wonderful wind conditions but alas only 7 boats, our lowest total ever. This may be partly due to additional regional regattas added to this same weekend. A stronger and broader marketing effort is planned for 2004 when our dates for the Open are May 1st & 2nd.


