The 2004 sailing season started off with our annual Lightning fleet party. This year Carolyne and Terry Burke were very kind to host the party. Terry took care of all types of desired fluids, whereas Carolyne made sure the ham was cooked to perfection. Party was attended by about 30 Lightning sailors and this would be my second year (out of three) as fleet captain .... James get ready for your 3 year term.

Talking about new member ... for several years the family Schillebeeckx was the newest Lightning member of fleet 266 ... all this is now history. Fleet 266 is very proud to announce that we got a new, very active, member James Chapin. The rumor has it that he found a brand new lightning (14920) somewhere in a Wisconsin garage.

For those who do not know James' background ... I know he grew up sailing Prams, Sunfish, Lasers, Y Flyers, Thistles and mainly Highlanders at Lake Norman Yacht Club in North Carolina. He crawled off the back of a Highlander into the water when he was 6 months old; brought back on board by a rope that his dad had just fied around my waist (as told over the years by his mom)! Skippered the Area D Sears finals in 1977 and sailed in the Youth Championships in Milwaukee the same year. He lived in Chicago from 1985 to 1998 sailing T-10's, winning the club Championship 9 years in a row and the NA's fwice with Rick Strilky on us. Sailed 5 Mackinac races in T-10's and finally purchased a Lightning. Like James would say: "He is now associated with the best group of people that anyone can imagine!"

Championship series: 48 races scheduled 34 races raced 9 boats participated and 4 qualified. Result: 1st Dan Moriarty, 2nd John Folwell

I need to indicate that this is the second year in row that Dan and John tied on points and John lost on the tie breaker in the Championship series. John told me that next year this has to change!

Our first official regatta of the year is the well known Mid-Continent regatta. The "Force" that gives us sustenance is the water park condition at Lake Carlyle, that warm steady 20 knot southwest breeze that only raises half a foot chop and makes the sailing playground of our fleet. This year the weather gods decided to show us all that the "Force" has another side - "the dark side". This dark side is characterized by an overcast northern 20 knot unstable breeze with rain and 50 degree and below temperatures.

Interestingly enough this breeze also brings curious wave conditions that resemble Lake Erie off Rocky River, Ohio in a kind of sort of a washing machine like steep, irregular chop that is impossible to anticipate and almost to sail.

Our lake is 10.15 miles long to the northeast but waves from this direction are largely unknown to us. If you are expecting the smooth swimming pool conditions with a strong NE breeze, you are in for a surprise and dead wrong!

He only had his brother on board and was flying the chute in this race. Later at the rum party he said: "We went fastest just before the capsize and by the way where do you buy new mast partner blocks?" James ... welcome to Lightning class and fleet 266 ... what an introduction!

The evening's entertainment was a hot, hearty, lasagna meal and surprise 50th birthday Mount Gay Rum bash for Terry Burke. Terry was truly surprised and many limes lost their lives in the ensuing slaughter!

Our fleet enjoyed another active year of sailing. There are currently 24 members with thirteen boats. Eleven boats raced over the length of the season which started mid April and ended on Halloween Day.

Spring was our busiest time, hosting regattas in May and June. We kicked off the racing season with the Burl Harmon Memorial Indiana Open Regatta on May 1st and 2nd. With the regattas behind us, we focused on the fleet racing series. We use a high point system that rewards

those who beat more boats in each race. This rewards the truly best skippers. We require participation in 50% of the races of the season, yet the worst finishes beyond this are thrown out. This rewards those who participate the most, since they can throw out more bad finishes. At the same time, those who join the fleet well after the season starts can qualify and be competitive in the season competition.

The competition was extremely tough this year and lead to a new champion for the first time in many years. Pete McGinity, who has been setting his sights on Joe Lassaux, fleet champion since 1990, finally was able to overcome him. Early in the season Pete took a sizable lead of close to 50 points but Joe made a great comeback to only 3 points down for the final weekend of racing our Club Long John regatta.

Joe needed a full series of races but the weather chose not to help him. Saturday was the most beautiful fall day one could imagine with the exception of sustained winds close to 30 mph and gusts nearing 50. No boats went out that day. Sunday proved to be a good sailing day but Club Regatta rules dictate no starts after 12:00 noon for morning racing and we only got two races in. Pete's first and second maintained him over Joe's third and first. Pete finished the season in First, Joe in second and Mike Franceschini, third.



More definite corridors letting early freighters in to shipping docks and grain elevators started the ice moving, until a solid west wind helped large flows of ice out to the lake proper and stretches of open water began to appear. By mid-April most of the ice was out of the harbour itself and the lake was clear except for stretches of shore and protected bays. At that point Lightnings began to spring up on the Temple Reef pier, a few more days had melted the ice at the hoist and we could go sailing. One had to keep an eye open for lagging chunks of ice, but it was good to be on the water once more.

The first Thursday of May started our summer long Evening Series and this year we went immediately to our "Forked Lightning" race format. This is a great method to mix up the fleet, add exciting boat for boat encounters, and in general, help the learners get close enough to the experts to see how they go so fast, so mysteriously.

The first weekend event was the Kam River Slush Cup, named after the Kaministiquia River, which flows into Thunder Bay harbour. The last few years we have been refining a poker derby for the Slush Cup and this year placed the cards on inflatable bouys instead of docks or other hard objects. It was a good thing, as the wind absolutely howled. The junior crew of Alex Cox, Stephanie Broll and Julia Bailey, out for the first time of the year and maybe the third time ever, broke their vang and had no downwind control. Anxious parents looked on from other boats, and Ross Bailey, now with jib down, escorted them back to shore. The kids made it fine and thought it was great fun. Bob Maki with Glen Strey and Bob Walsh was the only boat to collect all of their cards and were pretty darned excited too! They had never ever gone so fast in any boat as on the run back from the Kam River, and that was only with the jib! Every one else including a few keelboats had called it quits because of the wind. Congratulations Bob.

Loon Lake is about 3 miles long and 1-1/2 miles wide with cottages dotting the shoreline and large forested hills surrounding the lake. It is about 10 miles inland from the bottom of Thunder Bay of Lake Superior, so on warm days, a great thermal flows in during the afternoon. Mix this up with whatever the wind is doing that day and you can go from first to last in a tack, especially considering how well everyone in the fleet is now sailing. Brian Cox in his nice new boat looked very fast throughout the regatta, but Steve Wells from Dryden had an ace in the hole with his excellent crew and won the regatta. Steve has been nibbling at first for a few years and was very pleased to finally win at Loon where the sailing is wonderful, the party at the Walsh's fabulous cottage is great, and the Maki's deck feels just like home.

The 20 mile race from the city of Thunder Bay to Amethyst Harbour along the shores of Thunder Bay itself, has been as short as a 2 hour sleigh ride and as long as, well, as long as this year. The course weaves inside several islands so the crews can enjoy the passing scenery, but it would have been nice to put it in fast forward at least once or twice this year. The start was at 11 am and Richard Walsh caught a heaven-sent, freshening wind to

finish at 6:23 pm winning the Temple Reef Trophy. Everyone else rode in on the same wind or else we'd still be out there. Ross and Nancy Bailey hosted a much needed bar-b-que to fuel everyone up, then Sunday at noon, we started in South Bay, Amethyst Harbour for the 13 mile race around Caribou Island and the Crystal Trophy. Ross Bailey with crew Nancy and Peter Ayer held Richard and his team of experts off until the finish line was in sight. Then Richard stood on the gas, road over Ross and took the hardware, including the Van Bailey Memorial Trophy for the weekend.

The whole fleet traveled to Dryden for the 2nd half of the Districts and we sure enjoyed ourselves. Steve and Tracy Wells with all of their helpers know how to put on a great event and it was fun. Richard Walsh pulled out all the stops to win 6 of the 7 races, the regatta and the Districts. Richard is real incentive for the rest of us to sail a little smarter and a little faster. Maybe next year, but in the meantime it's great to have such a fast boat to sail against.

We are all quite sad that Lou Walsh passed away this year. Lou with his wife Audrey have been a strength in the

Marcus Walser a new Lightning sailor has bought Brian Cox's boat and is quite happy with Lightning sailing. Brian has bought Richard Walsh's Lightning, and Richard has bought Larry McDonald's latest boat. Lots of activity and great expectations are in hand for 2005.
