

The Mission Bay Yacht Club Lightning Fleet 194 had a great year with more Lightnings sailing out of Mission Bay than I have ever seen before, thanks to hosting the North America Championships. Thanks to all the people who participated and helped during 2006.

We started the year with the SCYA Midwinter Regatta in February and had six boats racing in the two-day regatta. Jeff Coppens, Kirk Johnson, and Dan Gravatt finished 1, 2, 3.

April 1 was the start of the California Circuit in Coronado. Jeff Coppens was not fooled and finished every race in first place. Behind Jeff, the racing was close, and with one bad race it was going to cost you one or two spots. Scott Finkboner and Pete Bellin finished the Coronado stage of the Circuit in second and third.

The California Circuit's Marathon race has always generated lots of great stories, and this year's version went like this: no wind. The race was shortened, and three boats made it to the turning mark finish line. The rest of the fleet did not finish. Jim Sears, Kenny Manzoni, and Pete Bellin were our first, second, and third place finishers. The wind that was missing for the Marathon was back with a vengeance, prompting the California Circuit's ocean races to be held in Mission Bay. Twenty-knot winds did not make any difference with the outcome, as Jeff Coppens could not be beaten. The second place finisher in the Circuit, Scott Finkboner, was 25 points behind Jeff! Kirk Johnson finished in third.

May was the start of the Thursday Night Thing, our version of the beer can races. During the year we had as few as two boats and as many as nine boats, with wind conditions very light most nights. This is fun racing, and in light shifty conditions everyone has a chance to win. Bill Cabrall, from Colorado, who was working in LA, drove down and joined in as crew and even came down and did race committee. We always welcome sailors to go out racing.

The California District Championship was held in June, and we had twelve boats, eleven from Mission Bay and a chartered boat being raced by Ken Manzoni, Julie Ardagna, and Bryan Buffaloe from Southwestern Yacht Club. The racing was tight and the weather was good, with Scott Finkboner winning it all. Jeff Coppens was second, and Pete Bellin was third.

The North American Championship was the focus for our Fleet all year, and thanks to a lot of hard work by everyone in our Fleet and the MBYC members, the regatta **Was a success.** I would like to thank everyone who made the long trip to California, and we hope to see you all again next year...in Annapolis!

In November, the racing focused on the Turkey Regatta, the only event during the month. The weather could not have been better; winds ranged from 10–14 knots under sunny skies. Nine boats were on the starting line, and with the other fleets on the water, the racing was very exciting. The top finishers all got their turkeys (Cornish game hens), and it was a very fun event. Scott Finkboner finished first, Jeff Coppens finished second, and Dan Gravatt was third.



Brant Beach Yacht Club kicked it off on June 10th with their Annual Spring Regatta, and they followed this up with the New Jersey State Championship on the next weekend.

Surf City hosted the Central Atlantic District Championship on the weekend of July 15 and 16.

Over the weekend of July 29 and 30, our club hosted the Atlantic Coast Championship. This event was sanctioned by the US Olympic Committee as a pre-qualifier to compete in the US Pan American qualifiers to be held at Annapolis in October. Seventy Lightnings showed up, and competition was fierce. Saturday's races were sailed in a 10–15 mph shifty southwesterly breeze. Sunday morning the wind was light but, at about 2:00 PM, the usual strong southerly wind came in to cap off regatta with an exciting fifth race. August 12 and 13 was our Down Bay Regatta weekend. This event was also used by the North Jersey Yacht Racing Association to select their YRA Lightning Class Champion. Fifteen Lightning's participated in this event. John Haiges, sailing with his wife, Lisa, and Jason Timmonds from Riverton, won the Regatta. Steve Warren from Surf City won the NJYRA Championship.

Our own Saturday series started on June 24th and was sailed through the summer up until Labor Day weekend.

After nursing some sore bones from the windy waters of Chile over the winter, Metedeconk sailors made their initial 2006 sailing on the Southern Circuit. Jim Carson sailed the entire Circuit. Jody Lutz won the Midwinter Lightning Championship held in St. Petersburg besting, a 73-boat fleet. Jody showed his "light air wizard" skills, sailing with brother Jay and nephew Taylor while gaining an automatic entry into the Pan American Trials. The same Lutz team had sailed the prior regatta in Miami (finishing 8th) with 13-year-old Taylor steering and winning a race.

Back on the Metedeconk, the Spring Series became the Lightning Championship series. The championship series had been traditionally held in the summer, but motorboat traffic and family obligations had slimmed participation. Fortunately, the spring featured very competitive sailing with a familiar ending: Mitch Hnatt wins. Greg Kinzel sailed a very strong series to finish second, with Jody Lutz (with a crew of thirteen-year olds, son Jason and Timmy Crann) beating George Francis for third on a tiebreaker. Just before the Series, six Metedeconk boats sailed the Long John, with the Taboada brothers, Keith (third) and Brian (sixth) having the most success.

Long Beach Island held three major Lightning regattas in the summer: New Jersey State Championship at Brant Beach in June, Central Atlantic Districts in Surf City in July and the Atlantic Coast Championships at Little Egg Harbor in late July. Jody Lutz dominated the States, winning a three race series with four points; Mitch Hnatt took seventh and Jim Carson ninth. Keith Taboada finished second in the CADs, losing a first place tiebreaker to Mark Schneider of Riverton. Billy Bogardus took fifth, Jim Carson seventh, and Mitch Hnatt ninth. The ACCs at Little Egg saw the fourth, and Keith Taboada took tenth, with a first and third in the final two races. Metedeconk participation was strong in this event, with Mitch Hnatt, Greg Kinzel, Jim Carson, Billy Bogardus and George Francis also sailing. Later in the summer, Surf City held the New Jersey Junior State Championship, with Matty Schon winning and Robert Alldian taking fifth in his first Lightning regatta.

Local summer sailing was limited to the Barnegat Bay Yacht Racing Championship (BBYRA) which saw extremely volatile conditions (high winds some weeks, no wind others) and only five and the ten races scheduled completed. Mitch Hnatt reclaimed the Championship.

The North Americans in San Diego saw three Metedeconk sailors participate. Golfers often applaud themselves for out shooting their age. Jim Carson blows this standard away with his sailing performance: nearing 80, Jim gualified for the Championship flight in San Diego, finishing thirtyfourth. George Francis (seventh) and Paul Gelenitis (twentieth) sailed in the President's Cup. The neat part of their performance was George and Paul sailed with their children: George with daughter Gillian (the youngest participant in the regatta) and Paul with daughter Kristen and son Ryan. Jim also sailed the Masters, finishing 9th.

Metedeconk also sailed a Fall Series, which saw ten boats qualify (open to all fleets as is the spring) and again very competitive sailing. Mitch Hnatt again took honors with Brian Taboada 2nd and Matt Reiser of Lavallette third. While most sailors were taking their masts down and storing their boats, Jim Carson and Billy Bogardus visited the Frigid Digit in Annapolis, with Jim winning the first race in route to a twelfth in the 42-boat regatta.

After a few lean years, Metedeconk's Junior Advanced Sailing Program conducted by members of Fleet 34 on Wednesday evenings attracted a respectable turnout. This programs leads to the Club Junior Championship won this year by Caroline Hall. 2006 also saw what will hopefully be an ongoing trend at Metedeconk-a new generation of Lighting sailors with familiar last names: Lutz, Francis, Gelenitis, Schon making their debut in a Lightning. Their participation can hopefully continue a strong heritage of Lightning sailing at Metedeconk for years to come.

11444 and 13720 did race in invitationals, and 13720 also did Wednesday evening racing. Both boats held up the tradition of winning some of the races.


A new sail club member with a cruising boat has indicated that he wants to get a Lightning, so we're looking forward to getting a series going next year.



Many thanks to Howard Stickney who continues to serve as Fleet 77 Treasurer.








**Galway Lake** Sailing on Galway Lake Galway, New York

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

The 2006 season brought out some good stiff competition in Lightning Fleet 338!

Of the nine boats on our lake, seven participated in the Fleet this year, averaging four to five per race. Our biggest problem this year was cancelled races —the wind was either too strong or non-existent for ten of the twenty-one races on the original schedule!

Our Fleet Secretary, Jim Millard, maintained a commanding lead throughout the season, taking second place in only two races all summer—and one of those qualified as a throw-out!

The real contest was between John Korkosz and Bill Kohler for the 2nd place position for the season. When John sailed, he was usually second

The regular Summer Series results were: First place—Jim Millard, Second place—John Korkosz, Third place—Bill Kohler, Fourth place— John Orton, Fifth place—Maury Gardner, Sixth place—Dale Brown and Seventh place—John Buhrmaster.

On Labor Day weekend, which is not included in our regular season competition, there were several "skipper swaps" during the three days of racing. It is truly interesting to see how differently a newer boat handles, the alternatives in rigging work, and even more enlightening, a different crew's procedures and performance! I know I came away from the experience with a couple of rigging changes to make and some new crewing techniques to try to implement (if I can only remember them 'til next season...)

We had one more interesting event this summer—the only race that was cancelled for reasons other than weather. The weather didn't turn ugly until after the race was underway. A sudden gust caught Maury Gardner by surprise, and he capsized (earning the "coveted" Dunkin' Donut Award). Being an old boat, his isn't equipped with a self-bailer, and the crew was unsuccessful in bailing due to the waves that had kicked up. Our only rescue boat capability is the club's committee boat, a pontoon boat with twin electric motors (gasoline engines are verboten on Galway Lake). The rescue boat had to take the righted but still swamped Lightning in tow to shallow water where bailing was possible. It was great to see the entire sailing club come to Maury's aid, even though it meant the race had to be abandoned. Sailors truly are great and selfless people!!


