

### 2008 South American Championship

With a perfect score with five wins in six races, George Rider with Sidney Bloch and Pedro Soares ran away with the South American title.

This event represented a move towards a new way of supplying boats to all competitors that was the object of long discussions between the various South American countries.

The host country must supply all the boats required, with only the top six host country qualifiers being allowed to sail in their own boats. The remaining boats are then offered at no cost to the foreign teams.

For Brazil this was not an easy thing to do since we do not have many good new boats available, and there were some complaints, but overall we were very pleased because every boat owner in the country offered his boat to the organization in order to make the event viable.

São Paulo Yacht Club showed that the local Fleet is very strong finishing 1, 2 with Tommy Sumner beating Juan Santos in the final Race. It was a great Championship.

A major 2008 goal for Fleet 34 was to invigorate its base with young sailors. Taking the baton from club mentor Jim Carson, Mitch Hnatt organized a series of Wednesday night sessions that sought to teach the fundamentals of Lightning faculty, including Jody Lutz, Jarrett Lynn, Jim Carson and Dave Ruiter, Class participation was strong in numbers and enthusiasm. In general, the age of most sailors was 14–15, so while it may take a few years to get them immersed in Lightning sailing, the seeds have been planted. The winner of the Club Junior Championship (a product of the class) was Rob Alldian. Rob has also showed as a promising first rate crew.

One junior seed which blossomed in 2008 was Matty Schon. A graduate of Jim's Junior Lightning Program, Matty reached national prominence with a 3rd in the World Youth Championship held in June in Montreal. Club members Jason Lutz and Timmy Crann were his crew. Later in the summer, Matty followed up with a 2nd in the Junior North Americans held in Newport, Rhode Island, assisted by his cousins, Michael and Timmy Crann. Jason Lutz moved over to sail with Cousin Taylor Lutz to win the regatta. Taylor, son of longtime Metedeconk member Jay, also won the Youth Worlds. Matty gave Taylor a battle in Newport, outdistancing all other competitors. We are extremely proud of all our junior sailors. Metedeconk sailors made strong showings in local New Jersey regattas. The opening Long John regatta, held at the Monmouth Boat Club in late April, was dominated by Fleet 34 members, with four of the top five boats. At the Central Atlantic Districts, held in July at Barnegat Light, Fleet 34 took the top four spots; Jody Lutz won, followed by Mitch Hnatt, Bill Bogardus, and Brian Taboada. Jim Carson, Keith Taboada and Greg Kinzel also sailed. Matty Schon won the Junior States, held in Surf City. Jim Carson won the Manahawkin Bay Cup, held at Surf City in September.

Jim was the lone Metedeconk participant on the Southern Circuit, finishing in the top half of every regatta and placing 3rd in the Masters Winter Championship. Jody Lutz carried the honors at the North Americans in Newport, in contention for the championship, ending in a tie for 2nd. Brian Taboada (16th) and Bill Bogardus (38th) competed in the Championship flight, while Jim Carson sailed to an 18th in the Presidents Cup. Jim also sailed the week prior in the Masters Championship, placing 10th. Jody Lutz (12th) and Dave Ruiter (24th) made the trip to Skaneateles for the 70th Anniversary regatta.

In local fleet sailing, Mitch Hnatt won the Fleet Championship series, followed by Jody Lutz and Bill Bogardus. Dreams of getting other boats to sail with you, or having more people enjoying a Lightning, are things you think about but are really just dreams. For this sailor the end of 2007 will not be forgotten.

The winds came from the perfect direction, planets were perfectly aligned. I don't really know, but I found myself in the right place and at the perfect moment to be able to finally fulfill this dream—a Lightning fleet in my hometown. If you are interested on how to do this, here's is the recipe for getting a new fleet.

Cedar Point Yacht Club has been home to Lightning Fleet 126 for over forty years. CPYC hosted the Lightning North American Championships in 2003 and Atlantic Coast Championship in 2007. Fleet 126 races every Saturday from Memorial Day to Labor Day. On the major holiday weekends (Memorial Day, Fourth of July and Labor Day), we sail three-day regattas, culminating with club barbecues and a competitive Commodore's Cup Series. We also host two invitational regattas. The Early Bird Regatta takes place the weekend before Memorial Day and is hosted together with the Flying Scot Fleet. The Fall Classic takes place the last weekend in September and is run in conjunction with the Thistle Fontelieu Regatta. The parties at these regattas are becoming legendary, so if there's any way you can attend, you'll be happy you came.

The 2008 season started out exceptionally well at Cedar Point Yacht Club with a terrific Early Bird Regatta. Gianni Cuccio chaired the regatta, which included a North Sails rigging and tuning clinic for us and the Flying Scots. The racing was tight with a competitive fleet. Dave Peck from Niantic out-dueled Gianni for the title, everyone had a lot of fun, and the North Sails video analysis helped everyone shake off the early season rust.

With the North American Championships in nearby Newport this summer, we knew the District Championship was going to be a tough regatta. We all spent a lot of time getting ready.

PRO Harrison Gill served the Lightning fleet well again, getting off four races over two days for the 26-boat fleet. Gianni Cuccio, Josh Goldman, Dick Thackabery, Ched Proctor and Eric Heller all qualified for NAs. At NAs a few weeks later, Ched took 11th, Gianni took 20th in the Championship Fleet, and Josh took 22nd in the President's Fleet.

The 2008 Club racing was a steady season for Fleet 126. 2007 was a season of stellar growth for us, increasing boats on the course and qualifiers. So, we had a hard act to follow this year. But we managed to eke out one extra race day this season with thirty races over fifteen days. We had a few more total boats competing in the season, recording 162 total finishes in the season series. Beating our 2007 numbers was encouraging, but we're looking forward to an even stronger 2009 with some new boats coming to CPYC and hopefully expanding the fleet even more.

The Fall Classic was a bit of a disappointment, with a terrible weather forecast scaring off most of the fleet. We ended up with three good races on the first day in iffy weather, with the second day getting cancelled. Josh Goldman won the event with David Fried in second and visiting skipper Bob Hall from Lake Wallenpaupack taking 3rd place.

### 2008 Season—Celebrating 65 Years of Lightning Racing on the Potomac During the Lightning 70th Anniversary Year!

Fleet 50, in its 65th year, started the New Year with a goal of continuing the tradition of racing excellence on the Potomac and in the Dixie District, and to be one of the largest fleets in attendance at the Lightning 70th Anniversary Regatta at Skaneateles, New York in July. How did we do? Read on...

### Season Highlights

Nineteen Fleet 50 skippers and ninety-seven crew members sailed a total of 173 boat-race days on the Potomac in 2008. Twelve skippers qualified for the 2008 Championship series that included fifty-four races spread over sixteen Sunday race days, plus the Potomac Cup and the PRSA Spring and President's Cup regattas. Fleet 50 organized and ran the Potomac Cup Regatta and provided seventy-five PRSA race committee person-days, including eleven Primary Race Officer days during the season—for a total of 674 person-hours of service to PRSA. Additionally, David Thompson served as Regatta Chair for the PRSA Spring Regatta and Nabeel Alsalam was the PRO for the Spring Regatta Upper Course. Fourteen Fleet 50 boats participated in twelve out-of-town regattas, including the WJM and North American Championships Regattas, and one Fleet 50 boats sailed the 2008 Southern Circuit. Ten Fleet 50 boats sailed in the Lightning 70th Anniversary regatta, the second-largest contingent attending.

### Awards

At the Annual awards banquet on February 7, 2009, we offered congratulations to Russ Roberts and Team Windchaser who took first place in the Fleet 50 Championship Series! The Fleet Championship series runners-up were Nabeel Alsalam, 2nd; Frank Galagher 3rd; Rick Welch 4th; and Jeff Storck 5th. Nabeel Alsalam won the Bloody Rudder, awarded for doing the best among Fleet 50 skippers in out-of-town regattas, and the Iron Skipper award for sailing the most days on the water as a skipper. Skipper-nominated crew awards went to Becky Mach and Michael Scott for Best New Crew; Stefano de Leo and Alan Rukin for Most Improved Crew; and to Brian Kuzon, Rebecca Thomasson, and Piercarlo Brunino for High-Impact crew. The Crew-nominated Skipper awards went to David Thompson for Mr. Hospitality/Congeniality; Red Fehrle and Collin Kirby for Team Spirit Skipper; John Pemberton for the Bungle Bucket and Collin Kirby for Skipper of the Year. Catherine Calvin was awarded the All-Weather Sailor Award for the most Fleet 50 crew days on the water.

### PRSA Spring and Fall Series and Regattas

The PRSA spring season of eight Sundays kicked off on April 13, later than usual, and the Sunday weather patterns treated us to five nice days, one no-race day (thunderstorms) and a couple of days with interesting weather conditions. One of those was Spring Series # 6 on May 18 when the river flow was way up due to heavy rains in the preceding week, and winds of 16–19 MPH were forecasted. In actuality, the winds never got above sixteen, and while the cold rain that fell could have been discouraging, it was never a distraction for skippers and crew dressed for it. PRO Pat McGee set up a long windward-leeward course in front of the Power Plant, with the windward mark in front of the Robbins-Gioia office building in Old Town and the leeward mark well north of the green channel mark north of the Naval Research Lab. This did put some of the racecourse in the navigable channel, where we had to dodge the Spirit, the Dandy, a big barge and other large boats (one boat got a bit too close to the Spirit, which objected by sounding five angry blasts of a horn). However, we had great downwind legs with chutes up. For the final windward leg of the third race, RC decided to move the windward mark farther south, placing it in front of the Chart House restaurant, but the anchor didn't hold and the current carried the mark almost to the Wilson Bridge. That could have made for a really fun long downwind finish leg, but unfortunately, after the last boat rounded, the wind died, not to pick up again until after the race was abandoned, and we had accepted tows home. Russ Roberts finished the spring series in first place, but followed closely by Frank Gallagher, Nabeel Alsalam, Rick Welch and Pat McGee.

Nine Fleet 50 boats participated in the PRSA Spring Regatta on Memorial Day weekend. On that weekend we had good winds on Saturday, and PRO Nabeel Alsalam got off three races run before it was time to come in. However, there was not enough wind to race on Sunday.

Our summer went by quickly, and before we knew it, the fall season had started, with the 64th annual PRSA President's Cup Regatta, run concurrently with the 14th annual Leukemia Cup regatta, on the weekend of September 6/7. All week we knew that troublesome weather could be coming for the weekend, and it did—on Saturday the river was closed to boating by the Harbor Patrol due to the passage of the remnants of Tropical Storm Hanna. On Sunday the winds were from the NW at 9 mph in the morning but became light and variable in the afternoon. Still, that was enough to get in three races. Frank Gallagher took first place in a Lightning field of eleven boats. Frank also won the Norman C. Schaller trophy for the highest-finishing boat in the largest class in the regatta.



Winds were forecasted to be from the ENE at 8–9 MPH, but they were better than that, and RC got off four races, one on a triangular course and three on a windward-leeward course, before it was time to come in. What a great way to end the season! Nabeel Alsalam took first place in the Fall Series, with Russ Roberts, Rick Welch, Jeff Storck and Frank Gallagher rounding out the list of the top five finishers.

### Lightning 70th Anniversary Regatta July 4th Weekend

The high point of the season for ten Fleet 50 skippers and 23 crew members was the 70th Anniversary Regatta hosted by the Skaneateles Country Club on a sunny and pleasant July 4th weekend. Kudos to the members of the Skaneateles Country Club who orchestrated the entire event and welcomed all who participated.

This was an extraordinarily well-run, historically significant event, with a total of 129 boats on the water, including the ten Fleet 50 boats. Bob Astrove and Doug Dixon sailed their woodies in the Red (classic Lighting) Fleet; where Bob took first place and Doug won the People's Choice award for his restoration of hull number 584. Skippers Butler, Dillard; Keith, Kirby, Storck, and Thompson sailed in the White (club racers) Fleet, and Chandler Owen and Nabeel Alsalam sailed in the Blue (regional/national competitors) Fleet.

Winds were light on Saturday and non-existent on Sunday, but the social activities and the opportunity to meet so many dedicated Lightning enthusiasts far outweighed the slow pace of racing on Saturday. The water of Lake Skaneateles was so clear and so refreshing that it tempted many skippers and crew to dive in during lulls in the racing or for a quick dip before hitting the road on Sunday.

### Other Out of Town Regattas

The 2008 Dixie District Championships were held on the Chesapeake, hosted by Fleet 329, the weekend of June 14 and 15. Four Fleet 50 boats participated, and all four (Alsalam, Gallagher; Pemberton; and Thompson) qualified for the North Americans to be conducted in August.

Later in August four Fleet 50 boats (Butler; Roberts; Thompson and Warren) hit the Duck Challenge in Havre de Grace; then in September David Thompson represented Fleet 50 at the SMSA Invitational in September at Solomons. Subsequently in October, Nabeel and Collin hit the Frigid Digit at Annapolis, with Collin getting a taste of a capsize in the Chesapeake, and David Thompson represented Fleet 50 at the Pennsylvania Governors Cup at Susquehanna. In November David covered the Hampton Fall Fling. This was a most active out-of-town series for our fleet.

And Jim Greenwell, who purchased 14532, Boonoonoonos at the end of the 2007 season, sailed her infrequently in 2008, decided to take a year off and travel around the world, so we will not see him again until 2010..

2009 will be a challenging year for Fleet 50 as we bring on new skippers and crew, compete in and run regattas, elect new officers, and enjoy our sailing on the Potomac.

#### District Commodore: Juha Aromaa

The Finland District sailing season 2008 was like the winds in Finland this year. Rising.

Our former commodore Sakari Pesola had started a project to get six new boats from US to Finland. After many discussions between Juha Aromaa and Hugh Armbruster, Nickels made an offer of new Lightnings if we were able to get four buyers. Thanks to enthusiasm shown, work done, and the favorable currency rate of dollar, six boats were packed in a container and shipped to Finland. New boats were absolutely needed; the only disappointment was that the boats arrived a bit too late for the European Championship in Switzerland. If we ever put together another order, the project should be started before Christmas.



After unpacking the containers, six teams from Finland traveled to Neuchatel, Switzerland, to participate the Europeans. In the practice race it was so windy that we had swimming practice, and the floating capacity of the charter boat was tested. No essential physical or mental damages were experienced that effected the actual races. The highest finishing Finnish team was led by Kimmo Aromaa, with Juha Aromaa and Mika Aromaa from Helsinki as crew—they were 4th. The youngest skipper was Risto Pesola (age 11); he finished his first European Championship 14th out of sixteen boats. Well done.

The Finnish Championships were arranged in Lohja, a lake that is famous for shifty winds. The weather was cold, wind from the north, and the breezes were quite strong. One boat lost its rudder, three boats capsized—some of them even twice.

Lightnings came to Finland 60 years ago. The 60th Anniversary Regatta was held in Merenkävijät Helsinki, where the Lightning story started. In the evening there was a gala dinner where the seniors recalled the good old days, and a photo show reminded us of the fun we have all had with the Lightning Class. The funniest thing we saw was the changes that have been made in transporting the boats (see the ILCA 2006 Yearbook for a horse drawn sled pulling a boat to the snowy waters edge). Participating in the races, and being part of the Lightning family makes it all worth it.



Suomen Districtin kausi 2008 oli kuten tuuletkin tänä vuonna. Kiihtyvä. Edellinen kommodorimme Sakari Pesola oli aloittanut projektin kuuden uuden veneen saamiseksi USAsta Suomeen. Juha Aromaan ja Hugh Armbrusterin keskustelujen jälkeen Nickels teki tarjouksen uusista veneistä, jos vain saisimme kasaan neljä ostajaa. Kiitos innostuksen, tehdyn työn ja taalan suosiollisen kurssin lopulta kuusi venettä pakattiin konttiin ja lähetettiin Suomeen. Uuden veneet tulivat ehdottomasti tarpeeseen, ainoa pettymys oli, että ne saapuivat maahan vähän liian myöhään ehtiäkseen Sveitsin EM:iin. Jos toinen projekti saadaan aikaiseksi, se pitäisi käynnistää jo ennen joulua.

Kontin purkamisen jälkeen kuusi venekuntaa matkasi EM:iin Sveitsin Neuchateliin. Jo harjoituskisassa oli niin tuulista, että sekä uintitaidot että vuokraveneen kelluntaominaisuudet tulivat testattua. Ei oleellisia fyysisiä tai psyykkisiä vahinkoja ja kisaan. Lopputuloksissa paras suomalaisjoukkue oli Kimmo, Mika ja Juha Aromaa Helsingistä (4.) Nuorin kippari Risto Pesola (11 v) aloitti Lightning EM-uransa sijalta 14 (16 osallistujasta). Hieno saavutus.





SM:t järjestettiin Lohjanjärvellä, joka on kuuluisa vaihtelevista tuulistaan. Sää oli kylmä, tuuli pohjoisesta ja puuskat varsin kovia. Yhdestä veneestä meni peräsin, kolme venettä ui ja paras niistä kahdesti.

Lightningit rantautuivat Suomeen 60 vuotta sitten. 60-vuotisjuhlaregatta pidettiin Merenkävijöillä Helsingissä, josta koko Lightningin tarina sai alkunsa. Illalla järjestettiin juhlaillallinen, jossa vanhat parrat muistelivat vanhoja hyviä päiviä ja kuvakavalkadi vahvisti, kuinka hauskaa touhu on oikeasti ollut. Täytyy myötää, ettei mikään näytä niin hupaisalta kuin vanha muoti, lukuun ottamatta ehkä veneiden kuljetukseen kehiteltyjä luovia ratkaisuja. 
A Finnish Anniversary Regatta was arranged in August to celebrate 60 years of Lightning sailing in Finland. The regatta

The 2008 sailing season was much better than in average for our Fleet.
